Spotlight on Morgans

Guest Editorial from GEORGE B. RUSSELL of the N. Y. Daily News

The problem of getting good national as well as local publicity for the Morgan breed is one in which every Morgan owner and breeder can take a hand. Even the mere Morgan enthusiast and fan can be of great help. The writer knows, for having decided this year to make an all-out effort to help promote this year's National Morgan Horse Show, I can report these developments.

One of our club's first good breaks came when the sports commentator-columnist Jimmy Powers repeated his 1956 performance and gave us a whole half column of space in his Powerhouse column in the *New York Daily News* on Thursday, July 25th.

Earlier, I had sent releases (including some background on Morgans generally) to NBC Monitor and to all the Television chains and Newsreels. Two of the latter responded by sending cameramen from Boston to cover our show. Harry Manas of "News of the Day" came on Sunday... and despite some rainy weather, shot footage that was used in the Telenews Sports reel. This News of the Day assures me, was sent to at least fifty TV stations across the nation.

Unfortunately this footage did not get into the John Daly TV newscast over WABC-TV here in New York. But our Newsreels here had it. And when we returned from vacation, Sunday, August 4th, we saw our Morgans on display at the Grand Central Terminal Newsreel theater. The Manager informed me that it had been there since July 31st and that it was running through to midnight August 6th. Plenty of still-picture publicity shots from our Morgan show were in the lobby too.

Next, I checked with NBC on they coverge they gave our show via Monitor. And they assured me that the tape recording made on Saturday from the fair grounds with Mrs. Greenwalt in on the interview, was aired nationally over NBC Monitor at 1:05 Sunday afternoon, July 28th.

As for the newsreel footage shot on Friday, July 26th by Universal's Phil Coolidge of Boston, that, the company informs me, is being held as "timeless material" for future release. They have promised to inform us promptly when this film on the first day activities of our show will be released to their subscriber theaters.

To all our Morgan friends may I say this, let's all drop a line to the people who came through for us this year. Write Jimmy Powers at the *New York Daily News* or care of the Gillette Cavalcade of Sports. Again, any line of thanks to "News of the Day" will insure newsreel cooperation at our 1958 show. Also, we should all write Universal and ask them to release their Mogan show footage promptly. And let's not forget that old standby, RADIO, and the help given us by NBC Monitor.

Incidentally, on this subject of publicity, let's not neglect our own excellent Morgan Horse Magazine. More and more, as people across the country start getting acquainted with the Morgan story, they will want to read more about Morgans. This writer knows from experience how such readers cherish every article, advertisement and picture printed and how they are filed away for reference. I subscribe to a half dozen horse magazines and not one touches ours for general reader interest. It deserves greater advertising support and more picture cooperation. We owe it to ourselves and the Morgan breed to help this magazine grow and prosper.

One thing more. Let's not neglect any local opportunities to get on neighborhood radio and TV stations and talk Morgans. I hope to work on the TV and Newsreel people as well as the Radio chains again next year. I also feel that with a proper barrage of letters next





DAMSEL - - Retirement Ceremony

Following is a copy of the script read by Announcer Smith during last day of the show with Damsel in the ring supported by her descendants.

In 1907 the United States Morgan Horse Farm began breeding activities at Weybridge, Vermont. Over the next several years the best mares available were assembled from all parts of the country. So it was, that in 1926, the government farm purchased the 4year old mare Florette from J. C. Brunk of Illinois. Incidentally, Florette left behind a weanling stud namely Flyhawk, who since that time has autographed the papers of many a good mid-western Morgan. The senior stallion at Middlebury at this time was Bennington, best known for his offsprings out of Artemisia-Mansfield Ulysses, Canfield, and Querido.

Florette, bred to the 24 year old Bennington, produced in 1933 the mare foal, Damsel, which we honor today.

This mare thus combines the blood of two great bands of Morgans — the former U. S. Morgan Horse Farm at Weybridge, Vt. and the J. C. Brunk band of Springfield, Illinois — and she is also one of the last living offspring of the stallion Bennington. Damsel is still owned by the United States Department of Agriculture, but has been on lease to the University of Massachusetts since 1950. She has been successfully handled at the recent National Shows by Gwen Nelson Chorak, under the guidance of her father, Dick Nelson, horseman at the University.

Damsel is now 24 years old, and is one of the best living representatives of Morgan productivity and durabiity. To many Morgan enthusiasts she has been THE model mare of the breed. But, good conformation in a horse is somewhat of a luxury. The ability to move is still however, a necessity. This is one mare that can certainly get out of her own way. She is also one of the truest going mares with good natural action that have entered this ring.

Her show career started before the war with the National Shows held at Upwey Farms in South Woodstock, Vt.

In 1941, Damsel placed 1st in mares and foals with her first foal Lakewood. In 1942 she repeated, and won the class again with her 2nd foal, Meadowlark. Then she entered the produce class with these first two offsprings and won that class. After the war she came back to take the mares and foals class again with the stud foal Triumph in 1949.

However, most of us remember best the way she celebrated her 20th birthday at Northampton in 1953. To prove that she still looked good she placed 1st in mares and foals with Admiral, the 4th time she had taken the class at the National Show. She was 2nd in model mares 4 years and over and 2nd in mares and produce. To prove that she could still move, she entered two road hack classes, placing 1st in the "Maiden" and 2nd in the "Open."

But, that is not all. Between 1941 and 1957 this mare found time to produce 12 foals — 7 studs and 5 fillies. In order of birth they were: Lakewood and Meadowlark, both by Goldfield; Narcissa and Olivia, both by Canfield; Quotient and Triumph, both by Mentor; Bay State Whippoorwill by Ranier; B. S. Admiral by Meade; B. S. Bounty and B. S. Damsette by U. S. Panez; and this year's foal B. S. Estrelita by Parade. One more offspring is neither seen or heard; he is by Upwey Ben Don and the delivery date is set for May, 1958.

Since all the sons and daughters of this mare are unavailable, her descendants in the Univrsity band have volunteered to support the old girl. Arranged in lines behind her, and lengthwise of the ring, are a son and two daughters; a grandson and 4 granddaughters; a great grandson and two great granddaughters; and finally a great great granddaughter; almost the entire band.

In National shows held at Northampton this group has taken home 8 trophies and 40 ribbons with a few championship ribbons among them.

A few questions automatically arise from the exhibition of such a group. First, in what other species does the great grandmother and the great granddaughter foal the same year!

But, more important, what other matriarch can present such a show of force or have as much influence on a breeding program?

Whenever a breeder is blessed with

a broodmare and descendans of this quality, it is much easier for the quality to go downward than upward, or even to remain stationary. We at the University therefore should like to publicly thank the Morgan breeders in New England for their interest and aid in our breeding program — with special thanks to Mrs. Ela, Mr. Davis, Mr. Ferguson, and Mr. Tompkins.

As we said earlier the mare Damsel was bred at the former U.S. Morgan Horse Farm. In 1928 the Animal Husbandry Division of the Bureau of Animal Industry of Washington transferred a man from the Federal Horse Breeding Station at Miles City, Montana to assume duties as Animal Husbandman in charge of the U S. Morgan Horse Farm at Middlebury, Vt. This same person had graduated in animal husbandy from Iowa State College in 1915, and had received a master's degree in animal husbandry from Washington State College. He had served a short time as instructor in Animal husbandry at Washington, and then saw active duty in the Remount Service of the Army during World War I. After the war he was appointed to the Animal Husbandry Division in the U. S. Department of Agriculture, and, before going to Vermont, had spent most of his time in horse and mule research at the Federal Horse Breeding Station at Laramie, Wyoming, and later at Miles City.

The man and breeder of this mare obviously is Earl B. Krantz, 25 years a director of the Morgan Horse Club. and for as many years in charge of the Morgan Horse Farm. The farm was transferred to the Vermont Agricultural College and the horses were dispersed late in 1950. Earl Krantz retired from government service early in 1951. Those who attended the 1950 show at Windsor, saw his horses go out with a blaze of glory, when Riviera, Mentor and Stellar almost swept the show. In 1951, Earl saw his pride and joy, a yearling stallion representing his last foal crop, place 4th in a class of six. He had his reward last year when this same stallion became Grand Champion Stallion of

We believe old Justin would indeed have been proud. We were!



Show Sidelights

The Seabrook four-in-hand hooked to a red and black park drag was the attraction of the show. Its numerous appearances on the track and infield during the show were greeted by enthusiastic applause. This team was trained and driven by Mr. Jack Seabrook, president of Seabrook Farms, Inc., of Seabrook, N. J. Jack Whitaker manager of Mr. Seabrook's Lead Bar Farms, was colorfully dressed as a coach guard, and announced each arrival on the coach horn.

The coach and four opened the show by delivering the officers of the Morgan Horse Club and local dignitaries from the hotel to the show grounds. Twelve people were seated topside, but few rode in the blue plush interior. The rear boot was equipped with two lead-lined ice chests for 36 quarts of champagne, and drawers for silver, fine china and glassware. Milk was substituted for the champagne when the coach crossed the New England border.

Another vehicle which graced the infield during the show was the hunting or shooting brake loaned for the occasion by the Warner Carters. The Seabrock four-in-hand is made up of Redstone 11005 and Captain Ken 9497, the leaders, and Bolinvar 10723 and Fort Knox 10385, the wheelers.

After the family class the Ela and Orcutt entries returned to the ring with Mrs. Brenton H. Dickson on the 26 year old mare, Sadwin. Mrs. Dickson at 80 years of age was proof that enthusiasm for Morgans and horsemanship never wanes. Dozens of children have come under Mrs. Ruth Dickson's wing, and have learned to know and to love Morgans. These same children, many now adult, chose this occasion to honor her with a small token of their appreciation. It was fitting that the momento was presented by Mr. Whitney Stone, treasurer of the Morgan Horse Club, Inc., son of a former presiden of the Club, and underwriter of Morgan horse activities for a generation. It would take a separate issue of the Magazine to pay proper tribute to his generosity.

The country driving class was enlivened by costumed passengers in stanhopes, Concord buggies, and a fancy buckboard complete with a motherin-law seat in the rear. Costumes and antique vehicles could well be requirements for this class.

Then the rains came. The rainmakers in their efforts to combat the drought in southern New England were over-enthusiastic. Fortunately for the management most of the Saturday afternoon crowd was trapped in the grandstand to enjoy the misery of the exhibitors. In hand classes were substituted for performance classes and the show went on. 23 stallions and their exhibitors slogged about on the clay Blacks, bays, liver and light ring. chestnuts all turned the same shade ---"wet chestnut." The only horse of a different color was the stud who had the poor judgment to rear, and suddenly became clay colored. The storm came in from the West about horizontal to the ground, abated, turned about and came back from the East. So the five year record of fair weather at Northampton ended.

The one-mile trotting race, pushed ahead because of Saturday's storm, was again greeted by rain at the start of Sunday's session. The two-year-old from Illinois won easily, but with little encouragement from his driver, who felt it best at the time to keep his mouth shut. The entries were good mudders, and one look at their drivers proved it. George Gobel may be a comedian, but to Morgan folks, he's quite a horse.

In order to avoid a class of forty mares 4 years old and over, the management decided upon two sections for mares who had lived and for those who had not — on the basis of their foaling records.

The harness pair class was a beauty. Eight pairs were entered and six showed up in the ring. All pairs were beautifully matched in color, conformation, and stride. In fact all the harness classes were exceptional. The two and three year olds behaved admirably. No one tore up their harness or stove up their buggy just to hold the crowd's attention. The Junior Harness Stake was a worthwhile addition.

Two of our favorite cripples rode and drove. Ann Hopkins with a plaster cast on one foot rode in pleasure, trail, Western, and jumping classes with the benefit of only one stirrup. Pete Nelson worked his mare up to Junior Champion with the aid of a pair of crutches, and then drove her single and in pairs into the ribbons again. It woud have tickled Frank Orcutt to see this 'little creature'' go.

The kids as usual were master showmen. We missed last year's comedian with the derby in the leadline class. But we had Gene Autry's successor who sang his way around the ring without benefit of guitar accompaniment.

Upwey Ben Don did it again. He won the get class for the fifth successive year, and so unnerved his owner that he forgot his entry for the Junior Champion Stallion Class. The colt got to the ring in record time escorted by a station wagon. He is already entered in next year's roadster classes since he passed the station wagon twice on the turns.

The trailer race was real honest. The ringmaster tightened all the tail gates! Exhibitors were somewhat stunned by the unanticipated delay. Our 26 year old favorite, Sadwin came in second. Since this class is usually her "meat," she is still mumbling about the placings.

Donfield finally caught up with Dona Lee. He duplicated her efforts of last year by winning the model, saddle, and harness championships. Ted Davis just sits back and rubs his hands while others run the shuttle service from stable to ring.

Sunday afternoon saw another mare and another breeder honored. The 24 year old Damsel was retired, and her breeder, Earl Krantz, was given a citation. To those who have followed the activities of such grand horses, these ceremonies are tear-jerkers. However we know of no finer way to pay tribute to horses or their breeders. The horses raised at the government farm by Earl Krantz are spread over the world. We feel Damsel was his best. Earl's citation was long over due.

ANNUAL REPORT

The Annual meeting of The Morgan Horse Club, Inc., was held in conjunction with other activities tied in with the National Morgan Horse Show held at Northampton, Massachusetts on July 26, 27 and 28.

Festivities began with a buffet dinner at the Northampton Hotel which was attended by well over a hundred members and their friends and families. The meeting followed directly thereafter at which there were forty-eight voting members present. All of this was on Thursday evening, July 25. The meeting was taken up mostly with the routine business of the Club, including reports of the Secretary and the Treasurer, and an extended report by the President of the progress being made in the solution of various problems before the Club.

There were members present from North Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Wisconsin, Michigan, Ohio, as well as from the New England and middle Atlantic States. It was a very representative group.

Reports As Presented At Annual Meeting

TREASURER'S REPORT

By WHITNEY STONE, Treasurer

The year 1956, from a financial standpoint, was the best year that the club has had. The income from membership increased slightly, and from registration and transfer fees to a gratifying degree. The greatest improvement was in connection with the Morgan Horse Magazine which showed a slight profit from publication amounting to \$344, as compared with a deficit in 1955 amounting to over \$6,000.

Registration fees amounted to \$6,300, as compared with \$5,200 the previous year. Transfer fees brought in a total of \$4,100, as compared with \$3,100 the previous year. The National Morgan Horse Show resulted in a profit of \$2,770, compared with \$2,480 the previous year.

As a new item, we received about \$200 in royalties from the sale of the model Morgan items by the Balfour Company.

The result of all this is what might be called our normal income amounted to \$16,000, as compared with \$6,900 in 1955.

Our normal expenses in 1956 totalled about \$7,200, as compared with \$5,100 in 1955. While there was a slight increase in money spent for advertising, of which the total amounted to \$2,700 our support of Morgan shows and activities other than the National Morgan Horse Show were increased to \$2,100 compared with \$1,300 the previous year. This item is probably destined to increase gradually in the future as we are called upon to provide trophies and otherwise support our local organizations. The normal office expenses such as supplies, etc. were approximately the same as in 1955.

Net income for 1956, amounted to \$8,900, as compared with \$1,700 in 1955.

This improvement in normal income of the Club made it possibe to publish Volume VII of the Register without greatly reducing our reserve balance in the bank, which is being hoarded looking forward to the time when it will be needed in establishing a breed office and all that goes with it. The cost of

SECRETARY'S REPORT

By F. B. HILLS, Secretary

The year 1956 showed a continued increase in the American Morgan Horse Register. There were 482 registations, as compared with 452 in 1955. There were 611 transfers recorded in 1956, as compared with 475 in 1955. This marked increase in transfers shows the greater activity in the buying and selling of registered Morgan stock which appears to be continuing this year. Many buyers are new owners who may be expected in the future to widen the distribution of ownership and, in some cases, increase breeding operations. The correspondence in the Secretary's office with people in all sections of the United States continues to gain in volume.

There has been increased activity in many of the local breeders' groups. This is particularly notable in New England. In the last few years, Massachusetts has developed into one of the leading Morgan communities in the country. There have been sound gains in some of the middle western communities, notably Michigan and Minnesota. In the Northwest, a marked increase in interest is noted, particularly in Washington, which is a relatively new active Morgan community. In California, a new group was formed in the southern part of the state which it is hoped may develop to take the place of the organization there which fell to pieces some years ago, but which was very active ten or twelve years New organizations of Morgan ago. breeders came into being in Ohio and Illinois. The Mid-Atlantic Group had a most successful first show at Frederick, Maryland, which is relatively new Morgan territory. It attracted some of the leading Mogans, particularly in the East.

This activity is partly the result of the very successful tour made by Mr. Davis the President of the Club, over a period of four months, in which he visited practically all the active Morgan groups in the country. Naturally this gain needs to be followed up in order to be consistent.

The publication of Voulme VII of the American Morgan Horse Register (Continued on Page 40)

Ohio Morgan Association

Competition is keen here in Ohio as several top Morgans are battling it out for that beautiful trophy the OMHA is presenting to the high point horse at the close of the show season. One stallion that is a consistant winner wherever shown is Don Shook's Sea Breeze. He was COSCA Reserve Champion in the Plain Horse Division in 1955 and in 1956 winner of over 87 ribbons and trophies. He was a two-time ribbon winner at the Pennsylvania National Show in 1956 in Morgan classes. Until this year, there have been very few Morgan classes in Ohio and those showing Morgans had to go out of state to compete in Morgan classes or face open competition. It is gratifying, indeed, to see our Morgans meet this competition and best it proving the little Morgan superior in whatever he is asked to do. Not only is Sea Breeze a top show horse, but a fine sire as well. Pictured in this magazine are two of his offspring. One is a filly owned by Mrs. Charles Norris of Montrose, Ohio, and the other a stud colt owned by Mrs. Ruth A. Stewart of Akron.

Mr. and Mrs. Stewart are Morgan enthusiasts and have just become members of the OMHA. Mrs. Stewart used to teach equitation at the Ideal Riding Academy for Mr. Roth. Her mare, dam of the stud colt by Sea Breeze, was shipped in to her from Little Rock, Arkansas. She was often used from 8:00 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. five days a week and since then has proved her worth as a trail horse too. Mrs. Stewart writes of trail riding with fiends and their Arabians, but it was always the little Morgan mare that took the lead. The Arabs refused to cross creeks, etc. Her story is typicalif you want a job done well and easily, buy a Morgan. The stud colt, Sea Bee, though only four months old already knows how to lead well, load and unload. He shows a lot of action and they are hoping for a bright future for him.

Mr. Mattox reports the arrival of two stud colts by his stallion, Devan Chief. In the rush and excitement of preparing for the National he failed to tell me much about them except they are both spoken for. He must have two dandies.

Nevin Combs, trainer for Plainview Stables in Wooster, writes that at the present time he has seven registered Morgans in training and expects eight more within the next six months. He trained the stallion Devan Comet owned by Crabapple Valley Farms. Devon Comet is sired by Captor and out of Ceres making him a full brother to Sea Breeze. What a shame this fine stallion is not in the show ring.

Mr. Don I. Davis of Wapakenota, Ohio has sold his two Morgan mares to Mrs. John Junk of Mt. Sterling. Both mares he raised and are unspoiled with wonderful dispositions. The younger, Mamie Dee, was sired by Devan Comet out of Jane Allen and the other, Lady of Leisure was sired by Lamont out of Jane Allen. Both are chestnuts and Lady has a flaxen mane and tail. Mrs. Junk also owns their dam, Jane Allen. They are to be used as brood mares to replace the fine old brood mare, Valentine, who died July 1st of natural causes.

Valentine was 19 years old and the dam of Big Bill B, Nugget's Val Hawk, Captain McKutchin and Shoo Shoo, all by Nugget. There are probably others I don't know about as she was bred by the L. U. Sheep Co., Dickie, Wyoming and sired by Linspar out of Valerie by Flyhawk.









Poitras, not only gave us a splendid day there, but also proved to be imperturbably calm and cordial in the face of the most unfortunate of weathers. If rain had been foreseen, we could have been easily accommodated in the indoor ring. However the sun shone from a brilliant sky, chairs and tables and lunches were spread in the open by the swimming pool. Then came a deluge of rain. We rushed for the house trailing soggy sandwiches, paper wrappings, and our own dripping selves. After the progam, everything was bright and clear, so tables, chairs, dozens of glasses and bottles were set up outstide, and again the sky emptied itself. This second wild scramble of the wet crowd indoors, still left our generous Waseeka friends smiling and unruffled.

After lunch, President Wallace L. Orcutt, Jr., called the meeting together and expressed his pleasure and satisfaction in working with the Association for the past two years. The customary business of an annual meeting culminated in the report of the nominating committee. There being no further nominations, the following were elected: President, Keynith Knapp; Vice-President, Mrs. Winthrop S. Dakin; Secretary, Miss Doris M. Rockwell; Treasurer, Nathaniel F. Bigelow, Jr.; Directors: Mrs. E. Keene Annis, Mrs. J. Cecil Ferguson, Miss Margaret Gardiner, W. G. Glenney, Jr., and Miss Mabel Owen. Mr. Orcutt introduced our new President, Mr. Knapp, and the meeting was shortly after adjourned.

The rain had stopped and we went outdoors to the ringside for the program arranged by Waseeka Farm. The first event was a colt matching game. Four foals were lined up, and we were told the names of the three sires and four dams. The object was to give the sire and dam of each colt on a pedigree form provided. Eight people tied for correct answers, all of which were breeders or closely connected with breeders.

Mr. John Lydon then demonstrated the correct way to harness a show-horse, and gave tips on safe procedures with colts and green horses. Mrs. Power then exhibited the horse, driving it in a nice, even, balanced park trot. The same was done for a pair of harness horses.

Lastly Mr. Lydon and Mrs. Annis demonstrated two very sporting ways to ride, customs practiced by young bloods in Europe in earlier days, and now useful in getting more than one exercise at a time. Nice work, if you can do it! In the first, Mr. Lydon rode an "inverted unicorn," in which the rider drives before him a pair of horses, thus working three horses at once. The pair are in contact with each other and the rider only by a set of pair driving reins. Thereafter, Mrs. Annis rode tandem, driving a single horse in front of her mount. She put on a very nice, smooth performance, working out one of the traditional ring pattern for this style of riding. In both styles, the rider has a total of six reins to hold, quite a fistful. They showed us how they should be held for best control. Both tandem and inverted unicorn riding, can easily result in havoc, with less expert horsemen or greener horses. However, here it went very smoothly, horses and riders clearly knowing what they were doing.

After the program ended, the crowd dispersed to visit the two stables and to see other Waseeka horses led out in hand in the indoor ring. With the final deluge, previously mentioned, we went home with the memory of a happy and interesting day to last us a long time.

Members of the Association who plan to go on the Foliage Ride and Drive, on October 5 and 6, are advised to make lodging arrangements now for that crowded weekend in South Woodstock. The Kedron Vallen Inn and Hyacinth House, both in South Woodstock, are the most convenient to the stables. which, covering a period of about eight years, brings the publication of registrations and transfers up to about the end of 1954. This volume is nearly twice the size of Volume VI covering the previous eight years, and is an indication of the progress of the breed in recent years.

The showing of Morgans, both in open shows and in strictly breed shows gained materially during the year. There was a constantly increasing number of shows offering Morgan classes. The local organizations are being very active in promoting a wider exhibition of Morgans in their areas and in some sections they have even attempted all breed shows. For instance, in the state of Washington where distances are great and numbers widely scattered two strictly breed shows have been held with very encouraging support.

The National Morgan Horse Show, of course, is the great Morgan show of the country. As a matter of fact, it is one of the outstanding all breed shows offered in this country. It is getting to be, perhaps, too large for convenient management, but considering our breed situation even ten years ago, it is amazing that over 270 of the outstanding Morgans in the Eastern third of the country could be assembled for such a Show. It is having and will continue to have in the future, a marked influence toward developing greater uniformity of type throughout the breed.

The motion pictures taken at these shows are widely distributed throughout the country, and the Morgan breeders and owners in other sections are avid to see these pictures in order to compare their own animals and those in their neighborhoods with what we consider to be the leading examples in the breed.

The Morgan Horse Magazine has become a valuable publicity medium for the breed and while we need a much greater subscription list, it is giving, due to its distribution, a better understanding of what the Morgan horse can and is doing.

publishing Volume VII amounted to over \$9,000. Selling this volume at \$20 per copy would require the sale of between 450 and 500 copies. To date we have sold 121. No doubt there are some of you that have delayed placing your order for this volume. We hope that everyone who can use it, will subscribe as this has the effect of decreasing the money we have tied up in it.

The profit received from the National Morgan Horse Show has become an important part of our income and it may be hoped that it will gradually increase in the future, although it cannot be expected to gain vastly under its present organization as a strictly breed show and held for convenience in this area which is not notably a horsey section so far as the general public is concerned.

The Morgan Horse Magazine has made notable strides in the last few years towards becoming at least selfsupporting, and it is to be hoped that this situation can be continued and gradually improve.

The problem of the Directors in establishing a breed office and engaging the necessary personnel will tax our means necessarily. Our present net income is not anywhere near sufficient to cover the necessary annual budget for that purpose but with what reserve we have, it should be possible to inaugurate this step in the expectation that the normal income could be increased from what it is now and that new sources of income can be developed.
