



Next year I plan to attend and with a Morgan.

I also would like to make a comment or two on the letter concerning the moving of the National Show to the Mid-west that appeared in the September issue. I personally don't believe that the show would be the success that it is in New England if it was moved to the Mid-west because having been stationed in this area for two and one-half years, I have found very few Morgan breeding farms let alone just a family or single person who owned one Morgan. This Midwest country is mostly Quarter horse and Appaloosa country. I also believe it would be an injustice to move the show from the homeland of "Old Justin" himself.

The show usually takes place during vacation time and I know that a lot of people center their vacation around the show time so that they can attend. I don't think that creates too much of a problem for Mid-westerners to attend the show if their vacation is at that time, or the Westerners either.

Possibly those in the extreme Western states could start a National show of their own in a centralized Western state because I again say, it seems unfair to move the show from New England where it was founded and also the Morgan horse itself was founded. Roots are roots.

The Editor's Comments

Although New England has aleady had its first snowfall and riding is not now the sport it was a couple of months ago, it is an excellent time to sit by the fire and think about it.

We don't mean riding in horse shows. We mean trail riding—riding not for exhibition purposes in best bib and tucker but riding for the fun of it. To the man or woman who says "I have no access to trails. I exercise my horse(s) in a nearby ring and the only chance I get to ride elsewhere is in a show,"—to that person these remarks are directed.

Trail riding, if you've never tried it, is more enjoyment than anything we know. It is relaxation, scenery, wood and field, streams to ford, logs to jump, tricky bridges to navigate. In short it is the be-all and end-all for keeping a horse.

In the west, well-fortified riding clubs have banded together and pushed through legislation which has provided state-created and maintained trails. These trails running up the west coast are things of beauty beyond even the imagination of the easterner. In that warm and beautiful country outdoor living hits the zenith and a group of riders and their pack animals may enjoy wonderful weekend trips or longer vacations.

Here, in the thickly-settled East, trail riding is more difficult. Save in Vermont and parts of New Hampshire and Maine there is little of it. However, Vermont, with its many backers, has really achieved something in the sport and the riding visitor is sure of great fun in picturesque country. The 100-mile trail ride and its attendant events makes Woodstock a mecca for the horseman annually.

But, as in the west, clubs banded together with a unity of purpose, can accomplish great things in other areas, the southern New England states, for instance.

Back in the early days of the depression we remember pleasant associations with executives of the Mass. Forest and Park Assn. With its secretary, Harris Reynolds, we drove and walked over a projected area which would provide a trail from the tip of Cape Cod to the Berkshires. In every section local horsemen were contacted—show people, hunt clubs and even the guy with a single horse who had penchant for ferreting out old roads. Topographical maps were studied and "fineline" roads were traced even though some were heavily brush grown.

A federal relief agency, providing a living in those barren times resulted in assignment of a young engineer to the task and he marked with white and yellow painted spots, the Cape-Berkshire trail. Considerable publicity was given the project; there were area committees and chairmen; hostelries were contacted and stabling arranged.

The result? To our knowledge not a single rider ever made the trip.

Why did this fail? Why is the 20-year-old trail all but abandoned? Lack of interest among people who never gave it a chance.

You horse owners, breeders, and riders in the New England states. Why are we so envious of the west, western initiative and accomplishment? Why be so envious when we have the same opportunities at hand.

Morgan people, here is an opportunity. Maybe this is not the trail. Maybe another is more desirable. But don't you think it would do a lot for the breed if Morgans were the first horses to be seen in bands all over our New England States? Morgans carrying people to new and in many cases, undreamed of enjoyment.

The Frank Orcutt I Knew

With the passing in July of Franklin H. Orcutt the Morgan world loses one of its oldest and staunchest supporters of the old type Vermont Morgan, a man that had it not been for his conviction and courage, many of the present day show winners would not have been conceived.

The Frank Orcutt, father of Dr. S. Robert Orcutt of Rowley, Mass., that I met twenty-five years ago and knew over this period was a man of the old school. There are few people in today's generation that will have what this man had and gave out in knowledge and advice to his many, many

friends and neighbors.

His grandfather and his father before him bred in the hills of West Burke area Morgans that not only had the finest blood obtainable, but Morgans who worked the back hill farms. Many a time I have seen Frank drive four of his "little creatures" as he called them, compared to his big work team, over his pasture spreading manure. I will never forget the year when I purchased Ethan Eldon, to head my Morgan farm from Frank. It was fair time in Lyndonville and he invited me to ride over the roads with him in a cut down Concord buggy with a four-in-hand. How those little horses responded to his soft words and the commands he gave them through

It was way back in the early turn of the century when Morgan breeders were looking for foundation stock to give to the government for the foundation of the farm in Weybridge that E. Fullerton Phillips came to Mr. Orcutt and explained the purpose and Frank presented him with one of his best young mares, Artemisia. Breeders throughout the world know that this mare alone did more for the government farm through her many outstanding sons than any other Morgan mare. Some outstanding sons were Mansfield, Canfield, Querido, Ulyssis and one of her most noted daughters was Redfern.


He raised the mare Allanda, who when bred to Ulyssis by his brother the late Dr. Wallace Orcutt, produced the stallion Ulendon, sire of more show winners than any other stallion in this line of breeding, in recent years.

Vigilda Burkland, a mare who has been a strong foundation horse both for Frank and Wallace Orcutt was sired by Vigilant and out of Lucinne, when bred to Ulendon she produced many outstanding horses, Orcland Gleam, Orcland Leader, Orcland Vigildon, Orcland Vigeneldon.

I recall just a few years ago going to East Burke and bringing Frank to my farm in Woodstock, where he looked over all of the mares and stallions, then the next day taking him to the National Show where retirement exercises were held for Vigelda Burkland. As we were leaving the grounds President Ted Davis thanked him for coming. I can hear Frank today, as he said to Ted and me, "See here now, you've got to breed the best to the best and keep the good ones here in Vermont." He loved his Morgans and he loved his state.

In looking over a crop of weanlings with me about ten years ago I was amused as he noticed a beautiful bay mare, Lippitt Royalton Nekomia. He began to laugh. Upon asking why he said, "she's a beauty and will give you some of your finest colts, but when you break her just use kid gloves, she's a hot headed one with a mind of her own." How true and how thankful I was for his advice.

Another time while visiting in Burke at fair time, Frank hooked up a three year old mare and a well grown yearling colt, the colt for the very first time. With help they were harnessed






Illinois State Fair

The 1960 Illinois State Fair held August 12th through 21st, was one of the most successful in its history on this 108th Anniversary Exposition. This stellar festival for years has been one of the most outstanding events of its kind in the nation. Fourteen hundred ninety-seven head of light horses and ponies were entered, all breeds. There were more Morgan entries than at any time previous, presenting a living picture of the progressive strides being made at the Illinois State Fair with the Morgan breed. E. L. Bailey of Buffao, New York, judged the 23 classes, including saddle, harness, breeding and Futurity classes.


Entries came from nine states, including two new and very welcome exhibitors from the state of Colorado. Mrs. Harry Nichoalds of Englewood

with the stallion, Broadwall Brigadier and Mr. Everett Reed of Denver with the stallion General Cotton, both took blue ribbons home with them.

The first Morgan class shown was the Ill. Morgan Horse Breeders' Weanling Filly Class, with 15 nice individuals. The lovely trophy presented by the Mississippi Valley Morgan Club and the blue ribbon were copped by the pretty bay filly Barette, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Edward Ryan of Irish Lane Farm, Delavan, Ill. Barette, by Chief Red Hawk out of Ella Bar, later won the Champion Weanling Futurity Class. Second and later Reserve Champion Weanling was another typy bay filly, Mr. and Mrs. Orwin Osman's Emerald's Nekomia. The Weanling Futurity Stallion Class was won by The Yankee, a son of Whippoorwill Duke and out of Jenney Lake, owned by Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Greenwalt of Pawnee, Ill. A flashy dark chestnut, white maned colt by Chief Red Hawk out of Gayneta, Indian War Chief was second for Mr. and Mrs. Neal Werts of St. Louis, Mo.

An excellent exhibition of 15 entries the Two-Year-Old Futurity Fine Harness Class was the largest and best since the Futurity was started in 1946. First place and the trophy presented by Mr. and Mrs. L. S. Greenwalt went to HyLee Farms' attractive chestnut mare, HyLee's Lady M.E.L. The Ohio entry of Paul Rumbaugh, the snappy going little mare, Foxy Sentora, was reserve in this class of fine two-year olds.

Justin Morgan Horse Association News

Dr. Alexander Ruthven. President Emeritus of the University of Michigan and well-known Morgan breeder told of his experiences with the breed at recent Justin Morgan Assn. meeting. Dr. Ruthven checks on the progress of Justin Geddes, one of many Morgans bred by him.

Every night this week the forecast has been for dropping temperatures; but on Thursday we took the weatherman seriously. Autumn is on its way. Fall in Michigan is hard to surpass for vibrant color, beautiful scenery, and a zip to the breeze that horse and horsemen enjoy. The zip, however, warns one to hurry up and get ready for winter's nip; but do enjoy these days, too, while you are at it.

Just like the song, "it's a long, long time from May to September," the Michigan Horse Show season has been a busy, but exciting schedule, from May at Mason to September in Jackson. Morgan horsemen can be proud of the oft heard statement from audiences that Morgans are better than ever. Each year we work for improvement in the breed and performance classes, and often feel we may have reached the ultimate. For example what could surpass those classes of this year! Yet each new season introduces a Morgan newcomer or returns a time-honored performer to the show ring that seems to excel beyond earlier expectations. This means, of course, that our breed is not standing still, nor losing ground, but gaining strength, quality and more suporters each year. Judges have said some very encouraging words in regard to horses shown in the state; they have made some critical suggestions as well. It is interesting that judges have been especially impressed by our "young stock;" and the show results concluding the column reflect their placings as they saw them.

Few individuals have made a greater contribution toward perpetuating and improving the breed in Michigan than Dr. Alexander Ruthven, President Emeritus, University of Michigan, and owner of Stanarigg Morgan Horse Farm in Ann Arbor. It was a great pleasure to have him speak at the last meeting of the Justin Morgan Horse Assn. He was cordially introduced by Ray LaBounty, who pointed out that our Morgans owe much to Dr. Ruthven and his foundation sire, Lippitt Moro Ash. The get of "Lip" over the years are almost too numerous to mention here, and so well-known that they continually find themselves represented within the pages of this journal as a result of their own accomplishments. Lippitt Moro Ash has been the sire of many fine stallions, and undeniably his daughters have consistently been great producers. The offspring of Stanarigg Farm are known throughout the United States; the males usually have the suffix "Geddes" attached to their names, while the females are prefixed with Ruthver's — Ann. We suggest your Morgan Horse Registry and past issues of the Magazine for

complete listings.

In answer to the question, "How, Dr. Ruthven, did you become interested in the Morgan Horse?", our speaker responded the following:

"As a young chap I was raised in Western Iowa and Nebraska. We saw many good horses, but when the Federal Governent opened many of the Indian Reservation lands, the covered wagons again began to roll in. Very often these wagons and their pioneer settlers came from the New England States to the West. As a boy I was impressed by their teams of Morgan Horses and my father explained how they were different from the Shires, Clydes, and other breeds we saw more commonly. Even from distances their form and manner were easily distinguished.

The years passed and in 1925 I came to the University of Michigan to act as curator and collector for the University Museum, and to accept the post of professor. My responsibilities took me on many trips, often to isolated places in the world, places where pack trains on horse or mule back were the only acceptable means of traveling. In 1928 the Board of Regents asked me to become the president of the University and in 1929 I accepted the position referred to on a year to year basis. This

arrangement proved most satisfying for over 22 years. (Writer's note: Dr. Ruthven provided the leadership necessary to consolidate the growing facilities of the University during its most challenging period of accomplishments. A part listing of these accomplishments would include the establishment of the great University Medical Hospital and Medical Center; the Rackham School of Graduate Studies; the difficult management of problems and their solutions before, during and after the war years and the establishment of the Atomic Phoenix Project for Peacetime Use of Nuclear Energy. All these things he did with a humble spirit and a simplicity of words. We who know him feel privileged, indeed.)

Now no more trips or expeditions seemed possible, as the Board of Regents expressed concern for having to fill the job of the Office of President, not necessarily for my personal safety! Because of my earlier interest in Morgans and my professional pursuits as an anthropologist and collector, I sought a new project. From New Hampshire I sent for two mares which were eligible, but not yet registered in the Morgan Horse Registry. These two mares were Ruthven's Mary Ann and Ruthven's Polly Ann. From the Green Mountain Farm of Robert Knight in Vermont we brought Lippitt Moro Ash as a colt. After a fashion we brought the first Morgans to Michigan. I say, after a fashion, because we know there to have been Morgans here much earlier. During the lumbering era in Michigan, the records show many Morgans particularly around Bay City, Muskegon, and Manistee. Some records indicate that fine Morgan driving teams were brought by the lumber barons for their girl friends! These disappeared, however, as pure bred individuals. I wanted to have some registered Morgans in our state. Not long after I established Stanarigg Farm I met and hired a young man by the name of James R. Talley, known to

you as Tex Talley. Tex has been my farm manager for over 22 years and this has been a fine arrangement.

Many people came to tell me of Morgan type animals that they knew of, especially in the Ann Arbor area. One elderly man had two such horses, which he brought from New Hampshire. I went to visit him, and though never broken and quite aged, the fact that they were of Morgan ancestry was stamped plainly on them. Many changes have taken place since then.

In fact there have been many changes since the early horse in North America. The first was a small quadraped with five toes. Through thousands of years he lost the two outer toes and had three toes remaining. Somewhere along the way he developed a middle toe with two little hooves hanging outside of it and finally, he became a horse standing on a single middle toe. We know that these horses moved to Asia (probably over a land bridge that once existed from Alaska to Siberia) and then along to Europe with the camels, only to absolutely disappear in North America. In Europe and Asia horses developed into many varieties. There is much confusion still about the origin of the different breeds. Where did the Arab come from? Probably not from Egypt or Arabia, since it was not known there until about 1300 years ago. It might best be said to be an offspring of an even earlier Persian horse. What is the origin of other modern horse breeds? Was Darwin right when he claimed that breeds or species developed by natural selection due to living in certain environments or areas? Or is it true that breeds are developed as needed and required by the origination of animal breeders? These things are not true. A new species appears spontaneously. We have a cow or a pig develop and start a new species. These suddenly appear just as Justin Morgan did. Ancestry is a waste of words and print in regard to Justin Morgan. Justin Morgan had

no ancestry. He was something NEW. Biologists have long recognized the importance of a mutation. They do not always understand why or how this took place. The point is that it did take place; this accident of genetics happened to the dam of Justin Morgan and his kind will last as long as we want to have them last.

In the horse business the Spanish have tried to develop Palomino types which would consistently breed true. It cannot be done, because the required "accident" to the genes has not taken place, and no new species has been formed. Years ago some short legged sheep appeared that bred true. For a while these were popularly bred, especially in the East, where this type sheep could not scramble over the low stone pasture walls. Later the species was lost because no one cared to perpetuate it.

My interest in Morgans is two-fold, as a biological phenomenon and as a horse lover. There are many present day breeding problems to solve. We need more cooperation among ourselves in breeding programs so we may try out various crosses, still permitting the developing of horses specialized to do certain jobs, but stamped with the image of the breed.

In the question and conversation period that followed, Dr. Ruthven elaborated upon the fact that Cortez did bring or reintroduce the horse to North America during his period of exploration and conquest in Mexico. There are some very good indicators that Cortez may have used the island of Puerto Rico as a stud farm, and that he used few stallions, if any, on the mainland, as they were hard to handle and sometimes inconveniently noisy.

Dr. Ruthven did not attach much significance to differences in the number of vertebra in the lumbar region of the Morgan or to the notion that because Arabian horses often claim one less vertebra, as do some Morgans, that

Eastern States Exposition

The Eastern States Exposition Horse Show again brought out a good entry of Morgans, and except for the under 15 hand class the classes were well filled. For the first time since the show has been an Amateur Show, two of the Morgan classes were open to professionals - the Championship Saddle Class and a preliminary Open Class. It was the general feeling among the Morgan exhibitors that opening the over and under classes would have drawn an even larger entry. Also, I missed the harness class - I think it adds greatly to any show. I would love to see this become one of the top Morgan shows in the East - there is a tremendous gate at the Exposition and the Coliseum is nearly always full for each performance. The judges were Christopher Wadsworth of Holicong, Pa. and Ed. Stalcup of Franklin, Tenn

The Morgan Championship Saddle Stake was held for the first time in the evening with six entries vying for the four colored ribbon. Waseeka's Nocturne with Johnny Lydon up — winner of the Open class — came out on top closely followed in Reserve by Joseph Hoyt's Rafinesque with Whitey Fenton up.

The Amateur Stake on Saturday found ten entries competing for top honors. June Brockett gave Orcland "Ike" a good ride to capture the Championship over Green Meads Marauder in the Reserve spot.

Again proving their ability to compete against Saddle horses in pleasure classes, Morgans captured first, second and fifth in the N.E.H.C. Open Pleasure Class. First went to Broadwall Golden Boy owned by the Briarwood Stable, second to Dr. Robert Orcutt's Vigilendon and fifth to the Blue Spruce Farm's Katinka Hawk.

On Sunday morning more than 20 young Morgans turned out for the Breeding Divisions. The classes were for those animals three and under divided between fillies and studs with a champion named in both, those winners competing for Grand Champion.

This year they dispensed with the allbreed championships. This division was judged by Dr. Ray Fessenden of Athol, Mass., a long time Morgan enthusiast. For Champion Stallion 3 and under, Dr. Fessenden pinned Darwin Morse's Green Meads Marauder on top with Steve Tompkins' Bar-T-In-truder in Reserve. Champion filly 3 and under went to Waseeka Farm's Waseeka's Party Doll with Reserve to Lippitt Ethan Georgia of the Green Mountain Stock Farm. After careful deliberation, Dr. Fessenden chose the two fillies for his Grand Champion and Reserve. They were good wins for the fillies as both Marauder and Intruder are handsome, typey colts. I think it is fitting to mention here that this is the third of Upwey Benn Quietude's colts to win the Morgan Colt Championship at Eastern States. Party Doll was preceded by Waseeka's Nocturne in 1956 and Waseeka's Thisizit in 1957 — all three are by different stallions. It speaks well for the produce of this grand mare.


Also, how certain conformation points are looked for in relation to the type of work wanted from the horse.

ger shows, bigger honors.

The pictures from these shows, from year to year, show how they've improved. The improvement in horses, tack, and the way the horses are handled, is evident. We learn as we go along. That judge looked for and found dirt I'd missed - and knocked the best looking pony down to fifth place because of it. I was so ashamed. Now, I know how to clean a horse for a show. That's learning the hard way, huh?

We were delighted to hear that Charlie Hamilton was worth seeing, in the cutting classes, at Estes Park. Sure sorry we missed that show, and missed meeting the friendly folks there.

A Justin Morgan commemorative stamp? Hooray! Wonderful idea. Good luck, stamp committee.

Don'tcha love those four cent pony express stamps. Horse show fliers and saddle club announcements arrive here with that stamp on. Methinks it very clever of the horse club secretaries to stock up on those stamps. I'll stockpile some stamps, too, when that Justin Morgan stamp is a reality.



WINDCREST DONA LEE DOES IT AGAIN!



Mid-America Morgan News

A wonderful summer has drawn to a close. Show equipment has been cleaned and stored away, horses are being let down after a hard and busy season. More and more people are taking to the trails, the fall season is beautiful here, and the weather perfect for these rides.

As I look out our south window, I cannot help but smile, for things have really taken a switch about! Not too many years ago, the "old timers" were sadly shaking their heads as they watched more and more horseless carriages chugging and snorting their way into the lives of American families. Vermont passed a law forbidding anyone to drive a car on a public road unless a man walked several hundred feet ahead to give warning. Colorado went even further, flares were sent up from the "motor wagons" every so often so that old dobbin wouldn't bolt when she came face to face with so fearful an object. When President Theodore Roosevelt rode in an auto through the streets of Washington, D. C., a horse-drawn carriage followed in case of a breakdown of the car. Slowly but certainly the "machine" caught on, and "Dobbins" stall was converted into a garage for the flivver. Now we come to the part that amuses me so greatly. Now with only a very few shows left in the 1960 season, all of the Morgan horse owners in this part of the country are sitting down to evaluate their horses in the light of the last show season. Some are pleased with the outcomes, some are not, but we all are pleased with the general showing of Morgans in the Northwest. Today our Morgans compare with the best anywhere in the United States and the Northwest is recognized as a place to go to get the very best Morgans.

This year the Southeastern Washington Fair Horse Show was bigger than ever, with almost 400 horses entered. Rockfield was again chosen as Grand Champion and Shawalla Tabie was Grand Champion mare. Both these animals are owned by the Shawalla Morgan Horse Ranch. The day that this fair was over the Shaws loaded these two horses up and headed for Salem, Oregon and the Oregon State Fair. Here Rockfield repeated his performance by winning Grand Champion Stallion. Shawalla Tabie won first place in a very large yearling filly class and gave the older horses a run for their money in the Grand Champion mare class. Rockfield and Shawalla Tabie are only two of the great horses sired by the Shaws' sire, Silver Rockwood. As a young horse "Rocky" proved himself to be one of the greatest roping and pick up horses in the Montana and Dakota area. Cowboys would

drive hundreds of miles to be able to use him in the Rodeos. Rocky also excelled as a parade horse, having even paraded in the Pasadena Rose Parade. Even today he is saddled once a year for the Frontier Days Parade in Walla Walla, where he always wins Grand Champion parade horse. Today, though, his work is to keep on siring great horses here in the Northwest. The get of Silver Rockwood are making names for themselves as mountain horses in Alaska, show horses in California, cattle horses in Idaho and as pioneers in the Morgan business in Canada. Wherever vou go, when you hear the name of a horse with Shawalla in it you can be sure that the blood of the great Silver Rockwood runs in its veins.

RED TOP FARM NEWS

It has been a busy winter at Red Top and it has been hard to keep up with the schedule, now the winter is gone, no need to worry about it any more. Elementary Equitation . . . HORSEMASTERSHIP

By FRED NORRIS.

PART I

(Editor's Note-Here's the first of a series of articles on Equitation, or Horsemastership by Fred Norris, of Ahland, Ky. He is a widely known judge, trainer and instructor - author of the rider training text "Elementary Equitation - Horsemastership" which enjoys worldwide recognition. Miss lane Hartmeyer, nationally known exhibitor and Director of Horsemanship, Ball State Teachers College, Muncia, Ind., writes: "I've read many books on the subject but find this one is by far the best. It gives the students concise definitions and simple explanations of equitation." The articles are designed to aid adults as well as juniors in their show or pleasure riding. We hope you will like it.)

Equitation might be defined as a rider's demonstration of a more or less thorough knowledge of the Science of Good Riding. This implies an understanding of the effects and uses of the Natural Aids and the rider's ability to apply them in ways which put the horse in the position of complying with the rider's will. In a showring equitation class the human factor is being weighed—that is, the rider's mental and physical assets are being judged.

Proper equitation teaches the rider to establish and maintain a correct, secure and comfortable seat in the saddle. It develops soft hands in accomplishing the various functions of the reins as a natural aid; proper use of the rider's weight (posture) as another natural aid; controlled position and use of the legs as the third natural aid. The term 'leg' generally means the heel or calf and sometimes the thigh. Artificial aids are the whip or spur.

The Science of Equitation is a language expressed by the rider through these aids (and a calm, low voice) to which the horse can reply by willingly, obediently placing himself in the desired position or gait as his trained memory interprets the various effects of the aids. The rider must be ever mindful that a horse's mental faculties are limited — that he responds to the indications given him by associating

them with past reward or punishment—the intelligent horse will soon learn to associate obedience with a calm caress. The horse is a grand imitator and in his eccentric way will sort out the good things to do to gain good reward. When punishment is needed it must be immediate and never become abusive. The rider must realize a need for calmness, patience, kindness, firmness and an ever-increasing "know how."

In showring parlance the term "equitation" implies horsemanship classes for junior riders in the 14-or under and the over-14-under-18 age divisions. However, a thorough working knowledge of the subject is beneficial to all ages and all types of riding—English or flat saddle, western or stock saddle, or hunter or jumper seat.

A cardinal fact for every rider to keep constantly in mind is that the portion of the horse in front of his shoulders is his Balancer. All movements of the animal, all changes of gaits or speeds, are dependent on the controlled freedom of the head and neck. At rest, the center of gravity is near the horse's shoulders, or at the girth. As it is advanced the hind quarters begin their duty of propulsion, the fore quarters providing movement and direction. To move, the horse must displace his weight to the shoulders. The neck is the necessary lever used by the horse to gain and facilitate movement. To move forward he must stretch his neck and lower his head to advance his center of gravity. Often you see the novice rider rear back on the reins as he yells "giddap" — and then bawl because the horse doesn't move. Obviously he can't. Just as there must be descent of head and neck to set the horse in motion there will be a corresponding lift of the head and neck to decrease speed or to halt. This will be treated further in a discussion of equilibrium and other factors.

If the neck is raised too much the shoulders will be freer but his loin and whole rear system will be cramped, his gait becoming jerky with a loss of speed and regularity. If the neck is too low the fore quarters will be over-

weighted, making guiding difficult and developing a lumbering gait in front. when the head and neck are properly placed and enjoy a reasonable controlled freedom the smooth action of fore and hind quarters will be coordinated into fine performance. Head movement will be at the poll.

Study your horse to determine whether he carries a high or low neck. Never ask him to assume an un-natural position. The master rider, by means of the bit, places the horse's head and neck in positions that regulate movement. In order not to shut off his breathing his head should be permitted to slope upward and backward from muzzle to earline — that is, keep his face slightly back of the vertical plane. At the extended gallop the nose will be advanced; at the collected canter the chin may be tucked in slightly; at the trot the face will approach the vertical.

Soft hands are essential to good riding. The reins should always maintain contact between the hands and mouth but never stretched taut except in emergency and then only until obedience is attained. The "loose rein" does not mean a swinging or floating rein which is an invitation for the horse to take off. Soft hands will afford a long rein at the walk, will remain still at the trot and 'go with the horse' at the canter.

These introductory remarks are discussed at length in my book, Elementary Equitation-Horsemastership, described in advertising elsewhere in this issue.

Reins have five classifications according to their uses and effects. The three ordinary reins for casual riding are the (1) leading or opening rein; (2) the bearing or neck rein, and (3) the direct or backing and halting rein. For advanced equitation there is (4) the indirect rein of opposition in front of the withers, and (5) the indirect rein of opposition back of the withers. All will be discussed in the next chapter. As the show season hustles through its closing weeks, the Fall show at Camden turned out to be one of the most interesting shows on the circuit. Due to the illness of the scheduled judge, Charles Barrie, the Morgan classes were judged by Mr. George Hudson. His method of judging caused some scrambling amongst the exhibitors and the majority of them quickly discovered that Morgans were going

to be expected to show as they should be shown in the ring. Each class was worked at each gait for a good period of time and the Morgans which won the judge's favor were the ones who could go on at a good square balanced trot and when asked to walk, could do so flat-footed without a show horse prance. The canter, too, was a good test as it was kept up long enough to test the much-touted endurance of the breed. In each class some horses were lined up hot and blowing, but the winners came through in fine shape.

The winner of the Morgan Stake was a little New York State stallion, U. C. High Life, owned by Nancy Gochee of Rome, N. Y. Shown by Jerry Kipp, he made a good show to take the ten entry stake with a high fast trot, looking good all the way. The Third Man, owned by Jo Costantino and shown by Anne Clifford, and Talisman, owned and shown by Ayelien Richards, both geldings by Lippitt Mandate, were popular ribbon winners taking first and second respectively in both the Stallion, Gelding and the Morgan Pleasure Classes. Mrs. Everett Crosby of Wappinger Falls, N. Y., had a good entry in her mare, Spring Hope, another Morgan that looks like she should and performed accordingly, winning both Mares Under Saddle and In Hand.

Another highlight of the show was the Command Class, judged as a "break and out" class. What a thrill it was to see that class boil down into a friendly duel between two Morgan stallions, both trained and ridden by young women from the Mid-Atlantic Club. As the rest of the already-disqualified riders watched (mounted on every popular breed), these two stallions put on a show that could surely make it obvious that Morgan stamina and willingness, coupled with expert handling and riding, were an unbeat-able combination. The class was fin-ally ended as one horse cross-cantered after reversing at a canter. The applause was spontaneous and appreciative when Helene Zimmerman (a winner in this class in other years on her popular Arrow Hawk) rode Dr. and Mrs. Robert Dreisbach's four-year-old Towne-Ayr Bobolink up for the trophy, followed by Ann Hopkins on the popular campaigner of many years, Manito.

This writer found the classes very enjoyable and fun, for although we were expected to show these horses with good manners and mouths emphasized - the judge obviously wanted a

they are related. "Even people may have one less vertebra, and some ani-mals constantly vary. In the Morgan horse I have seen some that have one less vertebra and some that do not. The factor does not relate to the shortness of the back, per se."

A story favorite with us was related that evening when our speaker told of the time Robert Frost, America's great poet, was visiting and lecturing in Ann Arbor. The two men were life-long friends and the story goes that one night as they were preparing to leave Dr. Ruthven's home and go to the auditorium where Frost was to read his own poems, Frost asked to borrow a volume of Dr. Ruthven's as he had neglected to bring his own. Of course to accommodate his friend, he sought

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the wanted copy from the shelf and turned it over to him. That evening before the assembled audience, Robert Frost said he would read his first selection from the "Morgan Horse Edition" of his poems, in honor of his friend, Dr. Ruthven. Later two English professors rushed up to Dr. Ruthven to inquire about obtaining copies of this new edition, but with a smile, the president had to inform them that there was only one copy of that edition, his own, and to this day it is so in-scribed. If you have not read it recently, this is the time of year to read again Robert Frost's fine tribute to a Morgan colt in the poem called, "The Runaway." We thank you, Dr. Ruthven, for a wonderfully congenial even-
