Will you please publish our apologies to Mr. Gerald Taft and his late stallion, Springbrook Joe Kelly. Our Waseeka Farm advertisement (July, 1960, page 27), states that Windcrest Donfield defeated every Morgan which ever competed against him in model and performance classes. This statement should have said: "all but ONE." The one was Springbrook Joe Kelly, who placed first in the class for yearling stallions at the National Morgan Horse Show in 1952. Windcrest Donfield, then owned by Mr. and Mrs. J. Loyd Marks, placed second in that class. Springbrook Joe Kelly went on to win the award for Junior Champion Stallion. Mr. Taft and the Morgan world lost a great young horse when Joe Kelly was fatally injured by an automobile the following December 27th. He was only twenty months old when he died.

I am responsible for making up our ads and I would appreciate any space you can give to correcting my mistake. I am extremely proud of Donfield's record and I do not wish to claim any honors for him which are not rightfully his. However, I have not been able to discover any Morgan except Springbrook Joe Kelly which can claim this distinction.

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First Aid For Founder

Founder or to be more specific, laminitis, is an inflammation of the sensitive laminae. The sensitive laminae are the tissues surrounding the coffin bone (Fig. 1) and are encased by the hoof. The disease is characterized by the general phenomenon associated with inflammations of the skin and mucous membranes. It produces no constitutional disturbances except those dependent on the local disease and has a strong tendency in severe cases to destructive organization of the tissues affected.

The condition is primarily a non-infectious inflammation of the sensitive laminae, frequently affecting the fore feet.² Often all four feet are affected and less frequently one foot. Inflammation in one foot, occurs usually, when its opposite is unable to sustain weight. Rarely are the hind feet alone involved.

OCCURRENCE

This disease often occurs in the presence of digestive disturbances, with impaction of the cecum and great colon a contributing cause. It is interesting to note that Aristotle (382-322 B.C.) observed that overfeeding with barley resulted in founder or laminitis.³ Overloading of the digestive tract with large quantities of wheat, barley or oats in an animal unaccustomed to this diet, almost always results in founder. The common term "founder" has thus come into use because of its frequent association with digestive disorders.

In the past when draft horses were in vogue, a great many cases of founder occurred in horses worked on heavy transfer wagons, when in a state of perspiration and warmed up good, were allowed to stand exposed to sudden lowering of temperature, especially cool or cold rain. With the disappearance of the horse from the transportation scene, founder due to the preceding causes, has not been a problem to the veterinarian in recent years.

Hard driving of horses, especially if unshod or on rough roads, is often followed by this condition. Horses also suffer a few hours after shoes have been reset, however this is usually temporary, with no lasting effects.

Consumption of large amounts of

cold water by overheated animals contributes greatly to the disease.

Age in no way influences the occurrence of founder. The general condition of the animal with regard to vigor and state of flesh has no apparent effect in pre-disposition of horses toward this ailment. Species or breed per se play no role in its occurrence.

PREDISPOSITION

Regardless of the actual cause of founder, many horses by the nature of their physical makeup, easily succumb to this disease. Horses with small feet in proportion to body weight and size, are forced to withstand more stress and strain than this type of foot was meant to be subjected to. Flat soles are often associated with small feet, aside from being undesirable, they contribute readily to the "dropped" sole associated with chronic founder. A narrow heel and a narrow foot go hand-in-hand in predisposition to founder.

It is interesting to observe that horses with small feet and flat soles are more often than not of a type that exhibits an overly large body in proportion to the feet and limbs. On top of this,

many of these individuals are pushed hard on heavy concentrations of grain and invariably have too little exercise to go with it.

Heredity plays a role in that it is through this process that conformation defects are passed down. It is these defects of conformation that present a prime situation for founder to step in and take over. Perhaps this might serve as a word of caution to breeders of certain family lines because they feel factors other than sound hoof conformation influence their decisions.

ACUTE FOUNDER

Acute founder is ushered in suddenly, with the animal stiff and sore in the feet and standing as though "riveted" to the ground. If forced to move, evidence of extreme pain is observed, but these symptoms generally subside to some extent after the horse has gone a short distance, only to return more severely than ever if the horse is allowed to stand for a short time.

Body temperature may reach 106 degrees F., but generally ranges from 102.5 degrees F. to 105 degrees F. Mucous membranes are congested and nostrils are dilated, with an anxious expression to the face. There is a tendency for diarrhea to occur early, loss of appetite and increased thirst. Many will break out in a sweat and these cases will exhibit symptoms of labored respiration.

If the disease is confined to the fore feet, then the hind feet are placed well under the center of the body to support weight and the fore feet are advanced

New England News

Your new correspondent will be taking over the column with the September issue. She is Mrs. Donald Chevalier of Harwington, Connecticut. I hope that all of you will give her the support that you have given me, and that we will continue to keep abreast of your many Morgan activities throughout the year. Thanks again to all of you for your interest, and the time, that you took in sending me your news.

VERMONT

We have a foal report, quite extensive as a matter of fact from the Green Mountain Stock Farm in Randolph, Vt. First, a stud foal by Easter Twilight out of Miss Tweedie; Second, a stud foal by Lippitt Ethan Ashbrook out of Lippitt Georgia; Third, a filly foal by Lippitt Moro Alert out of Lippitt Victoria; Fourth, a filly foal by Lippitt Selsie out of Lippitt Spearment, and Fifth, a stud foal by Lippitt Moro Alert out of Lippitt Roselda: Lippitt Sally Moro and Lippitt Dream Girl were due to foal in June. (Probably have by now although we haven't heard). They have a good record so far, namely, three studs and three fillies.

Jumping to Meeting Waters Farm owned by Frances Bryant we learn of the new stud colts. One by Lippitt Ashmore out of Luselect, another by Lippitt Ashmore and out of Spring Darling. Jubilee's Amber has also dropped a stud colt by Ashmore.

A filly at Wales Farm foaled on June 5th out of Lippitt Romance and by Wales Farm Major Bet. Two more foals are expected up there soon.

Fillies seem to be coming fast and furious at Dana Wingate Kelley's Justine Morgan Horse Farm in Woodstock. For out of four mares to foal so far, three are fillies. Mr. Kelley says that after 25 years of breeding Morgans, one of the greatest joys in raising them is to see one of the lovely

Royalton mares come over the hill of his top pasture with a new born foal. Also that it is unexplainable but during the season when the moon gets close to full you can generally expect a foal if the mare's time is within that week. On June 2nd, one of the Royalton mares was due, on that date the new moon started to form, on June 7th it was full and the following morning when Mr. Kelley looked up in the top pasture, sure enough, Royalton Jody, a lovely dark chestnut daughter of Ethan Eldon came trotting down the mountain beside her dam. Ethan is again taking bows this year, eight of his daughters have foaled from Vermont to Florida and only one has had a stud colt. All during his 22 years of breeding he has been noted for producing more fillies than studs and it seems as though his daughters are copying "the ole man."

One of the proudest Morgan breeders in the St. Johnsbury area is Albion Danforth, over a yearling dark chestnut filly out of his Ann D., a full sister to his well known show mare Joan D. This filly has been named Pixie D. and she is acclaimed by Morgan breeders to be one of the finest true type Morgan colts in the state. She is sired by Ethan Eldon. Her dam is now due to foal again to Ethan, and Mr. Danforth says that if the foal is half as nice as Pixie he will be very happy. Mr. Danforth says he won't sell her unless he receives the same price paid for Belly Ache, the race horse that is worth a million and a quarter.

Mr. William Meany of Sharon, Vt., has purchased from Howard Simpson of St. Johnsbury a very nice chestnut yearling stud colt sired by Ethan Eldon and out of Dukes Diamond. Mr. Charles Land of Lyndonville has a nice chestnut colt sired by Ethan Eldon and out of his mare Bobby Sox. Over in Quechee, Mr. Bert Wheeler has a lovely filly sired by Royalton Ashbrook Darling.

Mr. Harrison Miles has bred his good producing mare Lippitt Sandra to Mr. Kelly's senior stallion Ethan Eldon. A daughter of Sandra, Trilbrook Phelena, sired by one of Mr. Miles stallions has also been bred to Ethan Eldon and sold to a party in Maine.

Royalton Elnora, a daughter of Ethan Eldon and Lippitt Nora owned by the Justine Morgan Horse Farm in Wood-

stock has one of the choicest fillies in the area; a rich dark bay, sired by Royalton Ashbrook Darling. She has been named Royalton Mylissa and her stable name is "Little Missie."

NEW HAMPSHIRE

The University of New Hampshire Riding Club has been extremely active this year. There have been numerous trail rides throughout the year for members, the last of which was an after supper ride held in May. These rides have proved to be both successful and popular. The drill team has not as yet given any exhibitions due to poor riding conditions, but when spring arrived practices were resumed, and as a result they hope to perform in the fall.

As they did not hold their bi-annual horse show last spring, they lent their ring to the Rockingham Riding Club for their horse show. This had an advantage as they were able to show the University Morgans, and they won 17 ribbons and 4 trophies. They showed the versatility of the Morgan by being pinned in Model, Open and Championship Morgan, Trail and Pleasure Classes, Pair classes and Working Hunter Hack.

As I mentioned last month, the University has two new foals this year, both by Orcland Leader, and out of Trudy and Maystar. They have tentatively been named "Bright Vision" and "Star Leader".

The University expects two nice foals from this good stallion out of UNH Maydream and UNH Maystar next spring. College Vicki and her daughter UNH Queen Elizabeth are both at the University of Vermont being bred (I believe to Cantor but we are not sure of this), and the Silkolene mare will be bred to Orcland Farms grand old stallion Ulendon.

The Central States Club Play Day, scheduled for May 29th, was rained out and the following Sunday being the day of our first Morgan class of the season at the Fox Valley Saddle Club Show, Elgin, Ill., we had to back our rain date to June 5th. The weather man was nice all during the week previous to this Sunday and then Saturday night, he frowned on us and for awhile it was nip and tuck as to whether we would have a Play Day at all. However, the ground being quite dry, the water was absorbed in a hurry and after Larry Oakley spent the early Sunday morning hours conditioning the Ring at Caven-Glo, the Play Day got underway with a Grand Entry and our National Anthem.

There were just four riders in our riding unit who had complete outfits, minus hats (those grey hats are really giving us a fit) — Ron Hayward, our genial President, was the only one who could display the outfit complete. However, all four riders appeared, three minus hats just to show the members and spectators how showy these uniforms look — crimson shirts, grey pants, scarfs and hats and some of the riders even had red boots! As a result, we sold some more Club patches and are promised more riders for the unit in the future. By 1961, this riding unit should be pretty well established.

The Play Day Show opened with Morgan Halter classes this year instead of the Parade of Morgans and our Historian, Miss Dorothy Colburn covered this phase of the Play Day, as yours truly was at the microphone — her comments are as follows:

"While the primary object of our Play Days is just to get together and have some fun, those who exhibit their horses (and incidentally themselves) manage to get quite a liberal education while having their fun. They learn showmanship and sometimes horsemanship and even sportsmanship which will stand them in good stead when they take their horses to a larger show. But we feel that our audience has a right to a little education, too, so each year we include an event which will send this audience home when the show

is over, happily mulling over some new knowledge.

"Last year Cavendish, boss of Caven-Glo Farm, gave a demonstration of versatility, showing the wide range of his accomplishments.

"This year a set of Morgan halter classes was shown — no judging, just an exhibition. A microphone in the ring enabled Eve Oakley and Bob Glenn to make a running commentary during the whole event. Mrs. Oakley spoke from the standpoint of the breeder, and Mr. Glenn from that of the owner, exhibitor or potential purchaser of Morgans. They explained the reasons for Halter classes, what to look for when judging them and pointed out the qualities of the individual horses. And before, between and around their comments, Dorothy Colburn managed to sandwich in some remarks, filched from a number of authorities, on the history of the breed.

"In the stallion class we saw the pretty yearling, Legend of Caven-Glo, the two-year-old Dorian Ashmore, Dorian's full brother, three year old Dwight Ashmore and Rhythm's Bimbo, five years, Bimbo's deep bay standing out like rich mahogany in a field of chestnuts.

"The mare class included Jubilee's Gloria, Justa Trinket, Caven-Glo's Sunseri, Libby Ashmore, Cherokee Lady and Caven Glo's Rebel Gold. The last three, all mothers for the first time this spring, deplored the necessity for leaving their babies on the far side of the fence and expressed their feelings to the audience according to their various temperaments. This class presented more variety in color for though we were still knee-deep in chestnuts, Justa Trinket is coal black, Cherokee Lady is a beautiful bay and Libby Ashmore, while chestnut, is a very dark liver shade. Another small miss — Windom Way — included in this class, is also a very dark liver chestnut.

"After the mares, came the geldings and a pretty picture they made — four of them — the Glenn's bay Town-Ayr Twig and Town-Ayr Sprig and the two chestnut half-brothers, Prince Justin, owned by Caven-Glo Farm and Caven-Glo Sun Sand, owned by Nancy Collins.

"And then the 'Get of Sire' class, which must have been especially interesting to the on-lookers since they saw a golden chestnut stallion with his golden chestnut sons and daughters ranging in age from a few weeks to about seven years. Unfortunately this area does not yet have many Morgan stallions old enough to have families, so our friend Cavendish and his children were the only ones in the ring. However, they managed to fill the ring — and the eye — beautifully. Cavendish stood out in front, occasionally rolling a prideful eye at his progeny lined up behind him. First in line his 1960 son, as yet unnamed and cute as a button. Then, Legend of Caven-Glo, looking down his nose at the youngster from the height of his full twelve months. Then Caven-Glo Rebel Gold, Prince Justin and Caven-Glo Sun Sand, the last two are geldings.

"Last we saw the 'Produce of Dam' class with Jubilee's Gloria displaying her three handsome children, the two year old mare, Caven-Glo Sunseri, by Verran's Laddie, and the other two — Legend of Caven-Glo, a yearling stallion and Caven-Glo Rebel Gold, a four year old mare by Cavendish.

"All this while, our commentators were busy with their microphones, explaining the various classes and the points to look for, depending on whether you are a breeder or a rider. If our audience did not go home with a broader understanding of Morgan horses and of horse-show classes, I'll be very much surprised."

Speaking of Morgan geldings — the Mid-Atlantic Club doesn't have a monopoly on good ones — this Central States Club is rapidly acquiring quite an outstanding number of good ones and is busily promoting more of them. We hope to have regular classes for geldings in the near future.

The run-down of classes and winners will be listed under our show section.

Due to the change in dates, only about half of the usual number of Juniors were present, as many of them were involved in school and graduation projects on this day. However, without them we still had a nice turnout of good horses and many more Morgans were noticeable this year. It seems that with the passing of each year a few more Morgans, and good ones, are added to our ranks. This year for the first time, we were able to have both a Morgan English Pleasure class

Third was the 3 year old stud, Royalton Lee Allen, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Cook of Middleport. The club wishes to thank both Dr. Bachman and Capt. Gates, neither of whom is a member of the New York Club, for their friendly cooperation.

The four adult mares Dr. Parks placed as follows: 1st, Ledgewood Laurel, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Taylor, Medina, 2nd, R. R. Rusty Nan, Mrs. Carole Clyne, Lockport. Nan is only a 3 year old, but is extremely well developed. 3rd, Tibby Corbin, Mr. and Mrs. DeVerne Willey, Kennedy; 4th, Arnona Chere "O", Mrs. Mary Arnold, Kanona. In Dr. Parks opinion, the first and second mares could have been reversed — his personal preference, however, was for Laurie.

Several casualties cut down the entry of yearling fillies. The Harold Karstedt filly, Birchstone Muffit (Tibson-Miller's Glory) was wire cut a few days before the showing. And the Vincent Rogers' Summer Dove (Sherimill Sunrise - Arnona Elizabeth) came down with a touch of colic that morning. Mollie Dobbins rushed her Aurora Sunbeam (Sherimill Sunrise - Square Suzanne) into the breech, and came out with first place. Next came Tibsunette (Tibson - Junette) and third Royalcrest Linda Lee by Sherimill Lodestar - Blancarita. Tibsunette is owned by the DeVerne Willeys and Linda by the Roy Taylors.

Dr. Parks commented on the excellence of all three fillies. They were truly a beautiful trio. Especially satisfying to your reporter for obvious reasons, is the fact that they are all

daughters or granddaughters of Sherimill Sunrise.

This concluded the "In Hand" section of the program.

Next came Morgans in harness — Dr. Bachman's Bonnie Twilight in fine harness, Mark O'Donnell's Royalton Firefly in pleasure rig, and as roadsters, Mary Arnold's Chere "O" and Roy Taylor's Ledgewood Laurel. This, of course, was not a competition. All performed at the same time, as Dr. Parks explained the difference in both gear and gaits.

Under English tack we had Miss Lyle Charters and her champion Ledgewood Comet demonstrating show horse type, Mark O'Donnell's Firefly as pleasure type. Ledgewood Laurel threw a shoe and was retired from this class. The young Firefly is still green but a natural for open road hack classes. Dr. Parks commented on how well this filly was doing. And Lyle and Corky showed how to win those saddle class ribbons.

Under Western tack we had Verne Cook's Lee Allen, ridden by daughter Pauline, Curt Smith on his Pand's Juanita, and Charles O'Donnell's Peggy "O". Here the slow rolling stock horse gait of Lee Allan got the nod.

Now Lyle Charters and Mary Lyster (riding Bonnie Twilight) demonstrated some of the simple points of equitation. Ayelen Richards called the turns and made the comments on this section of the program.

As a finale, Lyle and Corky rode some of the advanced equitation figures and brought down the house. Cork is definitely "too much horse" for equitation. But he is well trained and he and Lyle fit each other like a pair of fine kid gloves. The big chestnut willingly trotted the figure 8, etc., under Lyle's skillful and almost imperceptible guidance. The applause was spontaneous and well-deserved.

After the program, those who had not had their fill of sandwiches and hot at the concessions, went on to Schultz's Restaurant to a real sit-down meal. Many who had horses to care for at home, however, had to miss the good food and the good talk, both of which abounded.

Credit is due Russ and Molly Dobbins for their management of this very

successful Field Day.

The Utica show, June 18 and 19th, was a fine success. Nancy Gochee writes, "The show committee is so enthused about the Morgan turnout that they said we might be able to have an "A" division next year. How about that? The manager said he didn't hear one Morgan exhibitor complain or cause the slightest disturbance. He thought they were a mighty fine group."

We would like to see those extra classes next year. Here is a good show, well run, well located, well deserving of our support. It is not easy to pioneer these things, and Nancy Gochee gets a big hand from us all for her efforts. Contact her early in the season for show dates — probably about the same time in June. All of us are like sheep — after a good show is started, people begin to flock in. Well, friends, flock in to this one.

Our Visit To Morgan Farms

While everything is still fresh in my mind I will write about my trip recently as I am sure many Morgan people would appreciate knowing about the colts I sold to Van Sinderen for his hitch. We had a wheel pair broken double, a really snappy lead pair broken double and the older horses in each pair were broken tandem. We also had two 2 year old geldings fairly well broken in single harness.

When out of a clear blue sky Archie Williamson and Mr. Fitzpatrick appeared at my farm last summer looking for one more gelding to complete their hitch, we had thought they were looking at a colt that though started, was not actually ready for hitch work but would certainly be if we were any judge of dispositions. What we did not know was that these gentlemen had been sent here with instructions to buy our 3 year old that was not for sale . . . well, he was "just what they needed" so they bought him, although he was the highest priced horse in the hitch. Since my hitch was "flying out the window" with the 3 year old, and they definitely seemed interested in every gelding we had, we agreed to sell them one of the two year olds also. The check of course was the largest I ever saw in connection with my horses, and my husband was absolutely delighted . . . so delighted of course that he allowed me to spend a lot of that money on more stud foals to make into more geldings for our hitch, now set back about five years.

We kept careful watch of the progress of our colts. You can imagine our pride in seeing their pictures on the covers of the magazines this past winter. The first opportunity we had to see the hitch finally came . . . we were to go to Vermont again and correspondence revealed that we would be welcome to visit and see the colts.

We stopped at Marilyn Childs' farm where Justin Morgan is buried, and although Marilyn was "off someplace" we just looked over her group of horses, most that we knew . . . the old stallion Mandate appeared hale and hearty and his cute little head popped over the top of the stall to greet us warmly . . . although the barn only held two more horses, both geldings,

we visited with them. We found the new Morgan gelding Lance to be very gentle and friendly. Out in the pasture was a very pretty mare, Rheda K, a black mare which I presumed is Polly Ann Nekomia, also in good condition, as well as the broodmare Barbara Ann with a very strong-built stud colt by side and the little two year old Aida Mandate.

We decided to make some phone calls as to see the people in the area. We could not get Mrs. Rice but decided we would drive over towards Meredith feeling sure we could find her farms.

We arrived at Meredith shortly after five and found a note directing us to the Ashland Farms where the horses were. We were very disappointed to miss seeing Mrs. Rice herself but even so were able to pretty well sort out her horses . . . although I had never been to her farm before, my friends the Bachmans have several nice mares they bought from her, and we of course had our colt. We had bought the colt sight unseen and the only thing I am sorry now is that I didn't get more than one. Had I ever seen her stock before I surely would have. I have never seen a more uniform collection of the real Morgan-type Morgans and probably would have been most happy to own anything she had. We went first to the little stud barn and the first horse we saw had to be Timmie Twilight . . . sire of our own Robbie. He was an exquisitely beautiful little Morgan, with a great deal of that "look" that is so hard to put into words which I say is Morgan in my opinion. A very dark chestnut with a shock of mane and tail and a gentle appearance . . . I took the liberty of going into his stall to take a closer look at him and was absolutely delighted. Since Mrs. Rice has chosen to retain this young stud to replace her aged Sam Twilight I can only say, he is just beautiful and certainly is a wise choice.

Also in the barn were several others, next to Timmie a nice mare with a stud foal that was cute as anything, the mare a nice rich chestnut coloring with some white on her face. Then another chestnut mare with a very fine bay filly at foot that was pretty as a picture. Upon looking around we

found what had to be the well-known stallion Sam Twilight, grey on head around the eyes, but otherwise alert and in good condition . . . he could run in and out as he pleased and I stepped into the corral with him and took a few feet of film of this stallion. He was rather detached in his manner towards me, but allowed me to pet him and I couldn't help but notice the deep jowled head and tiny tiny ears.

We asked directions to the other place and a picturesque scene greeted me, a field full of Morgans. Knowing that Mrs. Rice's horses are most gentle I again stepped into the field and started to take a few movies although the light was getting bad. I didn't get very far, as soon a couple inquisitive ones started right up to me . . . a grey Welsh type pony mare very anxious to be friends and a chestnut mare again similar to the two mares over in the barn, most anxious to be petted and friendly. In no time at all two foals came up to me, one a well grown stud that I liked right away and the other either a chestnut or bay filly, again a very pretty thing. The last of the lighter chestnut colored mares I surmised to be Robbie's dam although any of the four that looked so similar could have been. It was a while before the colts went to their own dams (all the mares had obviously foaled in recent years) it was difficult to place them with the proper mare.

The stock was all in excellent condition and was, as a group, a very pretty collection of fine and what I call real Morgan type Morgans.

Since we had no time left if we were to be in Washington Depot, Conn. by 9 a.m. the next morning, we left Mrs. Rice a brief note and barreled our Chevy on down all those terrific New England roads. Since my husband enjoys driving and I don't, he managed to complete 700 miles that day in spite of all the stops, none of which we actually hurried; we rolled in at a Howard Johnsons shortly after one a.m. It wasn't difficult to get me up at six on Wednesday and we arrived at Glenholme Farms about five minutes before nine.

The grounds of the Adrian van Sinderen farm were expansive and very beautiful with tree shaded lanes and several concrete barns, carriage rooms, a pool, a mansion . . . everything reflecting good taste and wise management. The Glenholme Farms had a

"Impact of Morgan Blood On Other American Breeds" is the captivating caption on a beautifully lined and lettered chart drawn by Fred Norris, well known horse show judge and author of Ashland, Kentucky.

This Justin Morgan "family tree" graphically shows his blood flow through his famous progeny to the veins of immortal sires and dams in the American Saddle Horse Register, the Tennessee Walking Horse Register, the Quarter Horse Register and the Standardbred Register. The chart is available to horse lovers as a 14x16 print suitable for framing at \$1 per copy. The distributor is Frank W. Norris, 1435 Ashland Ave., Apt. B, Columbus, 12, Ohio.

"Quite obviously," Author Norris explains, "space limitations preclude mention of hundreds of famous Morgans. My first effort covered a sheet four feet square. Then began a series of reducing processes until the printer was satisfied. Naturally, the names of many great sires and dams were eliminated. However, enough remains to prove that indomitable Saddlers such as Rex Peavine, Edna May's King, Easter Cloud and matchless Bourbon King were endowed with the richness of Morgan blood. It shows that the No. 1 horse in the Walking realm had a Morgan mama and a sire with some Morgan background, that many Quarter horses owe their stamina and beauty to Morgan descent. Hundreds of unrecorded mares by Ethan Allen and his sons added lustre to Hambletonian and other harness racing greats. Likewise, countless unrecorded Morgan mares transmitted their symmetry and quality to our Saddlers.

"Surely, there's enough meat in the chart to satisfy any fair critic. No doubt it will help settle arguments — and start new ones. But it is readily apparent to all that to build a complete Morgan tree would be to create a forest."











Standard of Perfection for Morgan Horses

Height:	14.1 to 15.1.
Weight:	900 to 1,100 pounds.
General Conformation:	Good saddle conformation. In general, the Morgan should be compact, of medium length, well-muscled, smooth and stylish in appearance.
Quality:	The Morgan should have clean, dense bone with sufficient substance, well-developed joints and tendons, and with fine coat.
Temperament:	The Morgan should be tractable but with good spirit.
Head and Neck:	<p>Head: Medium size, clean cut and tapering slightly from jaw to muzzle. The profile can be straight or slightly dished, never Roman nosed. Wide, clean cut lower jaw, medium fine muzzle with small and firm lips and large nostrils. Ears should be small, fine pointed, set wide apart and carried alertly. Eyes should be full, bright and clear.</p> <p>Neck: Medium length, well-crested, clean-cut at the throatlatch, smoothly joined to shoulder and deep at the point of the shoulder.</p> <p>Mane and foretop good and full.</p>
Forehand:	<p>Shoulders of good length and slope, blending into smooth, well-defined, but not too high, withers. The withers should be slightly higher than point of hip.</p> <p>Forelegs should be short, squarely set, well apart, with short muscular arms. Viewed from the front, the legs should be thin and must be straight; viewed from the side should be wide and sinewy.</p> <p>The forearm should be wide, flat and muscular. Knees should be wide and flat.</p> <p>Cannons short, wide, flat and free from meat. Fetlock joint should not be round but rather wide. Pasterns should be clean and strong, of medium length, the slope to correlate with slope of shoulder. Hindquarters:	<p>The hind legs of the Morgan should be squarely set and so placed that he turns on his hindquarters with legs well under him. The hips should be well-rounded. Hip bones should not show. Croup should be rounded gently with fairly high-set tail, well-carried. The tail to be good and full. Quarters and thighs deep and well-muscled with strong muscular stifles and medium length wide muscular gaskins.</p> <p>The hocks should be wide, deep and clean. Viewed from the rear, the hind legs should be perpendicular with the hocks neither closer together nor wider apart than the fetlocks.</p> <p>Cannons: Short, wide, flat with tendons standing well out from bone and well defined.</p> <p>Pasterns: Strong, medium length, not too sloping. The mare I buy will be finished for showing in western performance classes and will be shown widely to again establish the competitive ability of a good Morgan in the minds of horse enthusiasts throughout the country.

in a perpendicular line so as to reduce the weight they must bear. These horses will move forward in a "crouching" position due to the great physical pain in the fore feet. If an attempt is made to turn in a small circle, they do so by using the hind feet as a pivot, bringing the fore feet around by placing as little weight on them as possible. These horses will also place the hind feet far under the body and arch the back. This latter symptom is often confused with diseases of the loins or kidneys.

If the hind feet are involved, the animal will lean forward in an attempt to relieve pain and any attempts at backing are met with resistance. The fore feet are placed far under the body so as to carry the maximum share of the weight. Positioning of the feet is of great importance in a correct diagnosis.

When the horse is forced to walk, symptoms of extreme pain are manifested in all acute cases of founder. If all four feet are affected, the animal stands in the usual position assumed in a healthy state, however it is difficult to get these horses to move. When urged to move, the least effort brings on spasms of the entire body.

Heart rate is accelerated, pulse is full and "bounding" and in some cases, as the condition progresses, the pulse becomes weak and irregular.

If the horse is lying down, it is difficult to get them to rise and if the animal does rise, he will show marked pain.

Toe surface of the hoof is extremely sensitive and affected animals flinch when this area is tapped lightly. By placing the hand at the coronary band, one can feel a rise in temperature and by placing the hand in the tendinous region of the cannon, a "bounding" pulse is noted here. Normally the pulse rate is not felt in this area.

In a horse that has been down for a few days, there is a discharge of pus and a sloughing condition of the laminae, with elevated body temperature. If the disease follows another course, there may be little thermic disturbance after the first few hours have elapsed.

CHRONIC FOUNDER

Chronic founder is a sequel to the acute form of the disease, with pre-existing disturbances determining its intensity and symptoms. There is separation (Fig. 2) or loss of attachment between the coffin bone and the wall

of the hoof. These changes do not become immediately apparent, as they take place over a period of months. Some low grade chronic cases recur as periodic attacks wherein no particular structural changes occur and the attack is determined by local heat and arterial pulse.

Structural changes in the foot usually occur following the inflammation. Acute founder which results in an acute inflammation of the sensitive laminae, usually results in destruction of this tissue with an infiltration between the anterior surface of the coffin bone and the contracted hoof. The lower portion of the coffin bone is turned downward and backward due to the traction exerted by the deep flexor tendon as it passes to attach to the ground surface of the coffin bone, facilitating this rotation. Rotation of the coffin bone plus separation of the bone with the hoof wall results in "dropped" sole.

In time the toe makes an excessive growth and the concavity of the anterior line is accentuated owing to this abnormal length of hoof. The hoof due to recurrent inflammatory attacks is corrugated and elevations of the horn in parallel rings are usually present.

At the walk or trot, foundered horses usually strike the ground first with the heel and follow with the toe, giving the rider the feeling that the animal is stiff in the shoulders.

In cases of infection, careful inspection of the coronary region may elicit evidence of detachment of the hoof. This may occur in from four to ten days after initial attack of acute laminitis. Sidebones (ossification of the lateral cartilages) may also be a sequel with the inflammatory process extending down to the lateral cartilages.¹ In these cases there is a tendency for calcification and pus formation, a common complication that may break at the coronary band or cause the sole to slough.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

What to do until the veterinarian arrives, in cases of acute founder. Begin by placing ice packs around the affected feet during the first 24 hours.⁴ If ice is unavailable, then stand the horse in cold water or mud. A cold running stream will serve nicely to cool the feet out, for those fortunate to have one available.

Take the horse off of all grain and if pastured, place on a hay ration, at least until the first grass is gone.

By calling your veterinarian immediately you may be able to save the ani-

mal in respect to future usefulness. With the advent of antihistaminics, cortisone and the newer diuretics, many of the heretofore hopeless cases have a better than even chance for a sound recovery.

Treatment of acute founder due to disturbances of the digestive tract, such as impaction, consumption of large quantities of grain or feeds toxic to the animal, are best relieved by prompt evacuation of the digestive tract. This should be done by a veterinarian since it involves passage of a stomach tube and administration of medication.

Following recovery, the horse should be shod with a bar shoe. This will relieve pressure to the frog and in turn relieve the associated pain. Avoid pressure on the sole, since as with most chronic cases it has "dropped" and walking on it only elicits further pain. This may be relieved in part by placing a leather pad under the shoe, over a packing of pine tar and oakum. If clips are to be used with the shoe, place these at the side of the hoof and not at the toe.

Horses with chronic founder tend toward dry, hard, brittle hoofs, that only induce further discomfort. Application of a good hoof dressing two to three times a week will do much to keep the hoof soft and increase flexibility.

Constant hoof care is a must if these individuals are to experience any relief from chronic founder or a return to partial usefulness.

Mrs. Floyd Thompson, with Nancy Ela in the ring on Vigildon, pointed out the fine points of equitation. It was very interesting to see that when seated properly, hands held correctly, Vigildon gave a top performance, but when Nancy demonstrated the things not to do both rider and horse lost much of their finished look. Nancy then showed us the beginning of Dressage work she is doing with Vigildon.

As a finale we were shown several ways of trailer loading. How it can be done alone and what can be done if your horse thinks he does not want to load. The members and friends, over 150 were present, all left the meeting with a new store of knowledge and we, for one, were that evening putting some of our newly acquired knowledge into practice!

The only trouble was that Donnie thinks of it as a match race with a friendly monster, and he threw down the gauntlet. At twenty, he was pull-

ing ahead, and at fifteen, he'd hump up and aim one at the car, to urge it to more speed. Of course he was kept on the soft shoulder, so he did not run on the hard road. And what a pretty sight we were all treated to when that combination came sailing through the gate! Pausing briefly to be admired while John picked up the entry, Adonis still raring to go, waltzed airily into his class, and back out, wearing the reserve ribbon for stallions 2 and under, going down to the two year old Dorian Ashmore, owned by Caven Glo. Adonis is certainly living up to his name, getting more beautiful as the months pass. Nobody would guess that he was weaned at two months.
