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The President's Corner

When one is President of a large National Organization like the Morgan Horse Club, Inc., problems and misunderstandings are always present and these situations should try to be solved.

To overcome a lot of misunderstandings in Judging and Registering Morgans your club will mail to all its members and Morgan Judges, a small booklet, "The Morgan Horse Showing and Registration Requirements." This booklet explains the rules for Judging and requirements of registering Morgan Horses.

Last week I received a sad telephone call from a youngster asking if she could show her seven year old half-Morgan in a Morgan Class. Naturally the answer is "no." The call brought to my mind the many people I have tried to discourage from breeding unregistered mares to Morgan stallions. The off-spring is good, in fact, too good. One becomes attached to them and loves them, but they are still just a horse. If at the time they bought a Registered Morgan colt or filly foal, they would now have a Morgan they could show, an animal of value. Instead, after all this time, they still have just a horse.

Another question always present is long feet and weighted shoes versus short feet and regular shoes. Our rules cover long feet and weight but few judges or spectators pay much attention to this. Some horses go high naturally shoes or no shoes. Those that do not are shown with long feet and heavy shoes. The Morgan bends his knees and is not supposed to go like an Arab or a Hunter. The picture on this page, of Bob B, 5285, foaled in 1905, shows an early (Continued on Page 59)





Girls and Horses

When it comes to using girls in horse work, too many employers think Victorian era and side saddle. It's time for a change The fairer sex merit a break. If they have a love for and interest in horses, they have the first and most important requisite for success in this rapidly expanding field.

I receive many letters from girls asking about college training and job placement on horse work. Generally these young ladies proudly tell of their love for horses, confide in me that their parents and friends have discouraged them every step of the way, and earnestly solicit help and advice. Here is the story that I've told again and again.

Few colleges offer special training in horses; and those that do are generally somewhat limited from the standpoint of facilities and courses. though this is disappointing, the important thing is to get a college education. From the standpoint of undergraduate courses, I admonish these equine lovers to major in department of special interest and take such required or elective horse courses as are available; to take the necessary supporting courses in the sciences and the arts; to be good scholars; to become proficient in shorthand and typing; and to obtain rather broad training. Then if they are real top students, I urge that they give serious consideration to completing a Ph. D. or a veterinary degree.

Jobs For Girls

As a college professor for 25 years, I observed that most pretty girls get married. Thus, I was never concerned about getting jobs for them. Usually there are plenty of professional opportunities but cupid wins out. But this is all the more reason why girls should be enencouraged to pursue their interest in horses — just as they should be interested in music and the other arts and in homemaking. Housewives can ride at such times as may suit their convenience

an important consideration. And there is no finer recreation and sport throughout life.

But what are the professional opportunities in horse work for the bachelor girl or for the little wife who wishes to work? Among them are the following:

1. In research and public relations with commercial companies that manufacture and distribute products used in the light horse industry.

2. Veterinarians in private practice with drug manufacturers and with horse establishments.

As office managers or head secretaries to executives engaged in agribusinesses.

4. On the staffs of horse magazines and breed registry associations.

In college teaching.

6. As riding instructors.

In schooling top horses, in which

Analyzing a Horse Ration

Recently a breeder of registered horses asked for my opinion on the following horse concentrate ration, which he is feeding (along with good alfalfa hay):

Rolled oats		1000
Ground corn		
Wheat bran		500
Linseed oil meal		100
Skimmilk		50
Steamed bone meal		50
Vitamin D supplement		2
Antibiotics (11/4 oz.)		

Total 2,002

Beginning with creep feeding and continuing to two years of age, all young stock receive one pound of a good commercial supplement in addition.

The computed analysis on this ration is: protein 12.73%; calcium, 0.85%; phosphorus, 0.88%; and TDN, 70%.

This is a good ration. There's nothing particularly wrong with it except the cost; he's paying \$95.00 per ton for it.

The alfalfa hay will likely increase the protein content of the total ration to a satisfactory level (I would like to see brood mares and stallions get about 14% protein). The calcium-phosphorus ration will shift the added alfalfa hay, which is high in calcium (the nearer it approaches 1.1 the better).

I question feeding skimmilk and antibiotics to mature horses. Older animals do not need very excellent, but too expensive, skimmilk; they can use cheaper oil meal proteins just as well. Antibiotics are fine for suckling foals, but I know of no experimental work indicating their value as a feed for mature horses provided there is no disease problem.

Anthrax in Horses

I'm frequently asked if horses (and other equines) are more susceptible than other farm animals to tetanus or lockjaw. The answer is yes. However the disease does occur in swine, cattle, sheep and goats; and it is transmissible to man. The greatest incidence of anthrax is in the South, where precautions against it are an essential part of the routine treatment of wounds; but it occurs world-wide.

Symptoms and Signs

Anthrax is usually associated with a puncture wound. Generally, the incubation period is from one to two weeks, but it may vary from one day to many months. The disease is characterized by a stiffness about the head and neck, slow chewing and weak and awkward swallowing, protruding of the third eyelid over the forward surface of the eyeball (called "haws"), a standing position throughout the sickness, violent spasms or contractions of groups of muscles brought on by the slightest movement or noise, temperature up to 110 degrees F, and contracting of the jaw muscles so intensely that the horse is unable to open its mouth - hence the name lockjaw. If, recovery occurs, it takes a month or more. In over half the cases, however, death follows, usually because of sheer exhaustion or paralysis of the vital organs.

Cause, Prevention and Treatment

The disease is caused by an exceedingly powerful toxin or poison, more than 100 times as toxic as strychnine, liberated by a specific microorganism or germ — the anthrax bacillus. The causative organism is an anaerobe (it lives in the absence of oxygen), which

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Selling Morgans with Advertising

In the first article on this subject (Jan.-Feb. '63) major forms of advertising to sell Morgans were covered generally and summarized with the statement . . . A complete advertising program should include:

1. Classified advertising in one or

more newspapers near you.

 Classified or display advertising in horse or livestock periodicals that cover your state or region and possibly those serving even larger areas.

3. Displaying your horses and talking about them wherever good judge-

ment indicates.

 A generous use of the Morgan Horse Magazine which will build prestige as well as selling Morgans and stallion service.

Of course a complete program is not necessary to get the desired results in many situations and would only make the cost, time and effort out of proportion to reason. In some cases the medium which has the best chance to get the desired results should be tried first, if that doesn't work another one should be selected.

If classified advertising in one or more newspapers is used it should be remembered, as the saying goes, "There is nothing deader than yesterday's newspaper." In other words practically all responses to a classified advertisement will probably be received within a very few days after the ad has appeared. If no answers are received within this period it is doubtful that there will be any.

It is also believed this situation holds to a lesser extent in the case of general horse periodicals; the vast majority of the readers of such publications will read them once and discard them. Of course a few people might clip such an ad and answer it later, at a more convenient time, but again the percentage will probably be very very small.

As there is a higher concentration of prospects for Morgan advertising among the readers of the Morgan Magazine, because there is extra interest in the conten's, and in many cases each item is read over and over, and as the advertising rates are so low in comparison to most media, this article will attempt to enlarge on the use of display advertising in it. Perhaps the following will make it simpler, for people not familiar with making up ads, to prepare better ads much more easily.

The factors involved are shape, size,

copy, arrangement and use of pictures. Advertising rates are quoted for full pages, half page, third, quarters and per column inch. If you start your ad with a layout the following measurements may make it easier. Although the printing ruler is measured in picas, a full page is approximately 7" x 91/2". This is very close to the advertising standard that says the ideal ad is in the proportion of 5 by 8 or the other way, 8 by 5. A half page across fits the latter closely too. A half page can also be laid out, 2 columns (4½) by 7" high, to fit the first standard. This shape of half page, seldom used, has a distinct advantage. It dominates a page with a minimum of space. See for yourself. Cut out a piece of paper this size and lay it over a page with all news copy . . . doesn't it appear to be much more? Of course it should only be used when copy and picture desired can be fitted in advantageously.

When a third of a page is called for, again copy and pictures should dictate whether it should be one full column (2¼" x 9½"), two colmuns by 4¾" or across the page and 3¼" high. A quarter page could be one column, by 7", two columns by 3¼" or three col-

umns by 21/2".

In preparing both copy and layout it may help to look at a number of different ads to use as a guide. One or more of them could help you to determine just what you want, a certain type of heading, picture or pictures here or there, and the copy you think best. Perhaps there is a tendency to use too much copy regardless of the size of the ad. In some cases detailed copy is called for, in others verbosity only detracts from the key points and attractiveness of the ad.

Is it necessary to say that copy should be truthful? An account of a situation involving a horse of another breed comes to mind. It had been advertised as a winner of many classes. The purchaser from a distant point did not check to see that the winnings were in small shows that didn't mean as much as indicated. Perhaps this was not dishonest copy, but does it fit the old "You can fool some of the people some of the time . . . "? On the other hand extreme slogans like "The mostest and the bestest" are usually taken with a grain of sand. In any event extreme honesty pays off in the long run.

Remember proper use of pictures, heading, copy and white space aid materially in the attractiveness of any ad. The last stallion issue had many outstanding examples of good advertisements with from very little to good detailed copy. Deeds accomplished and other facts stood out.

Usually it is easier to lay out an ad around the pic.ure or pictures. First mark the size of the ad with a ruler. Draw a line around the space for the picture or pictures where they will stand out the most. Then, write in the heading and signature with lines drawn in to approximately represent each line of copy and where it is to be. If there are several paragraphs or different places for copy, they should be keyed (copy A, B, C, etc.) with the same letters in front of the copy for each segment.

In other words the picture could well be the highlight of the ad. If on one side, it is much better to have the horse face toward the copy rather than away from it. Prints should be the best possible. A poor picture can kill or detract from the value of the copy. A wrong angle may make a horse appear slightly roman-nosed or shallowbodied or peaked-crouped or something else undesirtable. The wrong background may detract. Often backgrounds (especially those taken in shows) cannot be avoided, but can be dimmed to make the horse stand out. Basically, of course, the horse should be well-groomed with mane and tail combed out and if possible photographed with summer coat and good light. The tack, whether halter, bridle or what not should be neat and clean.

The horse should appear balanced and as animated as possible.

Why should these things be taken into consideration when preparing a display ad for the Morgan Horse Magazine or any other publication? Money, time and effort are being used to sell Morgans or stallion service and in many instances to build a reputation so that people will come to you when need what you have to offer. Isn't it just good sense to get as much as you can from that money spent. Attractive ads with good pictures and good factual copy can't help but make a better impression and bring better returns. Incidentally with good ads you help build the prestige of the magazine and the breed too.

If you have a need for advertising but are not now doing any, perhaps the foregoing will make it easier to get started.



First Morgan Field Day In Florida

Camelot Farms of Ft. Lauderdale and Hainlin Mill Farms of Miami presented a well-attended field day at picturesque Camelot Farms, Sunday, the ninth of June. Morgans being a rather new breed to this area, the farm owners felt a field day would help introduce this versatile breed to the most people in the best way. A delicious buffet was served to the crowd before the performance began.

Mr. Tim White opened the program, then Mr. Henry Mangels gave a brief history of the Morgan breed, the uses and adaptability both in the past and now. Mr. White took over the microphone and very capably managed an interesting running narration through-

out the following events.

First there was a parade of stallions; Spring Glo, Trophy's Award, Miller's Ben-Del, and R.R. Mr. Pepperman, certainly making an impressive show! Trophy's Award, most ably shown by Paul Saucier and Spring Glo headed by John Diehl, returned to the ring to demonstrate the proper way to present a horse in hand. Both Emmy Mangels and Dick Gray were well-exercised chasing these big-trotting stallions around the ring! After the handsome stallions left the ring, the ladies took over, represented by Camelot's champion model mare, Kane's Spring Delite, the gorgeous mare Donnette of Came-

lot, and Hainlin Mill's airy Trophy's Bracelet. Mr. White enumerated on the different outstanding points of each mare, and how their femininity made them more desirable as brood stock.

Dick Gray gave a very fine pleasure driving exhibition with Eve of Edhobe, the mare with the bodacious trot. This was followed by a demonstration of performance saddle horses by Camelot's champion performance mares, Trophy's Beckie Date, with John Diehl up and Kane's Spring Delite, capably shown by Dick Gray.

Mrs. Mangels, on Robbie Twilight, and Dick Gray on Eve, showed the crowd how Morgan pleasure horses can go, really causing comment when asked to extend their trot. You can imagine the hunter-jumper set when Dick put Eve over two 3'6" jumps, flawlessly — this, from the breed they thought was "just pretty."!

After the English pleasure horse left the ring, RR Mr. Pepperman obliged with a demonstration of how handsome a western pleasure horse can be. Win Douma rode him — this was the first western Morgan showing in this area, and will not be the last.

Kane's Spring Delite gave a very fine demonstration of how a performance harness mare should go, driven by John Diehl Then the three Trophy horses entered the ring: Trophy's Award, Trophy's Beckie Date and Trophy's Bracelet. These were discussed by Mr. White, pointing out the similarities and differences in the get of one horse. Afthe this came a real crowd-pleaser—the showing of Camelot's mares and foals, as the Morgan pleasure and performance horses of tomorrow.

There was considerable favorable comment on the field day as well as moans that it was over too soon, and a request for it to be a yearly (one asked for it to be a monthly) affair. Many of the audience were amazed at the extreme versatility of this useful breed and the handsome way each horse does its job

Florida Morgan breeders were there—Mrs. Lucille Kenyon flew down from Daytona, the Roberts were over from the West coast as well as many other horse enthusiasts from the entire state. Ask The Doctor

This column is added as a personal service to our readers. Send your questions direct to Ruth Rogers, Martin Rd., Akron, N. Y. They will be answered by a competent veterinarian. These doctors give their time and knowledge to help us with our Morgans.

Ouestions answered this month by Dr. Floyd P. Hitchcock, Jr. Main Road, Akron, N. Y.

Question: I would like information on using a trainer's leg wash or brace. What are the advantages and disadvantages (if any) of such a wash? What is the main purpose in using and proper method of application?

Answer: Leg wash is widely used on race and show horses. It probably is not necessary on pleasure horses except where some special condition needs treatment.

If the legs are bruised or there are swellings, if there is inflamation from these or other causes, leg wash can be useful. It is standard procedure mostly on horses over worked or over strained. The proper method of application varies with the individual to be treated and the medication used.

Be careful with the too-energetic use of a product that ordinarily does not blister. Color and skin texture also make a difference. Better talk to your local vet as to how and how often the brace of your choice should be applied and whether or not you should bandage over it. Try to find out what you are working to accomplish.

The wash you mention is very good and widely used. Follow directions carefully.

Question: Please discuss splints, their cause and cure. Can a horse with splints be shown in conformation classes?

Answer: Splints are bony enlargements situated usually between the splint bone and the cannon bone on the inside of the fore leg. (They seldom occur on the hind leg). Lameness may or may not be present and at any rate, usually disappears in the later stages. The nearer the joint, the more troublesome the splint is likely to be.

Splints are caused by blows or strains. The cure depends on the severity of the injury. Level the foot carefully. Liniments and bandages may be used to take out the soreness.

Rest is the great healer and the horse should most certainly be rested. After the inflamation has subsided stronger counter-irritants may remove or nearly remove the bony growth, which also tends to diminish with just the passage of time.

Splints sometimes appear on a young colt for no reason known to the owner, and disappear without treatment.

A horse with a splint can be shown. When lameness is not present, the splint is regarded as a minor blemish. The animal might be marked down somewhat by a very particular judge but certainly not disqualified.

Question: What is the cause of a horse making a whistling sound through its throat, only after drinking water. She doesn't do this after running or any other time except after drinking. She makes this sound when she begins to walk. It only lasts for about three breaths after she has finished drinking, and then only if she starts walking. She tends to arch her neck and pull her chin in.

Answer: It is really not possible to diagnose this ailment without a physical examination. There might be foreign matter lodged in her nose or throat, or there might be a growth or other disturbance.

It is best not to guess on something like this. A thorough examination by your veterinarian is the sure way to determine the cause of these symptoms.

Question: Do horses have ear mites?

Answer: This is possible but not common. Mites that affect large animals are not usually in the ears. If there is another skin problem, mites or ticks might work into this area. Your veterinarian can take a scraping and check it under the microscope.

If the ears are irritated, clean them very carefully with your finger covered with some soft material. If you trim out your horse's ears, be sure that the little bristling hairs do not fall inside.

Question: Does anone really know what the so-called "chestnuts" really

Answer: The chestnuts and the ergots (the little horny protrusions at the back of the fetlock) are commonly regarded as the remnants of other appendages. They are non-sensitive and your blacksmith will, if you ask him, trim them level and smooth with the rest of the leg.

The children were put through a "dry run" of what to expect in a 4-H Fitting and Showing Class, with special emphasis on what the judge will be looking for and how they can improve their own showmanship. When the horses were returned to the barn, we were treated to an exhibition of the Elas outstanding stallion, Orcland Vigildon. Nancy trotted him out for us and showed him off. Then, at her mother's urging, she fashioned an Indian bridle out of the lead shank and rode him bareback around the ring at a collected canter doing figure eights with flying changes of leads. A truly impressive performance and one that brought many favorable comments from those who are as yet unfamiliar with Morgans. People such as the Elas who have been involved in 4-H work for many years have done the breed a great service by exposing these impressionable young people to their Morgans. Morgan Horse Takes Sweepstakes In Santa Barbara Trail Ride

The few registered Morgans who have been competing on the North American Trailride Conference circuit in California have all come away with ribbons, but in April at Santa Barbara, Sid Spencer's Lady Jean, No. 010219 (Linnsfield x Mormon's Red Lady) took the sweepstakes as well as the top spot in the Lightweight Division.

Lady Jean and her Morgan breederowner and rider made a real team, apparently, because Mrs. Spencer, that gallant little lady-rancher from Arroyo Grande to the north of Santa Barbara, was also awarded the coveted Senior

Horsemanship Award.

After 25 miles of rugged work each day for two consecutive days in the Los Padres National Forest, where the Class "A" sanctioned NATRC Ride was held, the judges selected their top prospects and Judge Linda Tellington rode them for a final check on their willingness to "move out" again late Sun-

day. It was obvious to both judges and spectators that Lady Jean was perfectly willing and able to give "that little bit more" for which our Morgans are known. Not only that, she behaved perfectly in the hands of a strange rider, a compliment not only to the breed but particularly to Sid Spencer's training. Both Dr. R. E. Graham, the veterinarian judge and Linda, that tireless gal of the Oklahoma 100-miler with her vast experience with endurance horses, said "There was simply no question as to the winner."

After the awards were made at the Sunday evening banquet at Rancho Oso Fun Ranch, headquarters for the Ride, Sid confessed she really wanted to win this one "for our breed", not just for her personal satisfaction. And she did the job extremely well. Our thanks and congratulations.

Another Morgan mare, Bonnie Maid, owned and ridden by Herb Perrin, of Santa Barbara, on his first competitive ride, and sold to him by Sid Spencer, took top honors in the Heavyweight Division (rider and tack weighing 190 pounds and over).

The third Morgan on the Santa Barbara Ride was Little Joe Morgan, owned and ridden by spunky Frances Huling, of Sonoma, Calif., took 6th in the Light-

weight Division.

We noted another well-known Morgan gelding, Suds, ridden to the Western States Championship in 1962 by owner Maxi (Heimlich) Riggs, being ridden by various pleasure riders held in conjunction with the competition. One of these "part-time" riders was a sixty-nine year young woman, whose agility belied her years. She is the mother of Helen Tupper, one of the fine working committee conducting the Ride, and was along "to do her bit" serving coffee and punching out meal tickets. Guess she just couldn't resist

a "ride in the springtime" on good-looking little Suds! Owner Maxi along with hubby, Woody Riggs, headed up this first NATRC Ride in this area, sponsored by the Santa Barbara Riding Club. The club's president, genial George Collins, made the Ride on his Saddlebred, placing 5th in Heavyweight.

It is noted by this writer (and proud Morgan owner) that a great many Arabians make these rides, which results in a great many good Arabians being the winners. If our Morgan people would do the same, even though we are not so numerous, we feel positive that more and more of these top spots would go to our trail riding Morgans!

For instance, in the Lightweight Division, won by Mrs. Spencer, Arabians took second and third, a Thoroughbred was fourth, a horse of unreported breeding was fifth, and Little Joe Morgan was sixth. In the Heavyweight Division, won by Mr. Perrin, a horse of unreported breeding was second, an Arabian was third, Quarter Horses were in fourth and sixth spots, while fifth went to the previously mentioned Saddlebred. In the Junior Division (where the riders are aged 10 through 17 and weight is not recorded) an Arabian was first, a Saddlebred was second; third, fourth and sixth went to

Arabians, with fifth to a Thoroughbred. No Morgans were entered in the Junior Division, to this writer's knowledge.

The Santa Barbara Ride was the first Class A Ride of 1963 sanctioned by NATRC, the first two, in Hesperia and in Concord, having been Class B, which consists of one day of 25 to 40 miles in 61/2 to 7 hours of riding time, plus a mandatory rest stop at noon for detailed judging and veterinarian checking. Point scores are given, based on the classification, records being maintained by NATRC on each horse that completes any NATRC Ride, with annual awards being made each November at San Francisco's famous Cow Palace, during the huge horse show held there each year.

Hesperia

In an earlier issue, one of our So. California Morgan trailriders, Paula Roe, reported on her experiences in making this first NATRC Ride of 1963 at the end of school's Christmas Vacation, the first weekend after New Year's. Winter daylight being so scarce competitors and officials (I know, for I was Ride Chairman) start out when the winter air is still rather nippy. However, within an hour old Sol makes his presence known and the temperature warms up into the sixties by noon, which really helps horses at the begin-

ning of the competitive season to "take it." We are happy to report that, after 13 consecutive years of conducting a Winter Ride here in Southern California, not once have we had to cancel! (And I don't work for the Chamber of Commerce — just love the fact that we can ride all year long here in Southern California.)

Sweepstakes Winner at Hesperia was the first Registered Quarter Horse to do so since NATRC came into being three years ago. Four purebred Morgans made the Hesperia Ride, Paula Roe's Ramona Dawn, a three year old mare taking third in the Lightweight Division; and Justina Allen, an 11 year old mare owned and ridden by Marjorie Riding, also of Lakeside (near San Diego), taking fourth. Starstone's Delight, Morgan gelding owned and ridden by Miss Bobbie Sosson of San Bernardino in the Junior Division, was awarded 4th place, which Bobbie garnered the top Junior Horsemanship Award for her excellent riding and care of her mount on the trail and in camp. This young gelding placed 4th in the 1962 National NATRC finals with 15year old Bobbie making only two of the nine NATRC Rides held in California in 1962.


Our own horses are doing fine,

Recognize the TV stars in our feature picture this month? They are Lady Elizabeth of Camelot and her one month old (when the picture was taken) filly by Spring Glo of Camelot. The foal has been named Lady Elaine.

The picture was taken at Camelot Farms, Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., during the filming of a Chevrolet TV commercial which has been featured coast-to-coast. The mare and foal also appear each week on the Bonanza show.

Camelot Farm was recently the scene of the South's first Morgan Field Day which was a gratifying success. So much so that owner Tim White and Manager John Diehl have been asked to repeat it annually.

The foal roster at Camelot was completed early with a count of two fillies (one sold) and three studs. John and Tim are high on the five youngsters they now have that are sired by Spring Glo of Camelot (one from last year) and are anxious to get to the shows with the exceptional foal by Lippitt Mandate from Lippitt Molly Ann Nekomia. John says, "Every move he makes is like a finished show horse."

The Mid-Atlantic spotlight focused on New Jersey for most of the month of June with shows on three weekends at Camden, Readington and New Brunswick.

The virus scare kept entries on the light side at Camden. But the "A" rated Morgan division made up in quality for anything it might have lacked in numbers. Exhibitors were again high in their praise of the classes

offered as well as the beautiful stabling facilities at Garden State Park.

New here this year was a Morgan Pleasure Division culminating in a separate stake. The tricolor went to Roger Etherington's The Third Man shown by Janie Lucine — a pair that had previously won the Morgan Pleasure class, taken second in road hack and in a large open pleasure class for all breeds. Reserve champion pleasure horse was Sandra Wooding's Orcland Linda, the Morgan Road Hack winner.

On the performance side, Waseeka's Nocturne made his first ring appearance of 1963 to win the stallion class and the championship stake. As always, he was shown for Waseeka Farm by John Lydon. Reserve honors went to Three Winds Farm's Dennisfield. Since Mr. and Mrs. Noble were stranded in southern waters with engine trouble on their boat, Dennisfield was ridden to victory in the Ladies' class by Linda Vass and then John Vass took him over to win the gelding class and reserve in the stake.

Orcland Donanna, the mare class winner shown by Mrs. Ruth Orcutt, claimed third in the stake followed by Mike Goebig with Tas-Tee's Indian Summer, Mary DeWitt with Waseeka's Buccaneer, and Dayton Sumner with Daymar's Dark Secret.

At about the same time we heard of some show doings by our more northern members up in New York state. The "Happiness Girls' from Elmira — Ayelien Richards and Polly Dalrymple — dazzled the field at the Bath show to finish one-two in the stake with Mandate's Peggy Lou and Ranbunctious. Polly reports that "Bunky" was also reserve champion stallion at the New York State Breeders show in Syracuse. At Corning Ayelien was delighted to close out Peggy Lou's current show season with a blue ribbon. The mare has been bred back to Flora Newton's Windcrest Gallant and so will be out of action for the rest of the year. At the same show Polly was particularly delighted to have her three year old gelding, Waseeka's Rendezvous, get into the ribbons in his very first show.

A previous column hinted at a new acquisition for Al and Janie Lucine of Malvern, Pa. An honored spot in the barn now belongs to Fancy Be, the mare they have leased from Mrs. L. S. Greenwalt. Even if you don't remember her thrilling performances in the show ring, you only have to take one look at her to figure she was well worth the rather hectic rush trip that Janie made to Illinois to get her. The Lucines also report a busy breeding season with a number of outside mares visiting their senior stud, Squire Penn (known to some of his admirers as "Billy" Penn).

One of the mares sent to him this year is Mike Brittain's Delight Ashmore who has a striking foal by her side sired by Count Benaida Vona.

A new showcase for Morgans (not yet on the Mid-Atlantic scoring list) was the very pleasant show June 22nd at Readington, N. J. This year only two Morgan classes were offered — performance and pleasure — but there were a large number of open classes that the Morgans could and did enter to earn points toward a Morgan Versatile championship.

Orcland Linda pretty well dominated the competition for Sandy Wooding, winning three blues, a second and two fifths to emerge not only as Morgan Versatile Campion but also as the show's open English Pleasure Champion as well.

After a tremendous trail class had been worked over the obstacles (outside course) eight were called back into the ring to work. Three of them, we are proud to report, were Morgans and two of those placed in the ribbons.

Management of the Readington show was well-pleased with the Morgan turnout — particularly the entry in outside classes — and they are interested in expanding the division for next year.

Just over the hill from Readington at Oldwick is Mr. and Mrs. Richard Colgate's Home Farm where you can see a string of top Morgans and two of the cutest foals that anyone has this year.

Both of the youngsters are sired by Colgate's promising young stud, Windcrest Abner (Upwey Ben Don x Abby Gail). From Lapatica there is a very sharp chestnut stud, beautifully marked with star and strip, that can float at the trot. Windcrest Annfield's foal is a bay with perfect white socks behind and the ideal combination of big eyes and little ears up front.

Also by Abner is a handsome big yearling stud, black like his mother Bald Mt. Black Queen. Completing the line-up of young prospects at Home Farm is a two year old bay filly by Pecos from Little Sister that will impress you with her light and airy way of moving. But don't forget Oldwick Celebrator who technically stepped out of the prospect category with his two good placings at Readington. This is a three year old brown gelding (entirely trained by the Colgate children) that can be expected to go a long way in top flight pleasure classes as he matures.

The same weekend as the Readington Show, a contingent of Mid-Atlantic Morgan lovers by-passed competition to enjoy perfect weather for the club's annual trail ride at Windy Valley Inn, Mehoopany, Pa.

Don't pay any attention to all that cowboy talk you'll hear from Marj and Dayton Sumner. They spent a week between shows in Colorado — "so far back in the mountains that the ranch wrangler hadn't even heard of Morgan horses." But much as they enjoyed the trail riding and a chance to do some actual cattle herding, they aren't quite ready to give up completely on show type horses.

As if Dr. Frances Schaeffer didn't have enough to do handling her medical practice, working her string of five Morgans, and serving as our Club President, she has recently been elected Chief of Staff for the Allentown Hospital. It is the first time that a woman has held this post and hearty congratulations (which we tender herewith) are in order.



The fact that the mower blade has not moved in fifteen years does not discourage him at all! In fact, he is thinking of hiring out to cut hay . . . 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



Here is a picture of my husband John riding our four year old mare, Dotto, No. 010666 on the annual week long trail ride, May 4 to 11 this year. The Rancheros Visitadores (Visiting Ranchers). It is a long hard ride each day, but he said he never had a better ride, and he has been going back each year since 1946. She never tired and walked much faster than most of the horses and her behavior on the tie lines at night was perfect. They are not allowed to ride stallions on this ride. My husband usually rides his "Waer's Red Hornet" (Dotto's sire, picture also enclosed, No. 11057, who also has a superior disposition. The tack on Dotto in the picture has a little story.

The 16 strand rawhide reins and 8 strand headstall were woven by a Spanish Californian named Luis B. Ortega, who is about the only one still making this fine work. He lives near Palo Alto in northern California. The bit is a Santa Barbara bit - an old Spanish design. The tie rope (horse hair) on the saddle is an "antique" once owned (and made for) Judge Drifful color-ful figure here at the turn of the century. The concho belt on John is an old Navajo one. The jacket or serape is Mexican. They wear some unusual costumes on this ride! They all wear leather name badges you can see in the photo. It tells their camp also.

I thought you might be interested in a real western Morgan when I ride on the ranch chasing cattle the rest of the time. I also ride her mother and full sister — both are as lovable as Dotto.

We enjoy your magazine each time. I save them all and take them to our tack room when we show horses. Our friends love to look through them.

New foals still claim priority in our news. Pat Hayward of TapNor Farm, recently moved from South Elgin to Kingston, Ill., reports two more, both chestnut colts, one to Libby Ashmore, sired by the Haywards' young stallion, Caven-Glo Revenue, and the other to Caven-Glo Rebel Gold, sired by Dorian Ashmore

The Eberline Morgans were visited by all in attendance, and very fine stock it is. Both stallions, Stetsa and Aaron Jay, were away in Colorado, however two foals would have kept the spotlight anyway! Dashing about at the sides of their dams, they were delightful to watch. Both fillies are chestnuts, the older a liver chestnut out of a half-Arab mare by Stetsa (his first) and the other, tentatively named Jaylene, an exceptionally high-headed filly out of Red Velvet (by Congo) sired by Aaron Jay (his first also). The other two youngsters are also fillies - the light bay Sherilette, a yearling by Dorset's Foxfire out of Fruita and the dark chestnut Melody, a two year old by Broadwall St. Pat out of Red Velvet. These two fireballs put on quite a show for the visitors when Gladys Eberline went into the corral to get them to trot!

The meeting was very short due to the other activities, the main discussion being directed to the forthcoming San-

ta Fe Horse Show. This one is a really big one for the Morgan - an all-breed show of stature, thirteen performance classes plus complete breeding classes are scheduled for us, making it the biggest Morgan show in New Mexico at this time. Having swamped our first show of the season, it is expected that entries at the Santa Fe show will follow suit. In truth, the entries in our shows indicate a strength that belies actuality. In comparison to other parts of the country, we have what might be described as a handfull of Morgans in the southwest - however, every mem-ber and owner is represented in both halter and performance classes, and this maximum support has resulted in the illusion that New Mexico is filling up with Morgan horses . . . this doesn't hurt our promotional program one bit, either! Further work on the New Mexico Code of Ethics has been postponed, pending revision. However, in lieu of having it ready for the Santa Fe Show, the judge will be instructed by the Show Committee representing both the Arabian and Morgan Divisions that the pleasure classes are to be judged as such, without exception.

It was with a great deal of regret that we said good-bye to our Roswell members, the Byard Bennett family. The Bennetts, including young Starr Ann and her mare Maribelle, are establishing residence near Ukiah, Calif. NMMHC will certainly miss their enthusiastic support, and our loss is a

very definite gain for northern Calif.

NMMHC's foals this month record a filly to the Everett Reeds' Merry Meade, (Sorry we haven't the sire's name) and another filly to the W. K. Woodards of Albuquerque! She is bay with large, perfect star, and is out of their June Magic by Windcrest Bob B. This has been a filly year — the only colt is a bay out of Brilliant Lady by Billy J Joker to the Circle C Ranch at Southmayd, Texas, and the Foy Crookhams.

At this time of year, many of us manage to keep up with crosscountry riding in addition to schooling in the ring for the shows. As a former Mississippi River flat-lander, the writer cannot help but smile each time the mighty Rio Grande is crossed. Right now it is as dry as the Sahara Desert (and looks just about the same). About the only kind thing that can be noted to its favor is that it is a whale of a place to work a horse . . . after all, how many have a chance to work their Morgans daily in a three-foot sandpile about a half-mile wide?

This was Frances Huling's first competitive ride on her new mount, Little Joe Morgan - guess she had been feeding him extra well - anyway the deep sand in the Mojave River took its toll in the last 21/2 miles and Little Joe did not receive an award. Frances got the Trailer Champ Award, however, for her 430 miles — one way — trip!

One other part Morgan, a Quarter cross, owned and ridden by Robert Moore, of Pacoima, Calif., placed 4th in the Heavyweight Division at Hesperia. Other winners included the Arabian who took top spot in Lightweight, a grade Quarter on top in the Junior group, some Thoroughbreds and part Thoroughbreds, grade quarters, one Tennessee Walking Horse in 2nd place in Lightweight, one Appaloosa and one part-Standardbred. Some 70 riders took part in this ride, camping out in mid-winter, horses tied to posts outside, only meals being taken inside. Our hats are off to both horses and riders

Concord

The second ride of 1963, a Class B, was held at Concord, just northeast of San Francisco, with good riding weather on old Mt. Diablo. Talk about luck the following weekend there was a heavy snowfall. The date was mid-March. This reporter was unable to attend, but garnered the names of the winners from management. However, the list of breeds was incompletely reported, which is of most interest to us here. Of my personal knowledge of the owners and their horses, I believe Little Joe Morgan was the only Morgan entered. He placed third in the Lightweight Division, with owner Frances Huling up. Top spot in this division went to Bill Smith on John Rogers' Arabian. In the 18 winners — six in each Division — 1 noted 5 awards to Arabians, 2 to Quarter Horses, one to a Missouri Fox-Trotting mare (an unusual breed in these parts).

In connection with the Concord Ride, it is interesting to note that Dr. H. P. Boyd, D.V.M. and prominent Morgan breeder of San Rafael, officiated as the required veterinarian judge and garnered tributes from all who worked with him for his quiet efficiency and careful judging. In all these NATRC Rides, it has been noteworthy that the breed preferred by either the Veterinarian judges or the horseman judges has not "colored" their decisions. Offhand, judges who have served on these rides have included polo players who prefer Thoroughbreds, Quarterhorse breeders, this one Morgan breeder Dr. Boyd, plus myself on the Las Vegas ride last year, Arabian fanciers, and others with no special preference.

Future of NATRC

A manual of regulations under the North American Trail Riding Conference is being prepared, which should assist future ride management groups as well as interested riders, to become more familiar with this enjoyable type of competition.

We look forward to the time when so many rides throughout the United States will be sanctioned by NATRC that Division and even State Championship Awards will be made as well as the National Awards now offered.

A great deal of research by competent riders and veterinarians has been done, and is still being done, to make this program much more important than the fine sport it is. forms the most hardy spores known. It may be found in certain non-acid soils, horse dung, and sometimes in human excreta. The germ usually causes trouble when its gets into a wound that heals rapidly and closes

over. In the absence of oxygen, it then grows and liberates the toxin which follows up nerve trunks. Upon reaching the spinal cord, the toxin produces the symptoms noted above.

Preventive measures include: reducing the probability of wounds, cleanliness, proper wound treatment, and vaccination with tetanus toxiod in areas where there is a high incidence of the disease. In "hot" areas, all valuable horses should be given the toxoid, which will give an immunity for one to two years. When a horse receives a wound from which tetanus may result, short term immunity can be conferred immediately by the use of te anus antitoxin; but such treatment is of questionable value once the symp.oms of the disease become evident.

Recommended treatment consists in cleaning and dressing all wounds, keeping the animal quiet — preferably in a dark stall away from flies, good nursing and feeding, and the proper drug or drugs administered by a veterinarian.

When an animal dies, it should be destroyed by burning or deep burial. Also, any bedding should be burned, and infected premises should be cleaned thoroughly and disinfected with a 5 per cent lye solution.

Morgan with high natural action. He certainly has average length feet and regular shoes. One thing is certain, long feet shorten the useful life of your horse. If you value your horse, keep a good natural foot under him.

Personally, I would like to see two additional classes at our National Show. One, performance under saddle with horses shown with not over a four inch toe and regular eight nail keg shoes without pads. The other class with same requirements in harness. Each of these classes should be \$500.00 classes to attract people and should be held early in the show. This type of class will encourage people to show the Morgan horse as he should be shown and discourage long feet and heavy shoes. In my opinion it's the only way to prove to people that the showy animated horse can win even though he has natural feet. It is encouraging to see the growth in the Pleasure Classes. More Morgans should be entered in trail

Showing Morgans must be popular as we now have 443 entries for our National Show. Most of these are from owners with one or two horses.

FUNQUEST FARM: The inheritance of color by horses is sometimes a little bewildering, even to the most learned. Color is controlled by inherited genes and other factors (perhaps genes) which lighten or darken the inherited color. These other factors seem to be independently inherited and, like the color genes, have dominant and recessive characteristics; the lighter shades being the most recessive.

Each foal inherits two color genes, one from each parent. One gene will be recessive and one dominant but either may be transmitted to offspring. The dominant color gene inherited determines the color of the foal. Chestnut is the most recessive of all colors and mating of chestnut to chestnut will produce only chestnut because if any other color gene had been present in either parent that parent would not have been chestnut.

Chestnut color ranges from light golden through red to almost black. The legs of a chestnut are never black but usually lighter at the coronets than the basic color. The mane and tail is usually the basic color or lighter but occasionally may be black or nearly so. Chestnuts with mane and tail darker than the basic color occur more frequently in Morgans than in any other breed.

Bay and brown should be considered genetically together; brown being a darkened shade of bay. Bay is dominant to chestnut and ranges from light sandy shades to dark mahogany with reddish high lights and black points — legs, mane and tail. The brown horse, like the bay, has black points and may be so dark as to be distinguishable from black only by a mealy nose and brown or reddish hair at the elbows, flank and belly.

A black horse is black all over with a black nose and no areas shading to brown. Black has been considered as dominant to bay and brown but for some, not yet definitely determined, reason does not reproduce itself as frequently as would be expected if it were produced by a simple color gene. Black, not frequently but occasionally, results from the mating of a bay and chestnut; probably as a result of other genes or color factors influencing or modifing the basic color genes so as to produce black. This could point to the conclusion that black is really between chestnut and bay in the scale of dominance and appears only when the other color factors which darken the color are inherited in proper combination with a bay gene.

Whether or not the above properly explains the arrival of three black foals at Funquest Farms this spring, we are not sure, but in any case we have three applications to submit for black foals from the mating of chestnuts to bays.
