Dear Sir:

It is my opinion that Morgan owners and breeders in the nation, speaking of them from various parts of the nation, all want to see the Morgan horse much more widely accepted, owned and used than is the case at present. Too, those who have seriously and unbiasedly considered how a much wider appreciation of the Morgan may be obtained recognize that there are some changes needed in the promotional activities for the breed. With your permission I should like to suggest some matters for consideration by your readers.

First, are the horses crowned National Champions at the National Morgan Show each year really the National Champions? Just how much of a national representation do we get from Morgan horses from various sections of the nation at this show? It is my understanding that there are more Morgan registrations in California each year than in any other state. How many California Morgans are exhibited at the National Morgan Show? There are some very excellent Morgan horses in many of our states, but these never reach the National Show and so it would seem fair to say that (Continued on Page 50)

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In Retrospect

The Republican convention kept us up the night before. The morning after we started the 18th National Show. 1959 was still fresh in our minds when the last class of Friday left the ring at 1:30 a.m. So we ran scared through Friday and polished off 30 classes by 1:00 a.m. Saturday, and felt smug about the new record! The morning after found us on the heels of a hurricane - "Brenda" by name. Mid-morning found us nearer to the hocks, and on our way to the stifles. The management arranged for cover in the cattle auction barn so that breed classes and the leadline class could be held. Exhibitors and entries slipped and slogged their way through 7 classes, and gave up in disgust about 3 p.m. After a favorable weather report, we had a "clearing" shower which inundated the fair grounds. The management spent the night feeding gasoline into a couple of auxiliary pumps so that entries might find a dry corner of the stall in which to stand. It wasn't all bad. If your stall was flooded, there was usually high ground just outside the door; or, if your stall was dry, you only had to wade to reach it! The morning after broke bright, clear, cool, and dry. Two lagoons had formed in the infield; the track on the inside rail was still gumbo; but the ring with the aid of shavings was usable. Through a special dispensation from the city fathers the show was allowed to start at 9 a.m. instead of 1 p.m. on Sunday. We took off at a run and didn't slow below a hand gallop all day. Breed classes were run on the track simultaneously with performance classes in the ring where the schedule would permit. The produce and get classes raced a setting sun. The championship saddle stake, the 40th class for the day, finally completed the show at 11:30 p.m. Our only satisfaction was that we had figured correctly on Saturday that with luck we would finish at 11 p.m. and without it we would be there until midnight on Sunday.

Now the morning after we assess the results. We have permanently alienated our friends. Countless exhibitors have been at least committed for observation. Our better half is still checking the numbers of non-existant entries in a non-existant ring. And the words here writen testify to at least a temporary lack of sanity in the author.

A year ago in this annual diatribe we made a heart rending appeal for a 4-day National Show. We apparently reached the wrong hearts. This year some will say we proved it could be done in 2 days! With 6 judges and ring-masters, exhibitors who were decathalon champions,, a triple talking announcer, and two more rings we could get it over with in 1 day; So lets spell it out a little plainer. The primary object of a breed show is to promote the breed. Some of us are Morgan-happy enough to plan our vacations around this show. While admittedly the location is far from being central, the number of Morgans available draws owners from the entire country. This number of Morgan enthusiasts gathers but once a year with the one desire to talk horse. What happens? You as exhibitors don't have time to talk, eat, sleep, or criticize the judging. You leave for home in the dead of night and arrive in a semi-comatose condition. If you are lucky enough to have had someone mark a program, you find out what happened about one week after you reach home. When you decide to only take one entry next year so you won't be in every class, the show falls apart.

Classes in the show have been timed for years. We know that it takes forty hours of showing to complete the present schedule. We have watched the crowd melt out of the grandstand at 10:30 p.m. after taking all the seat could endure. Our classes with most crowd appeal go on at 12:30! Showing 9 to 12, 1 to 5, and 7 to 11 equals 11 hours for a day. Thirty-three hours for 3 days still leaves 7 hours of show for Sunday afternoon championship classes. Under this schedule you would know whether you had remembered to eat before you fell flat on your face. We rest our case.

One thing about the rain, it gave us a welcome opportunity to visit the stables and talk horse. The Green Mt. Boys were still fortunately in executive session. Their tack room did not win an award, but was none the less well appointed. Every judge to his own taste, with or without 10 drops of water. Speaking of tack rooms, the University of Massachusetts was hot after the award and got it. But not without continuously picking up rubbish discarded in

1960 National Morgan Horse Show

Nine years ago our National Show first came to Northampton. There have been many changes. Except for Dr. Russ Smith and his wife, Ruth, all the listed officials have changed. Our thanks go to these two who, serving as announcer and secretary, keep the show running smoothly once it starts. Our thanks also to W. Briceland Nash, who as representative of the Directors of the Fairgrounds, has always been around, interested and helpful. We missed for the first time our tireless and pleasant ring-master Ivan M. Williams and that well-known veterinarian Dr. Francis M. Austin. May they rejoin us next year. Their places were capably filled by Ralph C. Gillett and Dr. Frederick C. Ruder, Jr. Managers wear out the quickest. William B. Roberts was in his second year assisted by a new-comer Warner H. Carter. Whatever their troubles were, we were not aware of them. To all appearances all went well, weather permitting. The steward was Mrs. Floyd A. Thompson, the Equitation judge Miss Jean Campbell both repeating from last year. Breed and performance judges are seldom repeated, but both Dr. C. D. Parks and Mr. N. K. Carnes served in 1957.

I want to commend the food concession. The members of the little United Church of Pelham did a marvelous job from early morning to late at night serving a great variety of food constantly, quickly and pleasantly and running a mobile canteen during the flood. The church must have been nearly empty on Sunday and the whole congregation exhausted on Monday. May their church gleam with paint or have new carpets or whatever the need.

The entries grow and grow. In 1954, when I wrote this report, there were 251 horses from 100 owners and 29 junior exhibitors listed in the program. This year there were a total of 351 horses from 194 owners and 76 juniors. The added new stalls only just accommodated the horses and tackroom needs. Since entry fees have risen from zero when we first came here to four dollars an ordinary class, and since money prizes do not exist except in the stake classes, the exhibitors come because of the enormous prestige of

this show to the breed and also just for the fun of being part of this big and successful undertaking in our Morgan "family life."

For nine years the sun has smiled on this show, except for a rare brief shower. This year it poured rain all Saturday. About 30 young people dripped through their 4-H Fitting and Showing class for an hour and a half (won by Alan Knapp). One end of a cattle barn was freed of stored machinery for our use in in-hand classes. The noise and confusion created by about 20 mares and foals, spectators, officials, handlers and whippers-in all mixed up together, had to be witnessed to be believed. That no one and no horse was kicked is a credit to both horses and handlers.

Very fortunately all the stall floors had been filled up this spring with dirt to be above such a flood as this. However in the roadways water collected to over knee-height in certain areas. Children had a wonderful time splashing around in it and poling a raft from barn to barn. Adults gave up trying to keep dry feet and took their shoes off to paddle around bare-The track and ring was a clay slime. The fire department tried to keep ahead of the downpour with their pumps and finally won out. However through all this the horses were dry, and the people gay and good-natured. On Sunday morning the sun shone and the management settled down to run off almost all Saturday's as well as

they achieved by midnight. All the official placings follow this report but for emphasis the mature champions and the reserves are listed below. Despite new exhibitors and new horses, search of the records shows that at least 13 of these 14 horses have appeared in our National ring before, and been found good in the eyes of earlier judges. The most conspicuous is Windcrest Donfield who as a two-year old owned by the Loyd Marks, first won Grand Champion Stallion in 1953 and has got it four times since as well as twice championships in harness and saddle. Last but not least in this writer's opinion is the Reserve Pleasure Champion, Lord Jeff who as a two-

year old in 1954 won the model gelding class for his first owner, myself.

The offering of gelding classes, championship and stake has increased both in the quantity and quality of the gelding entry. In 1954 9% of the entries were geldings, this year 14%.

Classes other than the championships have marked significance for certain exhibitors. To the breeder, Get of Sire and Produce of Dam are THE classes. The first was won for the second time by Orcland Leader, the second by Mayphil. Leader received the challenge trophy given in honor of Upwey Ben Don who won this class five times before retirement from the ring. Ted Davis was greatly missed, but the presence of Mrs. Davis and his daughters and sons-in-law was much appreciated and the prevalence of the Wind-crest name in the winning entries keeps alive and honored his work for the breed.

To those who enter it, no class engenders the competitive feeling more than the Justin Morgan Performance class. This year the entry seemed very superior and the races were swift and clean. In the past this has sometimes been a rather sorry spectacle. This year Bay State Classic won over U. S. Panez, a reversal of last year.

Speaking of races and speed classes, the unbeatable George Gobel had been withdrawn from harness racing to give others a chance but the win still went

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Reports of National Morgan Horse Club Continued Progress

Treasurer's Report

The financial condition of the Club reflects the steady increase in income derived from all departments—membership, registrations, transfers, the National Show and the MORGAN HORSE MAGAZINE.

In 1959, our gross income amounted to \$28,410, as compared with \$21,581 in 1958. The ordinary expenses in 1959 were \$12,198.02 as compared with \$7,288 in 1958, the net for 1959 being \$16,212 as compared with \$14,292 in 1958. This result, on top of the evidence of a steady increase during the past few years, encouraged the Directors to take the first step toward the establishment of a breed office which would be wholly supported by the Club. This office did not begin functioning until toward the end of 1959. Hence none of the costs are reflected in these figures which have been quoted.

In 1959 membership dues paid amounted to \$3,125, almost an identical figure with 1958. Registration fees on the other hand, increased in 1959 to \$10,440, as compared with \$7,710 in 1958. Transfer fees likewise increased in 1959 to \$6,745 from \$5,995 in 1958.

The net income from the National Morgan Horse Show was \$6,140 in 1959, as compared with \$4,096 in 1958.

The MORGAN HORSE MAGA-ZINE nearly broke even in both years, but in the first six months of 1960 the Magazine was in the black. In the first six months of 1960, registration fees amounted to \$4,200 as compared with \$3,700 the first six months of 1959, and transfer fees \$3,571, compared with \$3,115 in 1959. These figures indicate that the progress which has been evident in recent years is continuing.

The cost of the Hartford office for the first six months, including salaries and rent and other routine charges amounted to \$6,356, but this period has proved that this can be handled by current income without dipping into reserves.

After this new expense, the Club showed a net income of \$2,700 for the first six months in 1960.

The National Morgan Horse Show promises to be as successful as last year's financially as well as otherwise, and given decent weather for the various sessions, returns from it should equal that of 1959. Altogether it seems safe to say that the Club is in a sound financial position at the moment with good prospects for continuing so.

Secretary's Report

The steady growth of the breed must be obvious to nearly all the members for the increased number of Morgan people who are playing an active part in their localities is evidence of this as well as the wider distribution of ownership.

Membership in the Club is well sustained and continues to gain. The number of paid members changes daily. Some new members are added, many renew their memberships and some do not. At present we have 661 paid members but there are 824 on the list. We do not remove their names from the list until they are in arrears for one year. Last year at this time there were 750 on our list.

Registrations in the AMERICAN MORGAN HORSE REGISTER continue steady growth. In 1959, 870 were registered as compared with 630 in 1958 and 554 in 1957.

Recorded transfers of ownership also increased in 1959, there being nearly 1,000, 998 to be exact, as compared with 910 in 1958 and 758 in 1957. This, of course, is evidence of the increasing demand for Morgan horses.

The work of the Secretary's Office, which has increased so steadily in recent years, taxed the facilities at 90 Broad Street to the limit and beyond. In view of the steady growth of the breed and the work of the Register, the Directors felt that the time had come to make a beginning toward the establishment of a breed office supported by

the Club. Mr. Seth Holcombe was appointed Assistant Secretary and Assistant Registrar. He spent three months in the New York office becoming familiar with the work of the Register. By November in 1959, the Directors felt that the time had come to establish a separate office for the Register to be under Mr. Holcombe's charge. Excellent quarters were found in the new Post Office building in West Hartford, Connecticut, a few miles from Mr. Holcombe's home, and this office began functioning immediately thereafter. At present all the routine work connected with the Register is carried on in that office. There is constant contact between that and the New York office so that questions of policy and detail in registration matters can be settled expeditiously.

Morgan owners throughout the country are becoming more and more interested in the showring and the number of shows offering Morgan classes is steadily increasing. The Club has increasing requests from the various Morgan sections of the country for awards and trophies for local shows.

Our National Morgan Horse Show, which has grown so rapidly, is one of the outstanding all breed shows in the United States.

During the past year, the Directors have given final approval to a revision of the By-laws of the Club which was the result of a report of a special Committee appointed for the purpose. At various Directors' meetings the original draft was revised and the final revision adopted. These have been published in the MORGAN HORSE MAGAZINE and reprints were made which can be secured by any members who desire copies.

The MORGAN HORSE MAGA-ZINE continues to grow in the matter of subscriptions, Mr. Otho Eusey, whose firm prints the Magazine, has devoted much of his personal time to it for many years. He deserves more cooperation from the membership. There are, of course, many ways in which it can be improved but in order to accomplish this the Club will eventually have to retain someone to devote full time to it.

Altogether it is obvious that the Club is in a healthy condition and its influence constantly increasing.

National Morgan Horse Club Annual Meeting

Following a dinner attended by 200 members and their families and guests, the Annual Meeting of The Morgan Horse Club was held at Hotel Northampton, Northampton, Massachusetts, on Thursday evening, July 28, 1960. There were sixty-one members present in person and officers had received 195 proxies from absentees.

Following the call to order by Mr. Gerald F. Taft, President, the members heard the reports of the Secretary and Treasurer covering the operations in 1959, and a digest of the actions taken at the various meetings of the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee since the last meeting of members.

Members were present from all the New England and Mid-Atlantic States, and from Florida, Ohio, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Iowa and Kansas.

In accordance with the revised bylaws, the fifteen Directors for the coming year were elected in five groups, namely, five for one year, five for two years, and five for three years. Those elected were as follows:

One-year term:

Gene Angel, Ohio; F. B. Hills, New York; Walter Kane, Michigan; Keynith Knapp, Vermont; Darwin Morse, Massachusetts.

Two-year term:

H. P. Boyd, California; Joseph R. Brunk, Illinois; Vincent Rogers, New York; Clarence Shaw, Washington; Whitney Stone, New York.

Three-year term:

Marilyn Childs, Pennsylvania; Anna Ela, Massachusetts; J. Cecil Ferguson, Rhode Island; Stanley Sahlstrom, Minnesota; Gerald F. Taft, Michigan.

There was an animated discussion by members from the various sections of the country in regard to Morgan matters of both national and local interest. In accordance with the announced intention of the President to ask for an increase of registration and transfer in the American Morgan Horse Register, a resolution was passed increasing fees by \$5 in each category of registration and transfer, this to take effect as of January 1, 1961. The postmarked date on letters received in the office of the Registrar will determine the fees in each case.

There was a discussion of the prob-

lems relative to the National Morgan Horse Show with a report from some members of the Show Committee.

There was a vote of thanks to Mrs. Eugene Holden of Amherst for her energetic work in connection with

this year's show.

In discussing the Show for 1961, Mrs. Holden proposed a resolution which was adopted requiring that in the make-up of the Show Committee, there be at least five members of The Morgan Horse Club. the horses tied as Champions at the National Morgan Show are really only sectional champions rather than national champions. Now how can we make the National Morgan Horse Show really national in scope and in competition? That is one of our most important questions for discussion and decision.

With the National Morgan Horse Show held in New England each year, Morgan owners in that area are favored in travel and expense to get to the show. Those from the middle west have 1500 miles to travel with their horses while we in the west have 2750 miles to travel. That is just too far for 90% of all Morgan owners to travel and transport their horses. So long as the National is cornered in New England, as at present, it will never be a National show except in name.

For the consideration of the Morgan owners and breeders, I suggest that the National Morgan Horse Show be moved to Chicago, Illinois. The excellent facilities of the Chicago International Arena would be available for this purpose and it is a very fine place to exhibit. Or the Illinois State Fair Grounds at Springfield, Illinois, would be a nice place and just about central in the nation. With the show held at one of these points, and intensively promoted we would take a big step in increasing Morgan horse acceptance and appreciation. Too, the Morgan owners in New York, Pennsyl-

vania, New Jersey and New England points would have a travel expense and distance not too far to be impossible for them. We here in the west would still have much farther than our eastern friends, yet I am certain the extent of our exhibitors and the number of horses would be substantially increased.

A second suggestion is that we begin by holding the National Morgan Horse Show in Chicago for a couple of years as a test. If it doesn't prove out as some of us feel certain it will, then return it to New England. Furthermore, if it does prove very successful in Chicago, we could still return it to New England every third or fifth year for historical reasons.

This is something that should be submitted to the Morgan owners at large for their comments and suggestions. It is too important to be decided otherwise. So maybe these suggestions may serve as a beginning and the discussion move along from here. Very certain am I that even with widespread discussion we do not necessarily have to make the final move immediately. My only thought is to get a report from the various sections of the nation and from a wide number of Morgan owners and breeders.



He then showed some basic dressage movements and finished the performance with a low bow. Cavendish loves an audience and the audience loves him and that's the perfect combination!

Roy's father then said "load her up, we'll take her to the Show." She wasn't in White River Junction two hours until Elmer Darling bought her for \$1,200. Roy's father reserved the right to show her and she won almost that much at the Show. So, it all depends on who looks at your horse, I guess.





their area by their competitors. It's the first tack room we have seen with window boxes.

We made no call for a physician during the show. We expected a couple of opportunities. One exhibitor's mount slipped in a wet spot at a hand gallop and steamrollered the rider. climbed back on, and got and deserved more of an ovation than if he had won a championship. Another entry showed his distaste for a show buggy at the in-gate at the same time his St. Bernard stablemate was clearing the grandstand after being challenged by a lesser pup. Our outlook on the whole show has changed - by about 10 feet. The steward's stand now has 26 steps, as anyone who made a post entry well knows. It was embedded in concrete and reinforced with angle iron and further embellished with plexiglass sides. In fact, it became such a permanent fixture that it could not be moved, and the ring was moved 50 feet instead. This made the in-gate that much farther from the stables, and further exhausted exhibitors in the breed classes. With our crow's nest thus elevated we checked the entries in the ring below with field glasses. Next year we'll ask for a chair-lift.

It was the biggest Morgan show on record, and yet the quality of horses held up or even improved. All entries were a credit to the breed. When post

entries were totalled, there were 370 Morgans in 77 classes. Eighty kids registered as 4-H members or as entrics in horsemanship classes. (The 4-H class was baptized by the hurricane, and showed for an hour and a half before seeking cover.) 169 exhibitors were represented. These are the people who make a show. Their ability and willingness to train, fit, and show their Morgans will always be the greatest contributing factor to the promotion and ever increasing popularity of the Morgan horse. Individually most of us can do little; Collectively we can do a lot. A breed show of this caliber proves it, and represents the finest type of promotion activity possible. Those who started and kept this Morgan snowball moving would be proud of the present results.

As in recent National Shows classes were well filled. The harness pairs and parade classes had the fewest entries; make a note for next year. The family class is beginning to look like the saddle pairs; we can recall as many as 7 riders in one entry in the past. We are told the ladies' side saddle class is popular in some sections. More roadster classes would add color - maybe under and over 15 hands. Pleasure English — under 18, pleasure driving, ladies' saddle mare, 4-H fitting and showing, and road hack classes could well be split. And with a four-day show they could be.

The show was not only the biggest, but also the fastest moving. The ability of exhibitors to get to the in-gate before the last stable call was nothing short of miraculous. The judges handled the classes expeditiously under some of the worst conditions. The ringmaster managed the ring traffic efficiently. (At our last meeting he escorted Miss Universe into the ring at Woodstock; at our first meeting as teen-agers we were entrusted with the shovel detail at a boys camp stable in the Berkshires!) Untold numbers of others lined up by the managers performed their appointed tasks so effectively that even a hurricane could not stop a Morgan horse

Our last picture of the 1960 National took place in the lagoon that was left by the hurricane in the infield. We could sport no fancy flamingoes. One exhibitor, however, had the poor judg ment to select a goose as a stable mascot. The goose was last seen propelling itself at a speed that would do justice to a 35 h.p. outboard on an 8 ft. dinghy. Have you ever seen a "gingered" goose?
