The President's Corner

This year the Morgan Horse Club, Inc., put on the greatest National Morgan Horse Show in its history with 463 registered top quality Morgan horses participating. Many of the exhibitors were showing one or two horses which is a very healthy condition for the Morgan breed.

One morning our competent show Chairman, Mr. Nathaniel F. Bigelow telephoned me saying we would need 488 stalls which meant we were short 48 stalls. I could hardly believe him.

Fortunately we were able to secure two tents of twenty-four stalls each.

The show committee did a terrific job both before and during the show and it is hard to believe a show of this size could run so smoothly.

Each class although large, was run on time and the exhibitors were ready with no waiting between classes and co-operated with their fellow exhibitors to make the show a great success.

Our West Hartford office is to be complimented on the tremendous job they did in getting out prize lists and processing entries. Whether some of our members appreciate it or not, Mr. Seth P. Holcombe and his able assistant Miss Helen Nye do a lot more than is expected of them. One thing is absolutely certain and that is the registering of Morgans is in good hands.

It is very helpful indeed to have our directors travel so far to assist at the meetings, Dr. Boyd from California, Mr. Leo Beckley from Oregon, Mr. Hazard from Kansas, Mr. Roy Brunk from Illinois and now we have Mrs. Wm. Barton from Illinois and Mr. Voorhis from New York.

Unfortunately for the first time turnbuckles with metal straps to hold the shoes on were used at our National Show. Nails are no longer strong enough to hold the heavy shoes with such long feet. It was our opinion this was covered by our rules which forbid the use of artificial appliances.

Our directors felt our rules covered this device and voted nine to one forbidding horses with turnbuckles to be allowed in the show ring. It is evidently necessary for our rules to be more explicit. The Welch Pony people had to do this and their rules are as follows: Page 198 Sec. 3. 1963 A.W.P.A. Rule Book.

ARTIFICIAL APPLIANCES AND IRRITANTS

"Any pony wearing turnbuckles, equipment or devices other than those permitted in specific classes and any pony showing evidence of the use of ginger or other irritants to produce a higher tail carriage than the natural position shall be disqualified from the class in which it is showing."

The old trouble of long feet and heavy shoes still prevails and I am pleased to say our directors approved a saddle and harness class for next year's National, each to be a \$500.00 purse class for horses under 15 hands to be shown with $4\frac{1}{4}$ " maximum toe and over 14 hands $4\frac{1}{2}$ " maximum toes. There shall be no pads and shoes cannot weigh over 18 ounces. I sincerely hope this will be a step in the right direction.

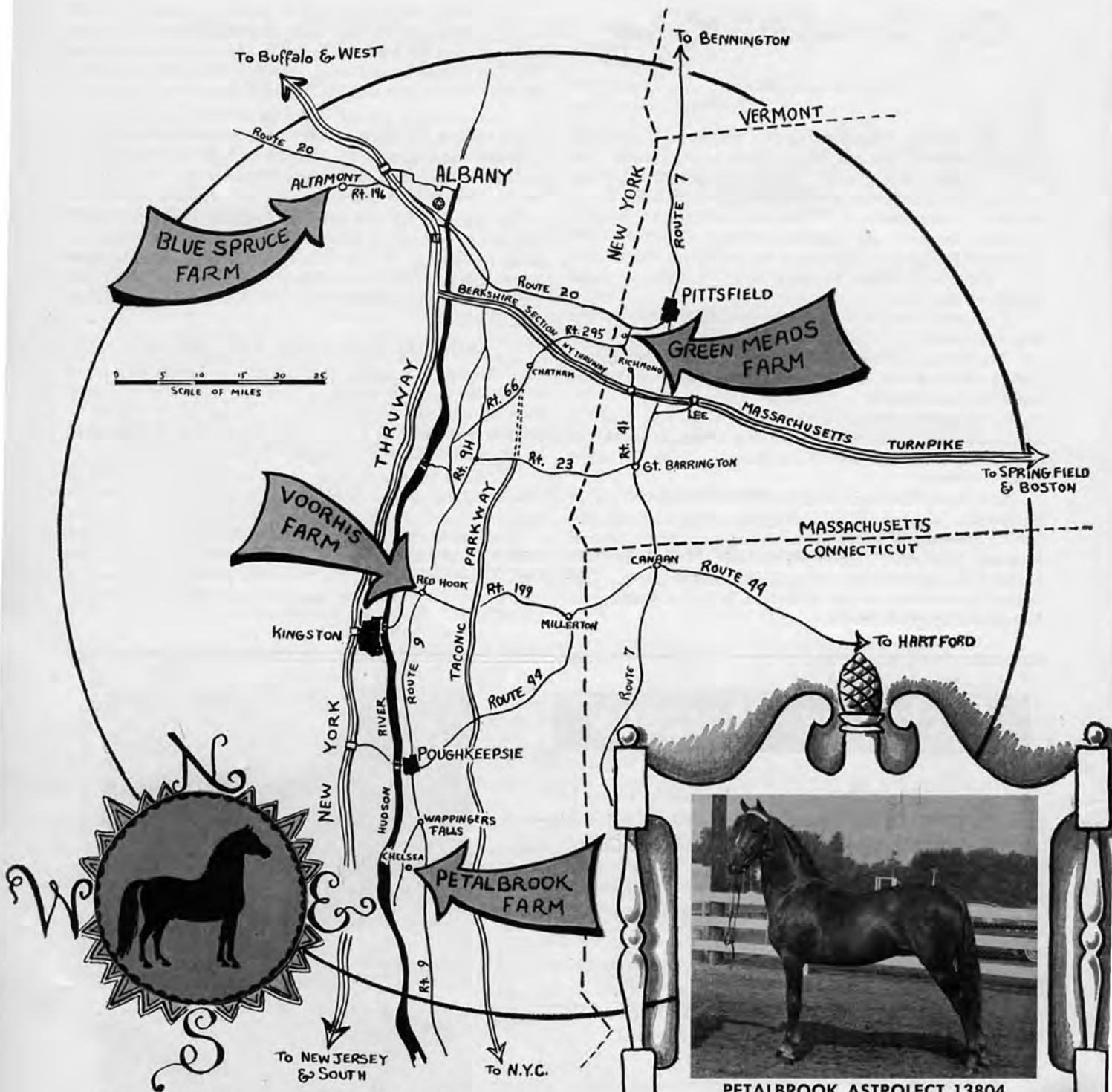

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The 1963 National Morgan Horse Show

More of everything was, in general, the characteristic of the 1963 National Morgan Horse Show. More horses (464 compared to 396 last year), and naturally more of their people, stalls, trailers, vans and cars. More heat, during the day it was usually in the high nineties. A thermometer in Northampton registered 102 degrees. Four days and three nights of heat sealed in with humidity were endured. Man and

beast really stewed. Consequently one of the few aspects that did not increase was the number of spectators. It took really dedicated folks to sit even in the shade of the grandstand to watch this show, but the Morgan National has plenty of those and so the attendance did not appear to drop. Despite the increased traffic problems and the heat not one illness or accident happened to man or horse to mar the serenity of

this show. A few folks fainted from the heat, which was certainly understandable. The pleasant and effective Mobile Police from Springfield were a great asset in traffic control.

The final "more" is that this was the smoothest National that I and others, who have lived with it for years, have ever experienced. From the moment

it got off at 9:00 A.M. on Thursday morning, until it closed on Sunday, it ran on a track oiled with efficiency, good temper and good will. The credit for this falls on two people, Nat Bigelow, Show Chairman and Russ Smith, Master of Ceremonies. They will deny this and spread the credit widely and certainly their two hard-working wives should be included. Members of the committee and show-time helpers, conscientiously and ably prepared and carried out the immense amount of detail needed for a show of this magnitude. However, at all times Nat was right there assuming full responsibility for the handling of any problems that arose and Russ, from his tower above the ring, kept an experienced eye and a calm voice over all the doings within his extensive vision from

the kids on the roof of the grandstand to the shoe that some horse had just cased in the ring, and the woman who had fainted at the rail.

In the handling of the classes we bow gratefully to our two ringmasters who instead of "spelling" each other seemed to work together in the ring most of the time - Ivan Williams and Bob Aninger. When you consider that two harness classes had 27 and 21 entries each, the first with 4-wheeled vehicles, you can see that able ringmasters are a blessing in this show. Lastly it was a pleasure to see our three breed and performance judges - Mr. Kiser, Mr. Carnes and Mr. Rooks adjudicate with the sureness and deliberate speed of thoroughly experienced big-show judges.

Before writing this article I asked a few people their general impression and it was the same as mine, that it was the "nicest" national ever held since it got so big. The credit for that rests with the exhibitors who this year behaved as well as their Morgans. It is often said that one of the advantages of owning a Morgan was knowing the people that went with the breed. It certainly was true this year. It would be hard to find a pleasanter bunch of folks - good tempered, helpful and cooperative. Before the start of the show on Thursday, their tempers had certainly been tried in a furnace of their own making - stall assignments. I refer to the impossibility of keeping to planned stall assignments when the exhibitors at the last moment brought in more or fewer horses than they had originally entered. Even two weeks before the show it became apparent that it would be impossible to have stall assignments in the program in sufficient numbers, validly confirmed to make such a listing worthwhile. This was due in part to the fact that the usual changes in entry are magnified by an increase in the total horses, and partly because of the "bug" affecting horses made even more uncertain whether or not they could be shown. So on Tuesday and Wednesday when the flood of entries reached the fairgrounds the confusion on stabling was extreme, but the exhibitors themselves pitched in to help the management solve the problem. Two of the cattle barns and two tents were filled with temporary stalls in addition to the more than 400 permanent racetrack stalls. Speaking of the horse "bug" apparently earlier sick horses recovered and were post-entered and others were cancelled, but during the show both at the barns and in the ring there seemed to be no coughing of any consequence.

Just as they had helped in the stall crisis, throughout the show the exhibitors helped to make it run like clockwork - great thanks and credit to them. Four physical changes had been made in the set-up of the grounds all of which increased safety and serenity and most of which caused a little more inconvenience to the exhibitors, but those of you who were there know them and outgates and bridges or their lack are too technical to trouble the rest of you with. They were accepted, with very will by the exhibitors even if they had to walk further or ride further to gain their objective. One of these was, however, a raised platform at the ringside for the off-duty judges. They and other officials were further barricaded from the

public by a fence. If the exhibitors felt thwarted of the chance to attack the judges, no one said so. Only one exhibitor, a small boy, in the four days crashed the barrier.

The three judges (I hope that Mrs. Marks will excuse me for not including her Fitting and Showing classes in this report) have all judged here before. They found a great improvement in the show and in the Morgans in general. They noticed especially the hard condition of the horses which seemed to be little affected by the heat. The better condition of the horses was noted in the better muscling of the hind quarters as compared to their former experience of Morgans at this show. The general level of fitting and presentation of the Morgans was higher than they had experienced before. Morgan owners will be pleased to hear that one of the judges was heard to remark that Morgans had beautiful and expressive faces.

Despite 68 more entries than last year, the general average of class size was not appreciably greater than last year, except for some classes like the really gorgeous Mares and Geldings in Harness (27 entries actually in the ring), and the Pleasure Driving Stake (21 in the ring). I had the impression that Morgan owners were becoming a little more sophisticated about appropriate classes for their horse. No longer does an owner show his pride and joy in in-hand, harness saddle pleasure and a few other odds and ends like racing and jumping. In fact it might be that the greater selectivity of entry was the factor that gave the judges the impression that the Morgans were better fitted and presented this year. Most owners seemed to realize that although their entry was very good in some ways, he really could not be expected to be all things to all judges. This is a reasonable and fair attitude to everybody and especially the horse. Oh yes, I'll have an argument from some of you on this — the Morgan is different, he's versatile. Well, yes, but the fitting and training for the different categories of classes is quite different. The same Morgan can and has performed very well indeed "across the board," at this show with the maximum of competition, but seldom, if ever, in any one year.

The 1960 change of wording in the Morgan Division rules on length of toe and weight of shoe really seems to have taken hold. Several people have spontaneously spoken of it. Of course there were exceptions but as you looked at

the line-up and saw and heard the horses move, their feet seemed to be their natural appendages. There was much less of the flip-flop, slam and pound of excessive toe-length and shoe-weight. Incidentally while on the subject of feet, nails would seem to be the appropriate device, within the spirit of the Morgan rules to hold a shoe on with. It's the letter of the law that decides, but nails, rather than straps of leather or metal, save a lot of emotional wear and tear outside the ring.

During some of the sessions I saw none of the classes since I spent much of my time resting on my new invest-

ment, an aluminum arm chair, in front of my stall in between bathing the horse and mopping her and myself. This is a very peaceful way to attend a hot four-day show, especially with Russ's pleasant voice bringing the news from the battle front.

However on Sunday having taken my entry home covered with modest glory, thanks to her young girl rider, I joined the brass on the judges' platform and absorbed the show and from the ring-side at a few other sessions. Several classes were increased this year — the

Parade class was stunning for this show. Several pairs showed up to make Harness Pairs a lovely class. Cavalcade Americana really caught on, and it must have been hard on the judges that there were more entries than ribbons. Some people have suggested that all entries have a ribbon in this class and possibly that no placings be made. There was a very high quality this year of vehicle, costume and authenticity. The Justin Morgan Performance class had a very good turn-out with keen competition. The races were so heavily entered that they had to start in rows. The mannerliness of the young entry on Thursday, even in big harness classes is a credit to the breed.

One very important class has dropped

so low that some artificial stimulant must be applied to it, hopefully not a financial reward. I refer to the Sire and Get Class, which with the Dam and Produce class are the two most important classes for breeders in the show. Back in the old days when the stallion honored in its trophy won the class five years running, breeders were perfectly willing to try for the red ribbon. It used to be a big and showy class for which reason it has always been scheduled for one of our larger audience sessions, but it cannot be sacrificed to the whoops and hollas of the crowd as if it was an entertainment. In no way do I want to detract from the winner. This is his second win in this class and he is a fine stud with a great line-up of

get behind him, but his owner, too, must have been disappointed by the lack of competition since no matter how fine the second place horse, a yearling or weanling offspring is no real measure of his potential. Possibly it would increase entry to hold the class on Saturday morning when there would be no excuse of pending stake classes to withhold entry of sire or get, and when there would be no appreciable audience to invite a dramatic performance.

The dressage exhibition of Dr. Hans van Schaik riding High Pastures Samson was beautiful. This training, basic as it is, is still foreign to most American horsemen so that the work that goes into it and fine points of its execution is

often not appreciated although familiar to practically all schooled riders across the oceans to our east and west, and happily increasingly within our own country due to international competition and pony club work. However, anyone watching the graceful, smooth and "happy" movements of Samson from collected to extended gaits, in turns, and in two-tracking at the walk, trot and canter must have noticed how well-coordinated, balanced, and comfortably he moved like a well-conditioned and muscularly controlled athlete which he had become under his trainer and rider's teachings. The exhibition was a fine tribute both to the natural ability and intelligence of the horse and to the horsemanship of Dr.

van Schaik. It compared favorably with the dressage phase of the 3-day horses at the 1960 Olympics which I had the privilege of watching.

In this report I have named none of the ribbon winners, you will find them listed in the placings and also the pictures of the championship and stake winners and many others. Congratulations to all of them, it was a great show and our Morgans, and their owners and handlers made it so.

Anatomy of A Horse Show

Like a model horse the 1963 show was beautifully put together with no noticeable blemishes, and it got off its hocks and really moved. About the only way it can be discussed beyond that point is to dissect it; so, here goes!

Weather. To borrow from Mark Twain everyone talked about it: no one did anything about it, with the possible exception of those who expressed their displeasure by passing out. The temperature remained relatively constant between 95 and 102 degrees throughout the four days. Mr. Twain also suggested that if you didn't like New England weather, wait 10 minutes. In this case we waited a week. You'll be disheartened to know that two days after the show we are shivering at 60 degrees.

Statistics. Four hundred sixty-four (464) entries were shown by 243 exhibitors and 15 youngsters in 4-H and equitation. Along with tack they occupied 498 stalls. Forty-eight stalls had to be set up under canvas, and other temporary stalls occupied the beef and sheep barns. While spectators were invited to visit the stables, there just was not time to take them all in. It wasn't a question of whether exhibitors liked their stalls; they were thankful if they got one! In 1953 we held the largest exhibition of all previous Morgan shows — 200 entries. Last year it almost doubled with 399 entries and 195 exhibitors. This year the roof fell in with 65 more entries and we had no qualms about claiming the title of the largest one-breed show in the world!

Judging. The team of judges worked the show efficiently. They were systematic in their work (which goes under the name of "adjudication" whether you like it or not), and left little doubt as to what they were looking for. As a result the announcement of placings was almost superfluous, and only confirmed what the spectators could already see. Of course, judging being an opinion, and second-guessing an all-American sport, it turned out that only 84 blue ribbon winners agreed wholeheartedly with the placings. But this was ever so!

Program. The souvenir program was the biggest yet — 104 pages. It was full of general Morgan information for the initiate. The arrangement was decidedly improved. The column for placings beside each class was easier to work with than previous designs.

The pink insert carrying the schedule and index of classes could be easily removed by exhibitors and tacked on the stable wall. In all it provided more Morgan data than any of the previous twenty, and should keep the hot-stove league going for another year. Only one error came to our attention, and we apologized to the club involved. It must be fun to be a typesetter. Proof reading a program such as this is a real chore, and until all entries are named Justin Morgan and all exhibitors named Smith, there will always be a few errors. But if you thought the printing errors bad, remember those in pronunciation. If you got in the ribbons more than once, I could at least give you a variety of pronunciations from which to choose. If your name was mentioned only once, I probably goofed it, and here and now apologize.

Music. National shows are more and more identified with the music of Joe Nickerson, organist at the last 10 or 12 shows. Joe does not read music, but plays off the top of his head. He has an uncanny ability to pick up the beat of the class in the ring, and to follow it at the walk, trot and canter. His composition, "The Morgan Horse Trot," just naturally evolved from repeated performances at the show. This year 45 rpm (or mph; I'm not sure) records of this Morgan masterpiece were available for the first time, and hundreds were purchased at the show. The flip side carries "Go Maggie, Go," an improvisation on "When You and I Were Young Maggie." It will come in handy at ringside while working your horse, or it can be used as a dance record with a polka beat. Or, just for listening pleasure, it will bring back memories of Morgan shows. We don't suggest that it replace the National Anthem, but local Morgan clubs might well be interested in its purchase and distribution.

Classes. Practically every class when lined up facing the grandstand stretched from ingate to outgate. In fact some had to line up in two tiers, this in spite of scratches coming in rapidly because of the heat. A few classes were disappointing from lack of entries, notably the get and produce classes and the family class. However, other classes lightly filled in other years made up for them.

The Cavalcade class came up with 10

Russell Scores Again

The Sunday News of July 21, 1963, New York's picture Newspaper with more than twice the circulation of any other paper in America, carried a full two pages on the Morgan horse. Exploding with such titles as, "The Horse That Has Everything," and "The World Has Never Seen Their Like," George Russell paraded the Morgan horse and the National Morgan Horse Show before the eyes of millions of Sunday news readers. His early interest in the Morgan breed as a boy on a farm has helped tremendously to publicize the modern-day Morgan. His 1963 contribution was spectacular; A pictorial back page spread in the Sunday News was splashed with seven pictures and captioned, "The Horse That Has Everything." These photos featured Morgans such as Gay Dancer, showing style in English tack; Marilyn Childs' Lippitt Mandate demonstrating jumping ability; Ulendon, 25 year old vet, winning stone boat pull; Upwey Ben Don; the champion pair of Parade and his son Drum Major; and the Mounted Police of Washington, D. C. The force is almost entirely Morgan, a police favorite because of the breed's easy handling.

The inside page, "The World Has Never Seen Their Like," unfolded the story of the Morgan — from an old Yankee family that is today the star of the biggest U. S. breed show. Here again George Russell pictured Morgans, a scene from last year's National Show at Northampton, Mass, the judging of the sire and get class.

The article written, as only a lover of the breed, and one who is a top news writer could create, promoted the National Show, which opened the following week, and then exploited the Morgan breed. How it all began with Justin Morgan, the man, born in Springfield, Mass. in 1747. This man's many self taught abilities and an even keener interest, a consuming passion for fine "blooded" horses. Mr. Russell's history of the sturdy bay, Figure (now known as Justin Morgan) and how he came into Justin Morgan's possession "as part payment on a debt", was followed up by the sensational comeback made by the present day Morgan.

A "tip of the hat" to George Russell, for all he has done in publicizing our Morgans through newspapers, radio and television. (He recently was interviewed on national television about our

THE HORSE FARM

Location and Headquarters

Under some conditions, a horseman may have one neighbor who is a cattleman, a second who is a fruit farmer, a third who has a sizeable farm flock of sheep, and a fourth whose chief source of income is from grain. All may be successful and satisfied with their respective enterprises. This indicates that several types of farming may be nearly equally well adapted to a given area or region.

Location of Horse Farm Headquarters

Once the farm or ranch has been selected, most horsemen give too little attention to the location of the headquarters. They fail to recognize that the headquarters or farmstead is the base of all operations; that it is important, therefore that it be located and planned correctly for efficient profitable and pleasant operation.

Whether developing a new area, modernizing an old one, or appraising an existing headquarters the following points pertaining to the location of the farm or ranch headquarters should be considered:

1. **Central location** — The most convenient and desirable location for the headquarters is near the center of the unit or in the middle of the long side. This makes for (1) the best accessibility to fields for both horses and equipment, and (2) the most desirable overall visual supervision of operations.

2. **Water supply** — Water must be available and plentiful.

3. **Roads** — It is preferable that the headquarters be located near an all-weather road that is well-maintained; but avoid having the farmstead on both sides of a road.

4. **Telephone and electricity** — The headquarters should be near well-maintained telephone and electric lines.

5. **Service facilities** — There should be convenient access to an established mail route, a school bus from a good

school, delivery services (mail, laundry, bread, etc.), the church of preference, and recreational facilities of interest.

6. **Size and shape of area** — It should be of adequate size, usually from two to five acres and nearly square in shape.

7. **Topography** — It should be high and level with no abrupt slopes.

8. **Drainage** — A porous soil, and gentle slope make for dry corrals and paddocks; enhancing horse health and making the work of the caretaker more pleasant and easier.

9. **Vegetation; windbreaks** — Natural shade, trees, or hills for windbreaks, and a well-sodded area are valuable attributes. Tree windbreaks should be located 75 to 150 feet from the buildings to be protected with three to seven rows of trees 20 to 75 feet wide.

10. **Fertile soil** — A good fertile soil is desirable for the yard and near-by paddocks.

11. **View** — A scenic view, especially from the living side of the house, makes for a "heap of living."

Consideration of the above points in locating, planning and improving the farm or ranch headquarters can add materially to the convenience, comfort and pleasure of the operator, and to the profitable operation of the horse enterprise.

Horse Science School Successful

Clovis, California, August 1963. 194 enrollees from 35 states District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Canada attended the nation's first Horse Science School. The statistics by areas follow:

In the West, at Fresno, California. 79 enrollees; from Louisiana to Hawaii and from Texas to Canada.

In the Midwest, at Columbia, Missouri. 50 enrollees; from New York to Hawaii and from Texas to the Canadian border.

In the East, at Willow Brook Farm, Catasauqua, Pennsylvania. 65 enrollees; from Montana to Arkansas and from Maine to Puerto Rico.

Encouraged by this fine start, and urged to keep on keeping on by the enrollees, Dr. M. E. Ensminger, Director of the unique Horse Science School, announced that it will be held annually. Said Mr. Ensminger, "The reception by the enrollees was most gratifying; the host educational institutions (Fresno State College, University of Missouri and Pennsylvania State University) and Willow Brook Farms extended every co-operation; and we were pleased and honored to have enrollees from all walks of life, with a common interest in horses, come from such a wide area."

According to Dr. Ensminger, a number of colleges and horse establishments throughout the United States and Canada have expressed interest in providing a permanent home for the Horse Science School. These locations and facilities are now being checked out, following which an announcement of future times and places will be made. Because of his heavy work load as an Agricultural Consultant, Dr. E. has expressed his desire to limit the School to two geographical locations in the future. Also, he continued, "the very fact that the enrollees came from coast to coast at each of the three locations this year would indicate that distance is not a primary factor."

Based on this year's experiences, and the reactions and suggestions of the enrollees and staff, Dr. Ensminger indicated that the plans for the future include —

1. **Greater flexibility** — Two sections: (1) a concentrated, 6-day Horse Science School devoted to basic (elementary) principles, followed by a concentrated, 4-day Advanced Horse Science School covering the application. Students may enroll for either or both courses depending on their training, experience, and available time.

2. **Lower costs** — Current thinking is that the basic fee will be lower than in '63. Then, those electing equitation or farrier science will pay an added laboratory fee.

3. **More Courses and staff** — Plans are being made to offer instruction in the areas of horse breeding, feeding, management, health, judging, equitation, farrier science, and horse training. In addition, Guest Professors will be invited in for lectures on special subjects. Also, as many as three different

Well, to my surprise, running the pop corn machine was fun. I really got into the swing of it, and by the second evening I was filling bags fast enough for the large intermission crowd. Before the rodeo was over I had recruited some kids to peddle my pop corn to the stands, and I was hollering at friends as they came by the pop corn stand, "Pop corn! Pop corn! Get your pop corn here!"

One evening, early, the pop corn sales were slow. So I collared a couple of cute kids and asked, "If I give you each a bag of free pop corn will you walk around looking real happy while you eat the pop corn?" "Yes!" They did and the pop corn sales increased. But, forever after, small children kept approaching me and asking, "Are you selling any more free pop corn?"

We got acquainted with some of the rodeo folks. The best girl trick rider told me she was thirty-four years old before she started riding. Now, her

daughter trick rides, too, and they load up their horses and rodeo all summer. At first, the older gal's horse worked wonderful at home but did not act right in strange arenas. She worked a full year trying to get him used to performing in public. She was about to give up on him and start on another horse when, all of a sudden, he did everything right one night. He has done everything right ever since. There is some encouragement in this story for those of you who think you are too old to start doing what you want with horses, and for those of you who haven't succeeded in teaching your horse something. Keep trying.

This rodeo had a bull, Sugar Daddy, that they would pay anyone \$500 to ride for ten seconds. The young fellows had a lot of fun challenging each other to ride Sugar Daddy. (Uh-huh. A few did try, but no one succeeded.)

Roy King, the rodeo producer told us of a Brahma bull he bought in Florida last year. The second time the bull was rode it bucked so hard it broke it's back. Some of the boys took the bull to the slaughter-house and stayed until they were satisfied that is exactly what happened.

Pa's seen a couple of old cutting horse boys who tie themselves in the saddle and he kept kidding me about tying me on Sugar Daddy and letting me try for that \$500.

That reminds me. The last cutting horse contest we saw was in the rain. Everyone was standing around getting wet, paying no attention to the rain. I happened to look up once and there was a grizzled looking old cowboy with a big old cowboy hat on — holding an umbrella over his hat. The umbrella was a small flowered job. Somehow, that did something to me. I wanted to get a picture of that. I chanced getting the camera wet, and a long shot. It didn't turn out, darn it. It is probably just as well. That picture would have made a lot of old cowboys feel ashamed for one of their own slipping like that.

When anyone wanted to leave the grounds at the rodeo, they stamped your hand at the gate so you could get back in without another admission charge. They didn't stamp it "PAID" like most do. They stamped it "FIRST CLASS."

I liked that. I kind of washed that hand easy for a few days. I sure hated to see the proof of my first class status disappear.

Wasn't the President's Corner in the July issue of The Morgan Horse Magazine a gem? Thank you, Mr. Ferguson.

I talked to Kay Goff Payne recently. Kay is an artist famous for her horse pictures, horse and animal statues and animal portraits. Kay told me she owns an elephant. A group of friends once bought it for her for her birthday. It is an Indian elephant and Kay says, "You should see the papers on it. They go way back." Her elephant travels with the Mills Brothers Circus — which Kay says "is a big improvement over keeping it in my own backyard."

Kay's husband, Marvin Payne, is a Humane Society Large Animal Officer. On days when there are few complaints to follow up, Marvin has other interesting chores to do — like counting gold fish in the 5 & 10's fish tanks.

Recently, Kay and a friend found some animals from an old merry-go-round. After a lot of dickering they wound up with two horses and a lion, to haul home in a compact coupe. They rassed those horses and the lion into the car somehow, and finally the girls headed for home. Yep, traffic slowed up for them. (Wish I had a picture of that car with animal parts poking out in all directions.)

Ask The Doctor

Question: What are the major causes of spavins?

Answer: Spavins start as an inflammation of the bones of the hock joint. Calcium deposits form to reinforce the weakness, in such quantity as to prevent the proper function of the joint, and so cause lameness. It is an arthritic-like condition.

The main cause of spavin is overwork of a young horse — hard work too early. The condition may also be caused by any sudden strain, and may also be a family characteristic, in as much as a poorly shaped hock may be inherited, and so subject to disability.

Question: Is it safe to breed a spavined horse?

Answer: Yes.

Question: Are there any permanent cures for bog, bone, or blind spavin and if so, what are they?

Answer: In the early stages the best cure is rest. In bone spavin, steroids (normalizing drugs) can be injected. There is also an operation which will help. Talk with your own veterinarian about what is best in your case. Chronic cases can only be relieved, not cured.

Bog spavin is the escape of the synovial fluid (joint fluid) into the tissues, caused by some kind of strain. It does not often cause lameness.

Blind spavin is bone spavin not yet fully developed. It can be detected by X-ray. Yes, they do worsen as time passes.

Question: About how often does a spavined horse, that is mildly ridden, go lame? How long per day is it safe to ride him?

Answer: This depends on the horse and on the rider. A mildly spavined horse can go sound for a long time if carefully ridden. There should be no sharp turns, no sudden stops, no jumping, nothing at all that could put undue strain on the hocks. For ordinary sen-

sible pleasure riding, a spavined horse can still be extremely useful.

Question: What drugs are recommended for the fast relief of pain in spavined cases?

Answer: Your own doctor will know what to recommend in your particular case. Several of the new drugs are helpful, but most of them must be administered by a veterinarian.

Question: My mare's last foal is now a yearling. Recently I noticed the mare's bag looked a little full, and was able to milk a small quantity of fluid from it. Is this normal? There is no inflammation or soreness.

Answer: This can happen to mares which have nursed a foal late. If mastitis is present, treatment should be recommended by your veterinarian. If there is no heat or inflammation, however, the mare is probably normal.

Question: How old should a colt be before it is broke to ride?

Answer: This depends on the individual horse and also on the weight of the rider. It is usually safe to start saddle training in the late summer and fall of the 2 year old year. Be very cautious about riding an animal less than two years old and even at two the young horse should be ridden only by a small person and in a limited way. Otherwise future trouble may result.

The Morgan Gold Cup A Huge Success

The third annual All-Morgan Gold Cup Horse Show was held on July 6 and 7 at Bucyrus, Ohio, under almost perfect conditions. The exhibitors, the spectators, even the weather, cooperated to make this the biggest and best Gold Cup yet. 117 Morgans showed before a packed grandstand at every session. Horses came not only from the mid-western states usually represented, but also from Massachusetts, Maryland and Florida. In addition to Morgans, the spectators enjoyed an exhibition of three Lippizan stallions shown by the Pastor family.

The show was judged by John M. Kays of the University of Connecticut. Here was a judge who, if he could not tie out the excessively-weighted horses would at least explain why he did pin them. During the Stallions in Harness class on Saturday night, Prof. Kays left the ring and went to the microphone. He said that he had been criticized during the show for pinning horses who were shown with unnatural action. He then explained that in classes such as the one he was judging every horse could be said to have excessive weight and excessive length of foot, but, since they were the only horses in the ring, he must pin them. He concluded that if Morgan people wanted horses with natural action to win, they would have to put more of them in the ring. Later in the show Professor Kays took the microphone to explain his placings in the Equitation, a procedure which greatly helped the youngsters in that class.

Again this year the In-Hand Classes were well-filled with quality horses. The stallion of the show was Paul Rumbaugh's very popular Foxfire, a veteran who was once again Grand Champion. Reserve to Foxfire was Tim Westhafer's two year old Junior Champion, Devan Kinglow. The Grand Champion Mare was Green Hill Farm's lovely Foxfire's Suzay over Reserve Champion Vanity Fair owned by the T. D. Ulrich's. The Gelding division was greatly improved in size and number as Morgan geldings continue to gain popularity. Grand Champion Gelding was another win for Green Hill Farms with Danbury over Dooley Stables' Tas-Tee's Midnight. The young horses were terrific this year and filled their classes with consistently good horses, particu-

larly in the two and three year old classes. The Junior Champion Mare was Townshend Vigilass from Elas' Townshend Morgan Farm over the Dooley Stables' Reata's Romance. Junior Champion Stallion was Devan Kinglow over J. S. Boswell's Rockfire.

The Performance classes continued to be good and not a class was cancelled due to lack of entries. The junior horses continued to be outstanding with two of the largest classes in the show being the Junior Saddle and the Junior Harness. Townshend Vigilet, owned by the Elases, was the winner of the former over Tom Mattox's Millsboro Major. The Junior Harness, which had to be split before being worked, was eventually won by A. J. Andreoli's Supreme Lady over Mrs. John Junk's Nanuet.

One of the most consistent performance horses of the show was Ro-Ma Farm's Long Hill Vigilet who won the Combination, Stallions in Harness, Stallions Under Saddle, Fine Harness Stake and Reserve in the Saddle Stake. Camelot Farms from Florida had a string of top horses who accounted for many Gold Cups including Over and Under 15 Hands classes, Owners to Ride, Roadsters Under Saddle, Mares and Geldings Under Saddle and the Saddle Stake (with Donnette of Camelot).

Probably the pleasure horse of the show was C. S. Phillips easy-going Bittersweet Sue who took home blues in the Western Trail, Childrens Western Pleasure, Road Hack, Equitation, and the Western Pleasure Stake. Winner of the English Pleasure Stake was the champion In-Hand mare, Foxfire's Suzay, over Townshend Farm's nice young mare, Townshend Melinda. Winner of both the Western Pleasure Stallions and the English Pleasure Stallions was Dick Measel's Hy Crest Tommyhawk, while another two time winner was Harold Niemi's nice gelding, Hi-Jax Kid who won the Western Pleasure Mares and Geldings and the Children's English Pleasure.

The colorful Western Show Horse Class, very popular in the Ohio area, was won by McDevitt's Lord Rochester over George Manges Millsboro Commander. Another ever-popular class, the Cavalcade Americana, was won by T. D. Ulrich's stylish Schoolmaster stallion.

MORGAN STALLIONS GRAZE AT 10,000

Four days, full enough for a lifetime . . . but only a sample of what you would like. Satisfying days . . . but ones which cry only for more . . . to see and ride where the days are clear and sunny, the nights clean and cool. No limit to your vision, only the snow topped peaks stretching ever on. Always a new height to climb . . . another canyon to explore . . . on the Morgans ridden, trained, and conditioned for this, the job they love.

In the fall of 1951 we received a story of a Wild Horse chase in the far west, and read of the men who were proud to say: "We rode with Pedler." A man who was described as "a tall, lean, capable horseman, who rides more miles than anyone we have ever known."

Amos Mosher, (one of the riders on this chase) said: "A capable, wiry, man, with an amazing sense of direction" and "... real friends to anyone and I wish you could enjoy the fine friendship of this man and his horse first hand as I do."

During the intervening years we have enjoyed our correspondence with Ern. We have enjoyed his stories, from the blood and gore of "The Narrow Margin," to the warmth and pathos we experienced as we lived that memorable Xmas eve with him in "The Song and the Star," when he closed with:

"I lean against my mountain, and I see
A frightened world with turmoil
spread afar.
Yet through the darkness of all hate
to be,
The love of Jesus shining like a star."

Yes, Ern is a man of many talents, who does all things well. We knew of his ability as a writer. We had met his charming wife, Virginia, and agreed upon his good judgment in this choice. We had appreciated his humor, which shows through in every Pedler story, but we had never ridden the tall mountains with him, in fact we had wondered if a soft Easterner could keep within shouting distance. We recalled his invitation:

"We will camp in good grass and flowers by a mountain brook. Thirty minutes horse-back from camp you can see for fifty miles in any direction from ten thousand feet of altitude. You will feel like a cowboy and part of the country you will be up on a good horse, and a good looking horse. We may see a deer or two and we for sure will see lots of beaver ponds. We will thread our way through aspens where

the grass is tall and good. Our ride will be rough enough and steep enough in spots to give you a bit of excitement. Between times we will break from timber into big meadows and back into timber again and each tall spot will be worth a picture and a memory to take home. We can cool off with a splash in icy creek water after each day's ride, and nap a little before dark if we want. We will talk and maybe sing around a pine fire at night, and the air will have a bite to it." After rereading this letter we knew it was worth a try.

I arrived at the Salt Lake City airport, and was met by Virginia and Ern, stopped at the world famous Mormon tabernacle, and gazed at it in awe, then on to their charming home, at the foot of Ern's mountain, by a bubbling mountain brook, but first a look at the three corrals, where we saw the three Mor-

More than ever, the National Morgan Show provided hot competition for Mid-Atlantic exhibitors with 27 horses from the area among the ribbon winners.

We can be particularly proud that Polly Dalrymple's Ran-Bunctious came home with the grand championship in the pleasure stake. This is the second consecutive year and the third time in six years that the Dickson Memorial Trophy has been won by a Mid-Atlantic member. Judging from the cheers at ringside when his number was announced and the comments heard around the stables afterward, it was a highly popular and well-deserved victory for "Bunky" as he added the top pleasure honor to his previous championships in saddle, harness and in-hand classes.

This championship climaxed a long trip up the comeback trail. When Polly came home from the National in 1959, she brought with her one of the champions of that show, Black Ranbo. But just a week before he could defend his title at the 1960 National, he died in a stable fire. Polly sadly went to the show as a spectator that year and during the show purchased two untrained three year olds sired by Ranbo. Although the showy gelding Philip Mansfield died before he entered his first show, the bay stud they called Ran-Bunctious took on the task of living up to his

sire's reputation. He did it well winning the Mid-Atlantic stallion championship for 1961, beating all of the top performance horses at one time or another, and finally returning to take the coveted tricolor at the National in the pleasure stake.

Those of us who find it hard to get any kind of ribbon in the tremendous classes at the National can look with envy on those who won several. Camelot Farm's Eve of Edhobe placed five times in the roadster division while Mr. and Mrs. Richard Colgate's Foxy Rose Marie took five ribbons in the pleasure section. The Colgates added to that ribbon collection with three good ribbons won with Oldwick High Diamond and one with Oldwick Celebrator. For Camelot, another winner was Kane's Spring Delight who topped the class for senior mares that have foaled and finished third in the harness stake. Becky Date of Camelot added a third in under 15 hand mares.

Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Plauth's Blue Spruce Farm placed well at the National taking three ribbons with Long View Saber and two each with Color Bearer and Cornwall Sealect - all three of these horses are three-year-olds. Their yearling stud, Oldwick Eli also took a ribbon. Janey Lucine had a good show, too. She took Roger Etherington's The Third Man and Bob Usinger's Towne Ayr Holly to Northampton and both of them took two ribbons.

We've got some mares in the pasture again, and things are not the same. Not one of the 'boys' has been able to lie down and sleep in peace since the first mare arrived. Everybody is threatening somebody else out there now. There are kick and bite marks on the boys. The pecking system arrived with the first mare. She cannot share the shade of the shed with the other horses. She does allow the biggest toughest gelding in with her — sometimes. For this privilege he is expected to stand guard and keep the others out. If he falls

down on the job she clobbers him and guards the shade herself. Do the boys hate her? Nope. They adore her, and every chance they get they vie with each other to prove their devotion.

Voorhis Farm of Red Hook, N. Y. has put out a lovely forty page booklet, *The Modern Morgan Horse*, designed and written by Jeanne Mellin Herrick. This booklet is just chock full of good pictures and is something to treasure.

gan stallions I would learn to appreciate during the following days. Little Fly, at 15 still a top horse eastern bred and a winner in Eastern shows before going west as a 3 year old and last year's winner of the "Get of Sire" class at the Rocky Mountain Show. Little Fly is remembered as the hero of many a Pedler yarn. The stallion who outran the lawmen in "The Poacher," and who has roped many a mustang.

"The Outcast," his four year old son, big, tough and used in recent months as Ern's favorite on the mountain, and on his mustang runs. More wind than any horse I have ever seen or ridden. Honest, without a lazy bone in his body. Possibly the equal of "Buck" Ern's favorite of by-gone days, and remembered by Pedler fans everywhere.

And then the typey little 3 year old son of "Little Fly," "Little Fry". A horse who could win in Eastern shows, a real good Morgan type and one of the prettiest young stallions we have seen. He had only recently been introduced to mountain riding, and we were all pleased on the ride when he, with his petite rider, Virginia topped the toughest of climbs with the older proven stallions.

We were up early that first morning, and trucked to our camp, about 60 miles from Salt Lake City, 9,000 feet above sea-level, in country no man can appreciate without seeing.

We have ridden the Rockies of the Northwest in the U. S. and Canada, we have marveled at the beauty of the Vermont hills; we have enjoyed the rocky coast of Maine, and seen the mountains of the south in all their splendor. We had a preview when viewing Ern's slides a year ago — but we were not prepared for the beauty that unfolded before us as we mounted the 3 best horses any horseman could desire and dipped into valleys lined with mountain flowers, climbed canyons so steep a man could not climb on foot without grabbing for brush and rocks, and then slid down the other side on horses trained to go straight down, because as Ern said; a horse going sideways might slip, and fall on the rider. His theory is sound, but it took a few hours for he and the horse to convince me!

Climbing through snowfields watching deer bound from the nearby meadows as you grabbed for your camera, hoping for a lucky shot. Jogging and a running walk, for which his studs are famous, but never a slow walk, such as I

had expected at this elevation, and on these steep climbs. Standing on points where we were assured no man might stand until the next deer season. Breaking into lush meadows, with aspen waving in the breeze on all sides, and beaver ponds at the end.

Climbing again to new heights thru pine before dropping onto a game trail which only an experienced mountain man could find. Riding for three days without seeing anyone. No radio, telephone or television. No worries, a brisk bath in the mountain stream, then the long evenings around the camp fire, to bring sleep such as I never enjoyed yet they seemed too short before the one concession to 20th century living, a soft downy sleeping bag on an air-filled mattress in air conditioned motels or heated eastern homes.

Rested, refreshed, and up at sunrise, to a camp breakfast such as only Virginia could fix. Camp-prepared food is better, Virginia's is the best.

Yes . . . we are proud to say: "We, too, rode with Pedler." We rode "Little Fly", and never found a more perfectly mannered mount with power to spare. We will always remember his coming in after 25 miles, at a parade gait, which should win in any Eastern show ring.

We rode "The Outcast," and know why Ern outrides and outruns the mustangs. Mostly we are proud to call Ern and Virginia our friends . . . real friends to anyone, and I, too, wish you could enjoy the fine friendship of this man, his wife and their fine horses first hand as I did.

Where we could formerly almost pin the class in the stable, we now had 10 good entries and Joe Nickerson's martial music helped to bring out the best in them. The last time we saw Saracen, he was winning Roadsters Under Saddle by 20 lengths. After 18 years it has been possible to slow him down to a parade gait.

The Harness Pairs class really shook us up. Seven entries, all of them beautifully matched and driven, brought back memories of all the horses and drivers who have competed in this event in the past. We never saw a finer class, and we hope that it will continue to fill or even increase in size. There is something special to behold when the sun hits gleaming coats, polished fittings and buggy wheels.

Mares and Geldings in Harness filled the ring with 27 entries, so it looks as if another class will have to be added next year. And, maybe the mare section will have to be split into bays or chestnuts, have foaled or not, or under and over 15 hands, 15 years, or 15 mph.

Model Geldings 4 years and over showed up with 27 entries also. Twenty-five years ago almost every Morgan horse was kept entire and it was ridiculous for a show committee to consider separate classes for geldings. We are glad to see the present trend of keep the best and geld the rest.

Ladies' Mare, Ladies' Gelding, and Ladies' Harness were well filled, the first with 25 entries. We assume that the same exhibitors were in the harness class, but they were difficult to identify after being used to seeing them in jodhpurs or Levis. This class drew more railbirds (and whistles) than any other.

But, Morgans are primarily pleasure horses, and the entries in Junior Pleasure (28), Pleasure Mare, rider under 18 (29), Pleasure Driving Stake (21), and Championship Pleasure Stake (30) proved it. Then, to show how pleasure horses could really be trained, Dr. Van Schaik put High Pastures Samson through his paces, and introduced him to obstacles for the first time.

Fitting and Showmanship. The way horses were presented in the ring is worthy of comment, especially if you recall the early shows. The 4-H and Horsemanship kids served notice by their performance that they are the showmen of tomorrow. It is more difficult each year to distinguish between amateur and professional on this basis. Frequently the only difference is the amateur card. Every entry we saw in the ring was in show shape and groomed to perfection. There may have been a few that were too fat but none were too thin. Among the pros, we chuckle now over the go-round between a male and a female exhibitor in a harness class. At the time we peeked between our fingers to see if the wheels were still on! Then a junior mare worked out against a senior stallion in the saddle stake, and it was kind of a nice way to wind up a show. This is mostly true because, according to the winner, the loser trotted her mare down to his stable and congratulated him — a small sample of why we plug Morgan owners as much as Morgan horses.

Horses. While we saw snatches of the performance of every class in the ring, requests for announcements come in so fast that our tendency is to look through the classes rather than at them. As a result we see few individual horses. However, we remember two that were the long and the short of it, or the old and the young of it. Townshend Sealectman, 23 years old, has always put on a consistently fine performance for a variety of exhibitors, and was back once more. UVM Kathy, winner of the yearling filly class, got off both ends and floated up and down that rail like a born show horse. Most of the other 462 escaped our attention as individuals, but collectively anyone could feel that in the ring below us America's most versatile breed was putting on the show of its life.

Credits. This show was the best for many reasons. The number of entries made it the largest and amazingly enough the quality improved also. The exhibitors recognized the potential of their entries trained them accordingly, and selected their classes carefully. They also answered stable calls promptly (even when I forgot to give them), and kept the show on the road and running smoothly. On the management side more than 100 people were involved in parking cars, selling tickets and programs, policing the grounds, handling obstacles and jumps, and providing nourishment, fire protection, and first aid. The show committee, intact over several years, gave freely of their time and energy during the months of planning necessary to carry off such a production successfully. They should be well pleased with the results. Last and most important comes Nat Bigelow, whose organizational ability put the whole thing together and whose public relations ability kept it from coming undone before it was over.

We thought it was, a good show. Lyman did too!

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FUNQUEST FARMS: Riders of stock saddles are often heard to say that they can't find a seat or feel secure on a flat Saddle. This is a positive, though probably unconscious, admission that they do not sit a really good seat in their stock saddles. If they depend on the cantle and pommel to stay aboard, they certainly are not "with" their horse.

You may not believe it, until you have measured a few flat and stock saddles for comparison, but the stirrup suspension on a flat saddle with respect to the seat is usually almost exactly the same as on a properly built and rigged stock saddle. From the depth of the seat to the stirrup suspension is usually about five and a half to six and a half inches; excepting some ill-designed stock saddles and special purpose flat saddles in which this distance may be greater.

These comments regarding the cantle and pommel of the stock saddle are not to be construed as meaning that these items are not justified on a stock saddle. The cantle does add to the rider's security when the action is violent but is certainly not for use as a socket into which the rider can force himself by thrusting his legs forward with his feet "home" in the stirrups. The pommel provides a place for the horn and the swell of the pommel helps the rider in a storm keep the horn out of his midriff.

The riders of flat saddles will be quite at home in a stock saddle, with the stirrups adjusted to the length to which they are accustomed, but most stock saddle riders will dispute what has been said here because when they get on a flat saddle they will suddenly discover that they have been riding the saddle and not the horse. That is to say that they have been placing dependence on the cantle and pommel for staying aboard; and any way you cut it, that is poor equitation. If you don't believe it, ask your horse.
