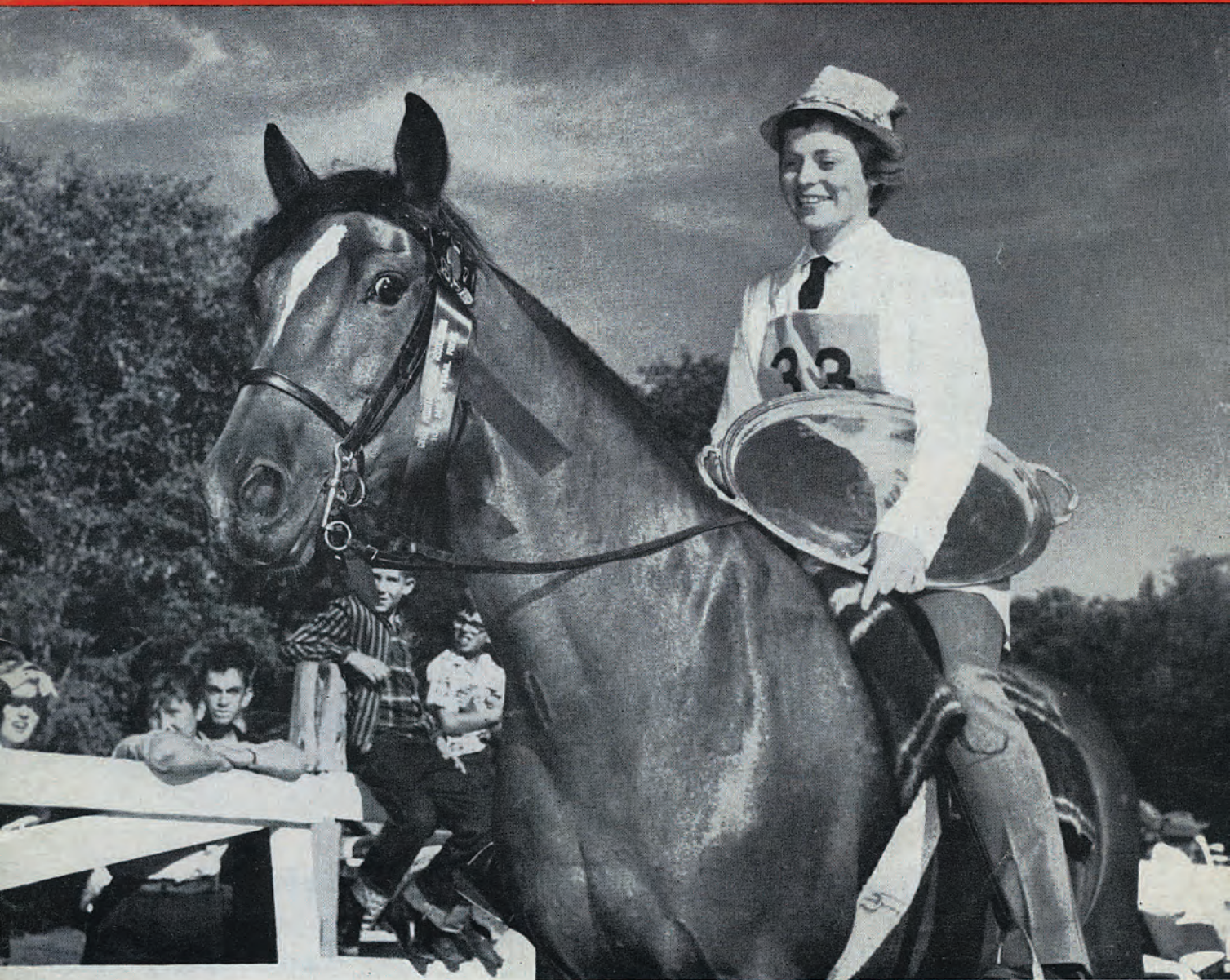

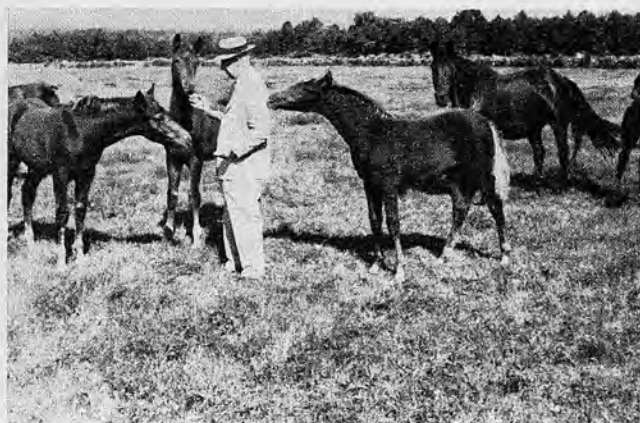
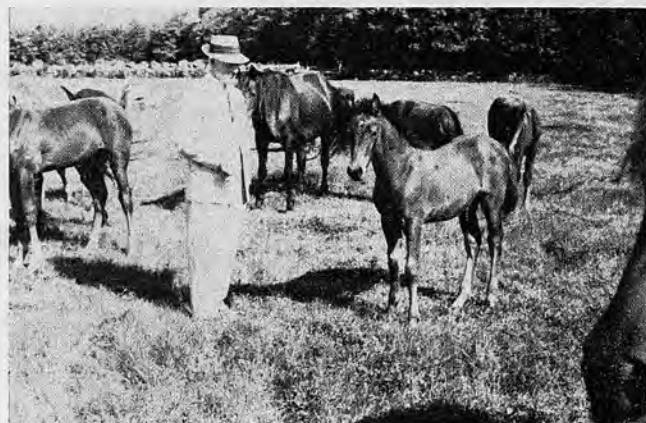

Morgans Top Two Divisions in G.M.H.A. 100 Mile Trail Ride

A MORGAN WAS ALSO SWEEPSTAKE WINNER

Seventy-seven horses were entered in the Green Mountain Horse Association silver anniversary 100 mile trail ride at Woodstock, Vermont. This was the second largest entry in the history of the trail ride. This annual event is a real sporting affair. No money prizes are involved and one enters and rides for the challenge of real competitive horsemanship. All breeds of horses are entered and men, women and children from Canada to Florida take part in this friendly sport.

This was a year of old sayings for Nancy Ela. It was her "Lucky Seventh" try at the 100 mile; "Three times never fail," on Townshend Lady-o-Peace." Lady finished seventh in 1958, second in 1959 and first this year in the Lightweight Division, and this year was also the Sweepstakes Winner for both divisions. Nancy won the Junior Horsemanship in 1953 and the Ladies Horsemanship in 1959, but the biggest thrill was this year's Sweepstakes win. Nancy worked hard for this win. During the National Morgan Show, she was seen riding Lady around the tobacco and potato fields of Northampton every morning from 5 a.m. until 7 and 8 o'clock. Then later the hills of Woodstock were ridden daily for three weeks. Nancy has put a lot of time and energy into conditioning her mount for this event. Evidently hard work has paid off for Lady finished really strong this year.

The Junior Division was won by a real good Morgan mare Merryvale. This mare is owned by Mrs. Reba Reed of Plainfield, N. H. and was ridden by Karen Wolfe. This mare finished sixth in the Heavyweight Division in 1958 and fifth in Junior Division in 1957. Here is a mare with a lot of endurance.

A registered Thoroughbred, Brig, was winner of the Heavyweight Division. He was owned and ridden by Mr. James Rutherford of Honesdale, Pa. Mr. Rutherford has ridden in these rides many times and has always given his mounts a good ride.

Ruth Orcutt was the only rider that came back and competed in this year's ride, that rode the first one 25 years ago. Congratulations Ruth, for giving your mount an excellent ride. Ruth rode a half sister to Sadwin, who she rode fifteen years ago to a win. Her entry this year was Anna Darling, one of Orcland Farms good brood mares. This mare finished strong, but just out of the ribbons.

A lot of credit should go to Tommy Emerson of Greenfield, Mass., riding Millers Commander. Tommy won the Junior Sportsmanship Award and he well deserved it. It was great to see a junior who had more consideration for his mount than for the glory of winning a prize. Saturday morning only six juniors were due to start the ride and Tommy knew he would automatically get an award if he finished. When he started off that morning, down the pavement, he felt his horse was a bit lame. He immediately pulled up and withdrew before even getting to the judges. He said his horse was a good one and he wasn't going to hurt it. Congratulations are due Tommy for good sense and good horsemanship. More adults should know when to withdraw as this junior did. By stopping early he avoided permanent damage to his horse.

The New England Morgan Horse Association Trophy went to Filare, owned by Mrs. Katherine Colon of Athol, Mass. and was ridden by Mary Bunting of New Brunswick, N. J.

Mary rode Otho Eusey's Sterling Gladiator to win this trophy in last year's ride. This trophy is given to the Morgan best suited for pleasure riding in the ride. Filare also placed fifth in the lightweight division. This is a very strong going Morgan mare. She placed ninth in the 1958 trail ride with Mary riding her. Mary and Nancy Ela trained together for three weeks this year in Woodstock. This was Mary's fourth or fifth 100 mile ride. Her wins being on different mounts speaks well for Mary's good riding and horsemanship. Here is a rider that bears watching.

Registered Morgan stallions finished tenth in the Lightweight and the Heavyweight Divisions. U. C. Hermes owned and ridden by Dr. Eugene Holden of Amherst, Mass., placed sixth in the Lightweight Division in 1958 and tenth in the Heavyweight this year. Here is a stallion with a lot of heart and go. Vigilendon, a Morgan stallion owned by Dr. Bob Orcutt of Rowley, Mass. and ridden by Pat Tataronis of Danvers, Mass., placed tenth in the Lightweight Division. This was the first ride for all of them. Vigilendon finished well and made a hit with his good trail manners.

Although Morgans have always been entered in this ride, more Morgan breeders entered this year than ever before. In the past, Lippitt Farms, Windcrest and High Pasture Farm have had entries, although they were not represented this year. Entered for the first time were Green Meads Farm, Broadwall Farm, Dr. Robert Orcutt, McCulloch Farm, Mrs. Margaret Rice and Dr. Laurence Slobody. Mrs. Frances Bryant and Orcland Farms entered for their third and fourth time. Townshend Farm came back for its

21st time. There were many Morgan owners riding in this ride, though not on their own Morgans. Among them were Mrs. Lucille Kenyon of Altoona, Florida, Mrs. Gertrude Schley of Sharon, Conn., Geoffrey Nichols of West Newbury, Mass., Cicily Warren of Northville, N. Y., Judy Cameron of White River Junction, Vermont, Phyllis Quagliaroli of Windsor Locks, Conn., Deborah Ellis of Weston, Mass., and Susan Robinson of Windsor, Vermont.

Those riding their own horses were: Nancy Ela, Bolton, Mass.; Dr. Holden and Mary Louise Holden, Amherst, Mass.; Ruth Orcutt, West Newbury, Mass.; Thomas Emerson, Greenfield, Mass.; Sally Ann Barngrave, Mountain Lake, N. J.; and Jeannine Krause of Windsor, Vermont.

This year's cool weather was a break for the horses' wind. However, because the horses were never breathing heavily, the riders had a tendency to over-ride their mounts by pushing or letting them go much too fast. This meant excessive pounding on the trails and roads. Therefore, many horses went lame or sore. This year many more horses went unsound than usual.

Many "old timers" were back to watch this 25th anniversary ride. Some have been coming year after year. In fact there were a few who have never missed a year. Others who rode some of the first rides came back especially for the Silver Anniversary.

The judges for this year's ride were three veterinarians: Dr. C. D. Parks of Honesdale, Pa., Dr. William Santoro of Middleburg, Va. and Dr. Malcolm Baker of Montreal, Canada. The recorder was Mr. Swain McCracken of Bethlehem, Pa., and the Timer was Mr. Charles B. McCue of East Douglas, Mass.

The ride was held September first through the third. This ride covers 40 miles the first day and the same for the second day. There is a time limit of 7 hours on each day and on the third and last day, twenty miles has to be covered in three hours. At no time can you do the required distance in less than six and one half hours without being penalized. Therefore no racing is allowed. It is hard to finish in the seven hour limit for 40 miles because of the terrain. The Woodstock, Vt. area is very hilly and there is much rough footing. The object of this 100 mile ride is to stimulate greater interest in the breeding and use of good horses, possessed of stamina and hardiness and qualified to make good

mounts for trail use. Also (a) To demonstrate the value of type and soundness and proper selection of horses for a long ride.

(b) To learn and demonstrate the proper methods of training and conditioning horses for a long ride.

(c) To encourage horsemanship in long distance riding.

(d) To demonstrate the best methods of caring for horses during, and after, long rides, without the aid of artificial methods of stimulants. This ride was based on the old army 300 mile endurance rides but under less severe conditions.

On summing up this year's ride one found ideal weather. It was, in fact, one of the best years ever, weather-wise, cool, clear and then almost chilly. The competition was keen and there was good sportsmanship throughout. In all it was a great year to celebrate the Green Mountain Horse Association's Twenty-Fifth Anniversary.

Here are a few of the statistics and the final results:

Of the seventy-seven horses listed in the program which includes the post entries, there were:

- 8 Grade Morgans
- 8 Grade Quarter Horses
- 6 Registered Arabs
- 6 Registered Thoroughbreds
- 5 Grade Thoroughbreds
- 3 Registered Standardbreds
- 3 Grade Arabs
- 2 Registered Saddlebreds
- 1 Grade Saddlebred
- 1 Palomino

Sixty-eight horses started the ride Thursday. Sixty-seven finished Thursday with two horses late.

Sixty horses started Friday morning. Fifty-nine finished Friday with three horses late.

Fifty-two horses started Saturday. Forty-nine finished Saturday with one horse late.

In the various divisions one finds:

23 Heavyweight (180 lbs or over) started — 19 finished.

33 Lightweight (155 lbs. to 180 lbs.) started — 25 finished.

12 Junior (12 years through 16 years) started — 5 finished.

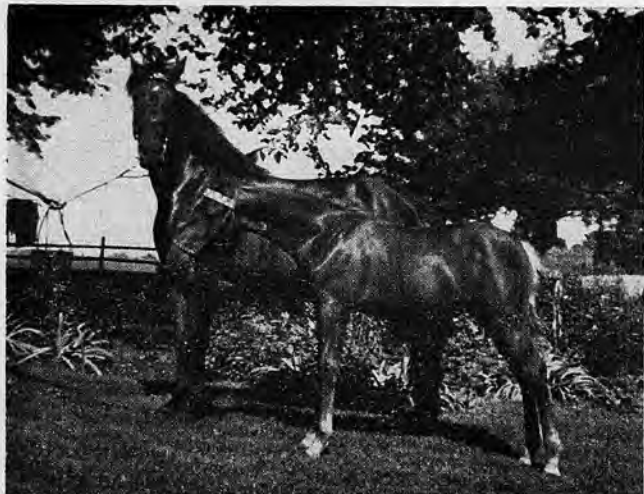

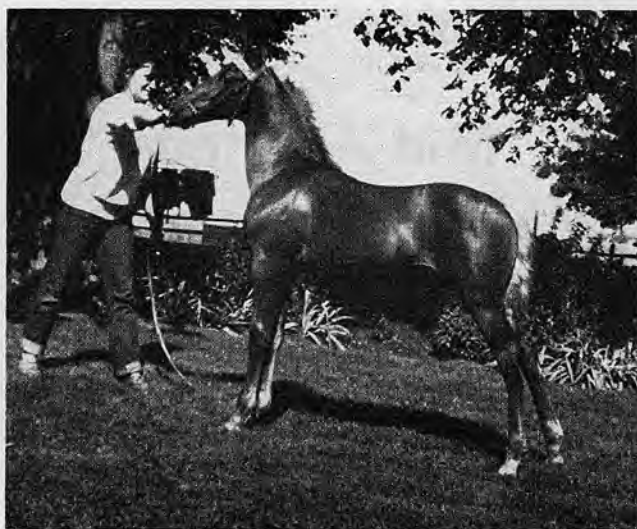

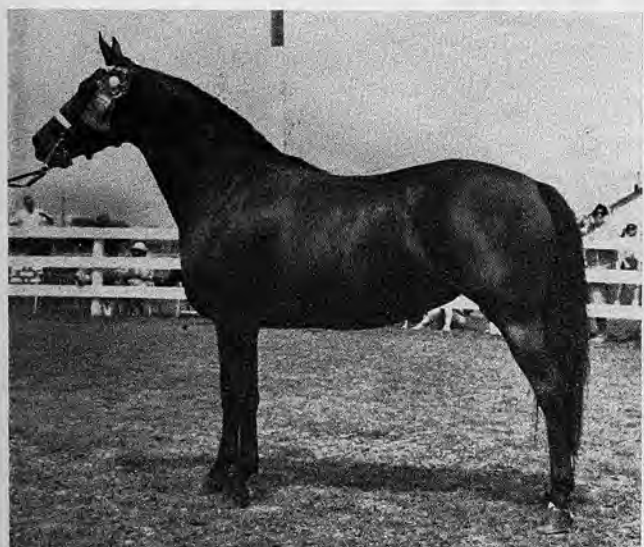

Mid-Atlantic Morgan Horse Show

This was the biggest and best year yet for the Mid-Atlantic Morgan Horse Show held at Frederick, Md., on August 19 and 20. Warm clear weather this year made up for last year's deluge and the record number of entries were of consistently high quality.

Voorhis Farm of Red Hook, N. Y., and Waseeka Farm of Ashland, Mass., split most of the big stakes between them. Waseeka's Nocturne had the honor of taking both the first and last class of the show by winning the opening class, Stallions in Harness, and then going on to win Stallions under Saddle and the final Championship Saddle Stake. Waseeka's Thisizit won both the Marcs under Saddle and the Senior Marcs classes and was judged Grand Champion Mare with her two year old stablemate, Waseeka's Party Doll, taking the Reserve Mare spot. Waseeka's other mare, Sweet Pepper, won the Mares and Geldings in Harness, Combination Morgans, and Junior Morgans in Harness. Waseeka's Buccan- cer, the gelding owned by Mr. and Mrs. O. Dann DeWitt, won the Morgan Gelding 3 and Under as well as the Junior Morgans under Saddle.

Voorhis Farm had the Champion Harness Horse of the show in Sealect of Wind Crest, who was also Reserve in the Saddle Stake and Reserve Grand Champion Stallion in addition to other good ribbons. Voorhis' pleasure horse entry, U. C. Mention, won both English and Western Pleasure as well as taking ribbons in Pleasure Driving and Trail Horse classes. Ledgewood Pecora, a full sister to Sealect of Wind-

crest, won the Novice, Maiden, and Three year old Mares classes. Danbury won the Two year old Stallions class over Harvey Atwood's Minute Man, the winner of the Mid-Atlantic Futurity's Two year old division.

While the large stables won their share, many of the one and two horse exhibitors took major classes. The Grand Champion Stallion award went to an Ohio horse, Devan Jason, owned by Joanne and Nevin Combs of Bucyrus. The most blues of the show going to one horse were won by Mrs. John Mercer's Just-A-Sweetheart who swept the Child's Mount, Stock Horse, Trail and Versatility as well as carrying Ruth Mercer to wins in the 14-18 Horsemanship (English) and the AHSA Medal Class and young Winny DeWitt to a win in Leadline. Mrs. George Arnold had the winner of both the Half-Mile Race and the Pleasure Driving Class

in her speedy Arnona Chere "O". June Brockett's champion gelding, Orcland-Ike, won the Geldings Under Saddle and the Owner-to-Ride classes. The ever-popular Manito owned by William Hopkins, lost his first Morgan Jumping class in some time to Charles Patton's Shenandoah Prince, but was high in the ribbons in Western Pleasure, Versatility, Stock Horse, and Trail to mention a few. Holtz Stables had the winner of the Mid-Atlantic Sweepstakes in Gipsy Eileen and then took both first and second in the Parade Stake as they did last year. There were well over a thousand entries in the various classes, about equally divided between the devotees of the western style, and the flat saddle folks. This is in addition to the many race horses on the grounds. The Fair officials handled the big job most efficiently. All western classes were scheduled for Tuesday through Thursday of the first week. Then, the barns were cleared for the saddle bred.

The show opened with the usual introductions and a cowboy band, and the classes began. This reporter has been watching horse shows for many years. Muncie was long the home of Bob Whitney, who is one of the top trainers in the country. Bob has trained and shown Saddle bred, Arabians, Ponies and Morgans. His brother raises Thoroughbreds for the Keeneland sales. It has been my privilege to see the National at both Windsor, Vermont and at Northampton. To me, the Morgans on the banks of the Connecticut was the greatest of them all.

But, it was a very tense moment when the gate opened and the Morgans came into the ring at our own Hoosier State Fair. There were nine of them, in western tack. The judges pinned them as follows:

1st, **SYLVESTER**, owned and ridden by Phyllis Barber; 2nd, **CONGO'S BABEE**, owned by R. and C. Centers, Bill Kellogg up; 3rd, **IRISH LASS**, owned by Enos Allee, Judith Allee up; 4th, **MAR E K**, owned and ridden by Henry Fawcett; 5th, **ILLAWANA BONNIE RED**, owned by R. and C. Centers, Beverlee Stahl up; 6th, **DARE DEVIL**, owned and ridden by Jack Marks; 7th, **KANE'S SUNNY BOY**, owned by Henry Fawcett, Willie Birdwell up; 8th, **MISS DINAH**, owned by Henry Fawcett, Carol Osterhold up; 9th, **DUDE DE**

Impressions while wandering through the barns. There are so many Apalosas. Not so long ago they were rather rare. There is a lesson there for Morgan folks. The usual number of Palominos and Quarter horses. A quick glance at each for that sign of Morgan blood, which we know that many of them have. How much of old Justin's blood was represented in the thousand horses entered

Good columnists proof read. Others like me make mistakes. In the August issue I wrote that the Columbia City show was the first for Morgans in Indiana. This is not true as the French Lick show had classes for Morgans for a couple of years before that. I apologize. Just got carried away because the Columbia City show is so much like the National at Windsor.

The spectators sit around on a hillside, and everything is very informal and restful. Also, to my knowledge, the Columbia City folks were the first to give classes to the new Indiana Club.

The list of Morgans in Indiana is growing. Word comes that Elaine Stephenson, of Leavenworth, has a two year old filly, Prides Polly. She is by L U Colonel out of Cap's Pride. Elaine purchased the filly from Mr. Milford Fox of Mesopotamia, Ohio.

Over at Anderson, the Ralph Ulerys have had horses for some time, but they wanted horses with just a little bit more. They wanted more spirit, action, showiness, but still gentle for the family. Some one told them about Morgans. They looked long and carefully, then went to the O'Neill farm and brought back two. First is Jody Jean O, by Archie O out of Lippitt Alice. Jody is two, bay and beautiful. The other is Lizza's Black Beauty, a black yearling filly, by Fudge Royale out of Lizza.

Jody was green broke when she came to Indiana. Since then, Miss Teri Misner has been schooling her under flat saddle. In September, they entered her in the Flat Saddle Pleasure class at Columbus. There were sixteen others in the class, Arabians, Saddle Breds and Quarter horses. Jody took the blue ribbon. There is another lesson for us.

The Morgan horse is a pleasure horse by nature. They are a pleasure to ride, drive, work and to handle. Like the men and women who came out of New England a hundred and fifty years ago and settled this mid-west, they are adaptable. There is another comparison. The adventurous ones were the ones who broke the ties of home and came to the new land. They were willing to suffer and work, but they had to see what was beyond the mountains. The Morgan horse has that same spirit of adventure. It is evident in the alert way they carry their head.

We must learn that lesson, we must not let the Morgans be typed as one of the other breeds. Morgans have something that no other breed has, they are a part, a living part, of this country. For years this writer has tried to get a historical movie made about the Morgan horse, on the order of Colt 45, and Winchester 97. Those were a wonderful job, but there is so much more material about the Morgan horse than about the guns, that one wonders how the movie magnates have overlooked it. From the mountains of

Vermont, all the way across the mid-west, the prairies and the mountains to California, the Morgan horse carried folks and their belongings to a new home and opportunity. If we can picture that to people at the shows, the Morgan will reach his proper place in the sun.

One suggestion to Club members, and this is strictly my own idea. Each member has ideas. But, there is not enough time at meetings to express them. Why don't each of you sit down some cool evening, and write a good long letter to one of the officers? Express your ideas, go into detail, and give the reasons you think as you do. Not all suggestions can be put into operation, but some of them can, and you will feel much better and more a part of the club.

It has been our pleasure to meet Mabel Owen, and personally express our appreciation for her articles, "Names in Pedigrees." We have studied them, and referred to them many times. At that time we talked about continuing the series. Now, several Morgan owners join us in the hope that it can be done, and the pedigrees brought down to our times. Please.

The growth of the Morgans in Indiana is due to the hard work of a very few people. All the owners are amateurs at showing. They have leaned heavily on the counsel of Mrs. Beverlee

Stahl and Ernest Sheets, who have had experience at the National level; Beverlee as an exhibitor, and Ernest as a judge. We all appreciate their help. There was much to be learned about training, conditioning and equipment. We need more mares, fillies and geldings to fill the classes. There are buyers for such horses, not only for showing but for youngsters and schools.

The real hard work has been done by a few owners, and their helpers. Classes were limited to Western and Flat Saddle Pleasure, and the Cavalcade Americana. Indiana is stock saddle country, so that part wasn't much trouble. For the Cavalcade they had to find buggies and carriages, harness and costumes, and transportation, but that wasn't too hard either. The flat saddle classes were the test. It took nerve to change to the flat and show without much practice or training, but they did it. My hat is off to each of those who did it.

Now to review some of their recent accomplishments. At French Lick, the Morgans had only one class — Western Pleasure. First place went to Comanche Brave, owned and ridden by Miss Flora Lee Elkington of French Lick. Flora Lee and Comanche also took fifth in the Western Pleasure at Danville.

Second place at French Lick went to Congo's Babec, three year old bay filly. Babec is owned by Rachael and Camille Centers and is shown by Bill Kellog. They took first in the Western Pleasure and second in the Cavalcade at Danville, and fifth in Halter at Columbia City.

Dude DeJarnette O, bay stallion from the Centers' farm took fourth in the Western Pleasure and fifth in Halter at Danville, then third in the Cavalcade and fourth in Halter at Columbia City. Camille Centers rode their mare, Illawana Bonnie Red to third in the Flat Saddle at Columbia City.

Dare Devil, the black Flyhawk stallion owned by Jack Marks, of Westfield, took the blue ribbon in Western Pleasure and the Cavalcade at both Danville and Columbia City. Mrs. Marks rode him to fourth in the flat saddle class at Columbia City.

Mr. Enos Allee of Coatesville, Vice President of the Club, did the work of lining up the classes, and still had time to take his share of the ribbons. His mare, Irish Lass, took third in the

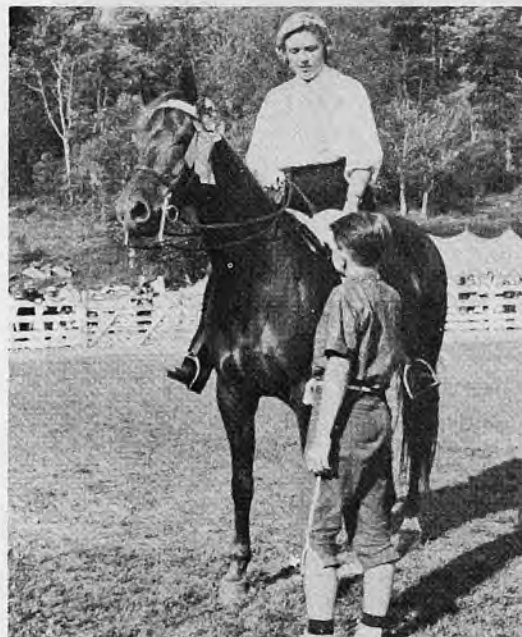

MASSACHUSETTS

Barbara Kelly, formerly of Middleton, wrote a note and enclosed some pictures from the Morgan farm of Mr. and Mrs. Philip Atwood of Haverhill. Barbara is helping with the training at Castleview Farm — this is another new breeding establishment. Their horses include the gelding Orcutt's Allan Day (Vigil Day x Ethandeld), last year's N. E. Junior Parade Champion, the mare Highland Firefly (Flyhawk x Highland Lady) and her colt, Earl of Castleview by Agaziz. They also have a grade yearling by Double J. Torchfire. The mare has been bred to Orland Dondarling.

During a lull in Lyman Orcutt's showing at Frederick, Maryland, I was able to get him to sit down and give me the latest activities at Orland Farm. As well as being trainer, he is now the advisor for the breeding program of Mr. J. B. Reid of Francetown, N. H. Mr. Reid is in his first year of Morgans and has become a most enthusiastic supporter. He has the two year old gelding, Sharade (Parade x Royalton Rose of Sharon) at home and enjoys driving all over the farm. He will go to Lyman this fall for saddle training. At his first National Show, Mr. Reid was most successful with his three yearlings which he purchased at the Weanling Sale last fall — they will also go to Lyman this fall to be broken to harness. The stallion, Townshend Vigalvin (Orland Vigildon x Townshend Gladys), lovely chestnut filly, Anneigh's Dainty Miss (Dyberry Bob x Louellen) who was top selling filly in the 1959 Sale, and the brown filly, Windcrest Ann (Upwey Ben Don x Windcrest Annfield) all placed well in their respective classes at the National.

Other horses going to West Newbury this fall are Bald Mt. Gay Easter (Easter Twilight x June Morgan) from Sawmill River Farm, and Anneigh's Ballerina (Dyberry Bob x Marigold) from Mrs. Ann L. Stedman of Stonington, Conn. This filly is a full sister of the Blue Spruce Farm's Dark Shadow.

Mr. William G. Glenny, Jr., of Manchester, Conn., has had Gallant Grace at the Orcutts for saddle and harness work. She is by Townshend Gaymeade x Grace and is now in foal to Orland

Dondarling. The Glennys also have a yearling daughter of Gallant Grace by OCR, Careless Kitty.

A wonderful, long newsy letter came from Mabel Owen this past week with reports of sales and arrivals of new foals. Last spring they sold the yearling colt, Merry Chandler (Townshend Manwallis x Conniedale) to Mr. Robert D. Riley of What Cheer, Iowa. As you may recall, Manwallis is a full brother to Townshend Cornita. He is owned by Mrs. C. G. Coman of Putnam, Conn., and Mabel has used him fairly extensively on the Squire Burger mares in recent years. Mr. Riley came east to get the colt and Mabel says they really enjoyed his visit, having a chance to really exchange opinions on their ideas about Morgans. She thinks that Mid-westerners may be much more particular about disposition and substance but that, basically, their thoughts coincide.

They also sold their four year old mare, Merrinita Ash (Lippitt Rob Roy x April Showers), to Mr. Renato Levi of Hialeah, Florida. Although never shown, this filly was a good second and top Morgan on the Hanson Trail Ride last fall as a three year old. She was pronounced safe in foal to Townshend Manwallis before she left for Florida. Mr. Levi is an importer and deeply interested in Morgans, and is looking for real quality in his foundation stock. This mare is a full sister to Mabel's Merry Lark that she is so keen about. Although I have no facts to go on, I would imagine that Mr. Levi is among the first to start a Morgan breeding farm in Florida and probably one of the few owners of Morgans in that state. It would be interesting to hear from him in greater detail.

Merrylegs Farm had the extraordinary luck last spring to have four fillies and one stud foal. The first was a filly from Belldale by Merry Knox — her first filly in five years and a great joy to the Owens. Mabel has been waiting five years to use the name Merry Bellsong which I think is most appropriate. There's a two year old full brother, Merry Merlin owned by Mrs. Helen McGeever of Hyde Park, Mass., and a yearling brother, Merry Lancer owned by the Bayne Peckhams of Portsmouth, R. I. which Mabel thinks is one of the finest she has seen.

The second foal, also a filly, had caused quite some concern as her dam, April Showers had been very ill the fall before. She is by Manwallis and named Merry Linnet as she is a

full sister to Merry Lark. Mabel has her fingers crossed that she may have another pair as this foal looks a lot like Lark did at the same age.

The third foal, a filly, Merry Cordelia is by Manwallis out of Merridale. Mabel says she reminds her a great deal of Townshend Cornita when she first saw her as a foal.

The next foal was a stud by Merry Knox out of Conniedale and has been named Merry Forester. This is Conniedale's 13th foal and Mabel feels the mare outdid herself and she admits to "gloating" over this one! Shirley Splaine of Wenham, Mass. writes that Clistie produced a lovely filly named Ashland Jane Darling. She neglected to say who the sire was but I'll guess that it was Ashland Donson — please correct me if I'm mistaken! It's hard to know whether to put this news under N. H. or Mass., as you never know which of the Glidden animals are in Wenham and which

are in Ashland! Ashland Polly Darling produced a dark chestnut filly with red mane and tail by Orcland Leader, tentatively named Ashland Ann Darling. The mare has been bred back to Leader's son, Gladgay's Pride, owned by Mark Hanna of Framingham. Shirley's daughter, Nancy spent the summer with her grandparents and broke Ashland Melissa and Connecticut Yankee to both ride and drive, with the help of her friend, Kathy Morrison. I can think of no better way for two girls to spend a summer and Shirley says they did a marvelous job.

Two well known Massachusetts boys, Tim Lydon of Millis and Norm Taylor of Haverhill, will start in the Blacksmithing Course at the University of Michigan in mid-September. Lots of luck to them.

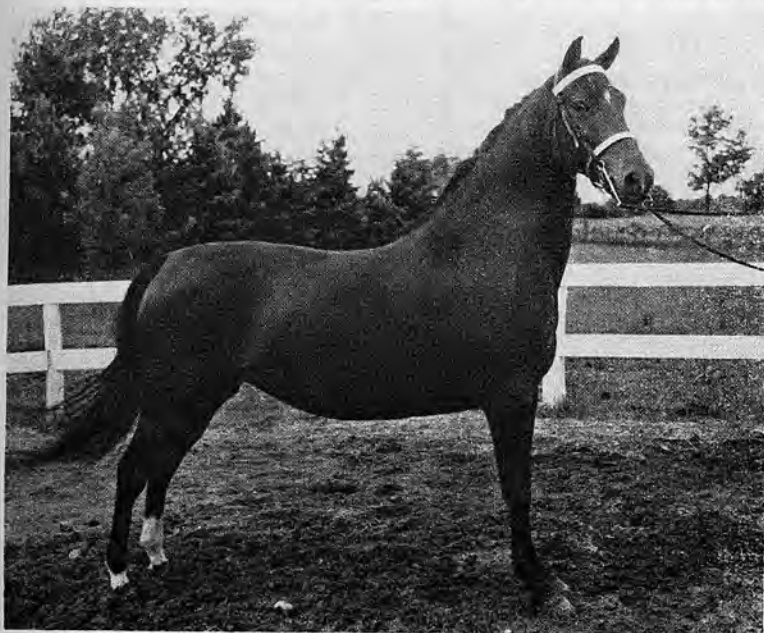
