

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

\$1,000 Purse Voted by Directors for Top Cutting Horse

The Directors of The Morgan Horse Cub, Inc., have set up a \$1,000 purse for the first Registered Morgan to get into the Top Ten Cutting Horses as recognized by the National Cutting Horse Association.

Points toward Horse of the Year (or the Top Ten) must be won in NCHA Championship Cutting Horse Contests. A Championship Contest is one that has an added purse of at least \$100. Also the owner of the horse must be a member of NCHA in good standing.

The Cutting Horse

Nowhere can the native intelligence and ability of the horse be seen to better advantage than in the Cutting Horse event. Nor can the public ever have a better chance to see an animal pitted against another animal, using its own intelligence, in removing one critter from the herd and keeping it from returning. For this short time the cutting horse is on his own. His rider directs him into the herd, which at most rodeos and cutting events consists of from 15 to 20 cattle, suspiciously standing against the fence.

The horse quietly enters this hostile group of cattle and works his way to the back fence. The rider and horse then select one critter and drive her out of the herd. Once clear of the herd or approximately 30 feet away from the cattle, the rider drops his rein hand, or in cutting horse terms, "throws his head away." Now comes one of the most thrilling sights in all sportsdom; the cutting horse on his own, battling to keep the cow from the herd.

Today the cutting event is a highly competitive sport. Some contests offer big purses, others are jackpots, meaning the contestants all throw in a set amount and the top four riders divvy the pot. But no matter whether the

Maligne Lake Beauty Spot of America

"Five days of hard, dusty driving from the East were forgotten . . ."

At Maligne Lake, in Jasper Park, Canada, we had been told, we would find the most beautiful scenery in North America. We were not disappointed. At this secluded lake 18 miles long, surrounded by mountains which even a picture could not do justice to, we found one of the handiworks of nature, which literally took our breath away as we feasted our eyes on the beauty which been hidden from civilized man until comparatively recent years. Even today no highway allows the casual sight-seer to come in 20th century ease. It is reached only by boat and narrow mountain trail or a 2 day pack trip. Time necessitated our using the former. On arriving we went the 18-mile length of Lake Maligne (which is over 5,000 feet above sea level) by motor launch — all passengers vied in seeing that Mr. Eastman's Company had a profitable year, a real photographer's paradise.

Back at the lodge, I wandered down to the corral, and was surprised to see a be-speckled "cow-poke" who resembled the college students one expects to find working at summer resorts. This error of judgement on my part was corrected in the next 48 hours.

Donald Lahl lounging in front of his corral with 30 some ponies had just finished shoeing an unbroken 3 year old. Two days before he had brought these horses over the mountain in a two-day trek. No mean feat, as the snow was still in the high trails in this, the first week of July. Until the tourist season was in full swing he would shoe colts, and break them — some had never been ridden. He would use these himself, and rent out the trained horses. As soon as the colts were

settled they would be turned over to the more experienced riders.

This was an operation that made me temporarily forget the beauties of Maligne Lake — a real, self-sufficient cow-poke, running his own string, miles from the nearest town, entirely on his own with his own bed-roll and tent for the summer months.

Each night these horses were turned to forage for themselves, with a bell on one or two. His own "jingle" horse kept back to round them up on these fenceless mountains in time for the "dudes" each morning. This was the country, and the life I had dreamed of since a small boy. It was something civilization had almost made me believe had disappeared 100 years ago. I'm glad the next few hours can never be taken from me, and as that famous General stated some years ago: "I shall return."

That evening Charles, my 15 year old boy, and I walked miles searching for elk, but were unsuccessful. Early the next morning, after a real mountain breakfast, we were at the corral where Don was ready, horses saddled and waiting. He had selected two of his best for Charles and me, tough mountain horses about 15 hands high. Soon the other 2 members of our party arrived, a newlywed couple from Montreal. We were then on our way to the high country. (In this country five dudes to the guide is considered the maximum.)

We started to climb immediately, and had to rest the horses occasionally. After about an hour we broke from the trail and came upon a ridge, Lake Maligne and the encircling mountains

broke forth in all their majesty below us. The young groom exclaimed: "I have never before seen a sight like this." We paused, attempting to partially preserve it with our cameras. From this elevation the beauty dwarfed any we had seen from below. Five days of hard dusty driving from the East were forgotten. Our trip was well worthwhile. We rode on and dropped into a meadow where we saw a deer feeding and paused to take its picture before it bounded into the forest. Continuing to climb we were soon above the timber line, as we came out, Don exclaimed, "I believe those are mountain sheep," but before he could be certain, lower in the meadow I noted what appeared to be a herd of deer.

He checked with the glasses and remaked, "those are elk." We rode closer. We started to dismount but the bride in the party assured us she would stay on her horse, as this was grizzly-bear country and she feared to meet a bear! Don had pointed out bear signs on the way.

I here learned to appreciate a pony trained to ground tie. Dropping my reins, I started working towards the herd, with camera ready. At 8,000 feet in that rugged country the going is slow, but soon Charles and I were within 200 feet of a bull elk. As I was photographing it, another jumped up from a gulley about 30 feet from Charles. In all we counted 10 bull elk within camera range. Quite an experience for a couple of city boys used to caged animals in the city zoo.

As we rode these mountains, drinking from the mountain streams and truly drinking in the works of nature,

Green Mt. Horse Association 100 Mile Trail Ride

This year was the 35th anniversary of the founding of the Green Mountain Horse Association. This organization has grown from a few members to several hundred. Members come from thirty-five states and Canada. The organization now owns its own facilities in South Woodstock, Vt. with one hundred box stalls, kitchen, office, meeting room, etc. This place is staffed twelve months of the year and horse activities are at their height from May through October.

The Association's 26th annual 100 mile trail ride was held August 31 through September 2. The judges this year were Dr. Stephen J. Roberts, Cornell Univ., Ithaca, N. Y.; Dr. Carl Lohmeyer, Somerville, N. J. and Mr. Carl Webster, Chester, Vt.; The chief timer was Charles McCue, East Douglas, Mass. Mr. Rod Leavitt of Richmond, Mass., was recorder and two assistant recorders were Mary Bunting of Cambridge, Mass. and Nancy Ela of Boston, Mass.

There were 71 horses listed on the program to start this 100 mile trek but when the judging in took place on Wednesday, August 30 only 67 were inspected by the judges. Of this number eight were registered Morgans. One Morgan dropped out Thursday and two on Friday. Five Morgans finished on time and four Morgans placed.

This year was a hard one on the horses due to the hot, humid weather. We have had hotter years but this one will go down in the books as one of the most humid ones. A record was made on the second day with nineteen horses dropping out in one day. The last day saw only 42 riders finishing the ride.

This was Arabian year. They did

what the Morgans did a few years ago, winning all three divisions. Here was an excellent example of horses that were properly conditioned. Mr. and Mrs. Nomas Reed owned the three winners as well as the highest placing Morgan

gelding. Tommy won the C. J. O'Neil Trophy for the highest placing Morgan in the Junior Division.

Susan Robinson's entry will certainly bear watching another year. With a little more saddle experience, this pretty mare will be right at the top. The Reeds' Merryvale is always a very strong going horse with a lot of heart. This year she weaned a colt only a month before the ride and still was top Morgan in the Senior Division. Jill Gale did an excellent job on her mare in her first 100 mile ride. She not only placed ninth in the Junior Division but also won the Junior Sportsmanship Award, Junior Stable Award and the Soneldon Trophy. Dr. Holden on U. C. Hermes finished the ride on time but just missed out on the awards. There were several good Morgans that were forced to drop out. Let's hope they will be back next year as they are all a credit to the breed. They are Mrs. Holden's Aurora, Marilyn Martell's Windcrest Encore, and Mr. Adsit's Duke of Cornwall ridden by Joan Austin. These are all good trail type horses. We all hope that all these good Morgans plus many more will be entered in 1962. We want to prove that the Morgan is as good as any other breed in these endurance type rides. Have heard of three Morgan owners who will be in there pitching next year. They are Jeanne Krause on her top stallion, Mary Turgeon on her good gelding and Nancy Ela on a tough mare. There is a rumor Mary Bunting may have a real dark horse lined up. Hope Mrs. Lucille Kenyon from Florida will be back on one of her good Morgans. The above five were really missed this year.

The Green Mountain Stock Farm, Randolph, Vermont was again an ideal setting for the two day All-Morgan Horse Show sponsored by Robert L. Knight for the benefit of Gifford Memorial Hospital, Inc. Justin Morgan made the locale famous many years ago and this writer wonders if the Gifford Memorial Hospital may not be named in honor of the family who owned Gifford Morgan, foaled nearby in Tunbridge. Was not the 1961 gathering of fine Morgan Horses in this location an echo from the past?

Over one-hundred Morgans came from as far away as New Jersey and as near as Randolph itself. The weather cooperated this year as in other years of the show and the sun shone brightly. All 33 classes were well filled with the greater number of entries appearing in the Pleasure Classes. The obstacle race afforded much fun for exhibitors and spectators, the Morgans did not find the scarecrow, bear or Drummer Boy (Deny Emerson) too disconcerting. As the entries for the Harness Pairs warmed up on the dirt road under the tall trees, many spectators were drawn from ring-side to see the past come to life again.

Morgan enthusiasts everywhere are certainly indebted to Mr. Knight who opened his farm to the exhibitors, moving his own horses so stalls would be available for all who wished to enter. Spectators, exhibitors and their Morgans were afforded a most hospitable welcome. The barbecue supper, prepared by residents of Randolph, was an ideal setting for the comradery so enjoyed by Morgan lovers. Thank you Mr. Knight.

The exhibitors and their entries were at the in-gate on schedule as the show always starts on time. This plus

the speedy and excellent judging of Dr. C. D. Parks of Honesdale, Pa. and Mr. Arthur J. Titus of Randolph, Vt., resulted in a smooth moving show with the schedule running ahead throughout the day.

Five new classes were added to the show this year and were cordially received by the exhibitors. The Pairs In Harness, a beautiful class, which was won by Parade and Broadwall Drum Major, both well-known Morgans throughout the East.

The other classes, Junior Harness and Pleasure Driving were exceptionally well-filled with 10 entries in Junior Harness won by Kingston and 16 in Pleasure Driving won by Vigilendon.

The \$100.00 Harness Stake won by Kingston and \$100.00 Saddle Stake won by Waseeka's Nocturne provided the spectators as well as exhibitors with the sense of keen competition among these fine horses.

Two stallions not unknown in the Morgan circles are Gladgay's Pride and Easter Twilight who were Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion of the show.

The Junior Champion Stallion was Orcland Dondarling and Reserve Junior Champion Stallion, Gladgay's Grand March both fine young horses, which will bear future watching.

The Grand Champion Mare was Waseeka's Thisizit, a beautiful mare well known to all. Reserve Grand Champion Mare was Wind-Crest Nancy C also a fine specimen of a Morgan.

The Junior Champion Mare and Reserve Junior Champion Mare were Waseeka's Party Doll and Anneigh's Dainty Miss, both a credit to their owners.

The Pleasure Championship was

copped by that well known Morgan Vigilendon and the Reserve by Lippitt Firelight who was close behind Vigilendon.

We have mentioned only a few of the Morgans of the show, but all were outstanding and deserve mentioning.

Promoting the Morgan

In the year 1955 there were 453 Morgans registered and in 1959 there were 870, as compared with 12,745 Quarter Horses in 1955 and 36,845 in 1959. The Appaloosa registered 365 animals in 1955, and 2,780 in '59 and the Arabians 840 in '55 and 1,596 in 1959. By comparison, and taking in the fact that both the Quarter Horse and the Appaloosa have 'Open' books, the Morgan has been doing fairly well. But is doing well enough? Could it be doing better?

We are rather appalled by the lack of publicity and promotion on the part of breeders and owners of the Morgan horse. Oh, there are a few — there are always a few — who are doing and will continue to do everything they can to further their breed. But how many times have you had a horseman come up to you and ask what breed of horse you have and when you say "Morgan" very proudly, you are met with a rather blank look. Many of our fellow horsemen just don't know anything about the breed.

The Morgan has always had a reputation for being a versatile animal capable of doing just about anything. But how many breeders are proving this? It is fine to write and talk about it, but too many horsemen are 'from Missouri' and that this statement is true must be proven to them. It seems to be a tendency for a lot of purebred owners, Morgans included, to only show in line classes.

One of the most important forms of publicity for the Morgan, and we think the best, is the showing of the horses, thereby presenting it first-hand to the public. This may be broken down into Open Classes and Morgan classes and from there into Performance classes and Halter classes. Of these four categories, we consider the open performance classes to be the most important and of these, the classes that demand specialized skill more so than the Hack, Western Pleasure, etc. These may include Jumping, Cutting, Reining, Dressage, Gymkhana events, racing, etc. When a Morgan owner can take a Morgan horse into classes such as these and come out on top consistently, then that owner has a horse that is living up to its reputation and proving to the

public that the Morgan is the 'doing' horse it is said to be. In classes such as these there are horses of every breed.

We do not mean to slight the Morgan Performance classes or for that matter the Halter classes, for they too are important. But when a Morgan can beat other breeds 'at their own game' where that breed has been developed especially for that work, then the public will sit up and take notice of the fact that there is such a horse as the Morgan.

Another form of promotion is literature. Have you ever tried to find any literature on the Morgan? Very few magazines contain anything, and there are only a very few books that cover the breed. Although the American Morgan Horse Club passed a motion some time ago to have a booklet on the breed published, to date we have heard nothing on it. Such an inexpensive pamphlet could do much towards informing the public about the Morgan. One breeder, Mr. Stuart Hazard, Topeka, Kansas, saw the need for such literature, so wrote and published a booklet giving the history and characteristics of the Morgan. Soon to come out (it will be out the end of August) will be the first hard covered book on the breed — "The Morgan Horse" by Jeanne Mellin (Herrick). This should do much for the breed.

Other than a child's book, this is all the literature that we have been able to find on the Morgan horse — the breed that America made! This is not enough, if we are to make the Morgan one of the most popular horses on this continent.

Then there is The Morgan Magazine — one of the better breed publications and a media for the advertising news and photos of the breeders and owners. But how nice it is, and how very seldom, to pick up an all-breed magazine and find Morgan news and advertising! This is also an excellent place for articles on the breed and in most cases the editors welcome such information along with photos. Why not take advantage of his form of publicity by reporting show results, buys, sales, etc.

Several of the Canadian Morgan owners have found that our decals have

attracted much attention — placed on the sides of their trucks and trailers. Surely the decals in the U. S. can do the same. We heard one Canadian Morgan owner say that they were going to put a Canadian one on one side of their trailer and an American one on the other. If you don't have a vehicle or trailer on which to put one, mount it on tin or wood and, if you live on a farm or ranch, hang it at your gate. You might be surprised at the number of persons, out for a pleasure drive, who will come in to see these horses. Oh, and keep one decal, also mounted on wood or tin, to hang on your stall door at your next show.

When you have people asking for information on the Morgan, take a little time to answer them. One breeder recently got into conversation with a young couple at a show. This couple had come a good many miles to look at the Morgans and one other breed and were in the market for a stallion. After a thorough run-down on the Morgan situation the conversation concluded and the young lady said, "Thank you very much for talking to us, for we have found that very few breeders will take the time." It is quite possible that this couple will become the owner of a Morgan because one breeder took the time to talk with them — a few minutes well spent.

Not to be forgotten is the promotion of the Half-Morgan, a field it seems that is completely passed up by the majority of the Morgan owners. That there is a registry for the half bred is not common knowledge of the average horseman. We would venture to say that part of the reason for the great popularity of the Arabian is because of the promotion for Half breeds and the provision of classes for them at the majority of shows which feature Arabian classes. But how often do you hear of classes for Half bred Morgans? With the prepotence of the Morgan stallion, there should be some excellent type half Morgans. But we have heard grade mare owners say, "I like the Morgan but would rather breed to an Arabian as there are classes where I can show the foal." So we should provide classes of all types for the half Morgan where the number of horses warrant them.

It should be remembered that each and every bit of publicity that you as an individual, help to give the breed, also is promotion for your own horses,

Kane County Fair Horse Show

Mr. Huntoon expressed the fact that, in his experience, exhibitors did not, by the end of a show, feel so much esteem for a judge that they presented him gifts.



The gravel track is smooth now; the Judge's tent with its gay-colored canvas and the official looking beehive of activity is gone, leaving only the bright green circle of stained shavings to show where it stood. But when Morgan people get together for a long time to come, Kane County will be spoken of, and that's for sure!

Before writing this report as Chairman for the four co-operating Mid-Western Morgan Horse Clubs, the Show Manager, Mr. Howard Huntoon, said (in the same sort of tackroom conversation that started the entire effort for Morgans at Kane Co.) that he felt the contributions by the Morgan exhibitors were excellent. He was caused no annoyance, he said, and every exhibitor displayed courteous and professional behavior. It is my pleasure to announce that the Morgan horse is welcome at Kane Co. Fair in 1962! To everyone who participated with interest, contributions and entries goes the warmest thanks.

Contributing in a large way to the success of this first year as a three day show, and to the luster of our reputation, was the Judge for Morgans, Mrs. Anna Ela. It seemed so extraordinary to the announcer, Virginia Marmaduke, that she repeated at each performance the fact that Mrs. Ela came clear from Massachusetts just to judge the Morgan classes. Upon this fact, and her personal charm, has been built a strong foundation among the officials of the show for further Morgan participation. Mr. Ela too, at ringside, contributed hugely to the pleasure of the show, and it is certain that everyone, regardless of where their entries placed, benefitted in some way by Mrs. Ela's evaluation. Following the classes, she visited as many of the exhibitors in the stables as were available, a courtesy that was much appreciated and informative.

There were nearly six hundred horses entered in the show, with a cumulative value of over a million dollars. Forty-nine of them were Morgans, and each

one was shown as if he were worth the whole million.

There were a total of one hundred fifteen single entries among these Morgans, demonstrating again how very versatile are both horses and owners when the horse is a Morgan Horse.

Looking back, the important point seems to be that we saw proven beyond dispute, that a non-professional, junior rider, on a mount trained in a home barn, loved and respected as a partner in all kinds of fun, CAN in fact be exhibited against experienced professionally trained and shown horses competently handled, and win. For all of those who don't show their Morgans for these reasons, consider Robert David Glenn, who carried from the ring three of the eight trophies offered, and did it with his one arm carried, broken, in a sling! A tip of the old fedora to a young man who mixes all this magic with the secret ingredient available to all — WORK. And two more trophies went home with the family, won by Joyce and her champion gelding, Dwight Ashmore in hand, and Sarah proving that Dwight can work as well by topping the Adult Western Pleasure class. Surely this is a mark to shoot at and to remember before an amateur loses heart.

Memorable too, and for equally good reasons, was the special award and silver dish given in recognition of a great stallion. When it appeared that there were nine of the get of one sire being shown in hand, the R. B. Glenn trophy was presented to Chester Trefc in tribute to the incomparable Dyberry Ethan. Ethan and his children, bearing on their halters their winning ribbons, which included Grand Champion Mare and Champion yearling filly, were paraded before the gallery while Robert Glenn made the presentation. If Mr. Trefc received it with moist eyes, and a bit of visible pride, who could blame him? Wow, what a Morgan horse! The Chairman was privileged to take the halter of Del's Donberry for the occasion, when the owner suffered a squashed toe, and con-

tracted a severe case of Morgan fever on the spot, not being fortunate enough to be owned by a Morgan yet.

The success of any show can always be measured in exact proportion to the degree of cooperation shown, and Kane Co. is no exception. No report therefore would be complete without acknowledgement of the cooperation of the four Morgan clubs in this region. Because an extra day was added to the show calendar to accommodate Morgan classes, we were required to provide most of the eight hundred dollars premium money paid in the eight classes, as well as the trophies. With characteristic grace the Mississippi Valley Club, the Mid-West Club, and the Mid-America Club each contributed from their treasury, one-hundred fifty dollars toward the total of five hundred, making all but fifty dollars which was made up by the Central States Club in an extravagant gesture. Trophies were sponsored by Mrs. Edith Kinsman, Norine and Orwin Osman, J. Roy Brunk, Dorothy Moore Jasper, Chester Trefc, Adrienne Mitchell, Roberta Folonie, Donna and Martin Staehnke, and the R. B. Glenn family, which contributed five trophies. These were personal contributions made as individuals and not as club responsibilities. Here again the Chairman's thanks are pale against the wonderful spirit shown in the search for trophy donors.

This report has been deliberately general since each club should be allowed the pleasure of reporting the wins of its own members. The photos accompanying this report were made by Norman E. Grantham, 9734 Reeves, Franklin Park, Ill., and pictures of only the trophy winners were provided to be included with this report. Other photographs have gone to exhibitors and will probably appear as part of their club news.

Rocky Mountain Morgan Horse Club

For me to attempt to report the results of the Circle J sponsored Western National Morgan Horse Show at Estes Park would be like taking a sandwich to a banquet for there will be reams of copy and pictures from those more qualified to report than I — so I'll just keep my comments confined to our own exhibitor from this club. Rocky Mountain Morgan Horse Club represents almost two hundred horses from this area; we had but eleven horses at Estes and that's not good, friends. However, there was also a show at Blackfoot, Idaho, during the same week at which eleven more of our Morgans were shown. Is ten percent of our stock all that is good enough for shows? Perhaps so, but if that is all, then we best start looking to our breeding programs! Too many stallions running around that should be pleasure geldings, and too many broodmares that should be left open. The foregoing is the correspondent's own opinion and does not necessarily reflect the sponsors beliefs.

Mel Frandsen's Wingo, yearling filly out of Cynthia by Ern Pedler's stallion Flying Jubilee, topped third in her class; followed in the next class by Cingo, a two year old filly who again topped her class. I noted in my last column that this filly who walked off with the blue last year might not make it because of a rope burn. But rope burn and all she still beat anything in her class of about fifteen entries. Just what does one breed do for an encore when the same horse tops her class two years running?

Wally Ripple's El Bucky picked up fifth in the two year stallion class; Dick Forsyth's Starfield got fifth in Morgan mare class; our own Kedron Beatrice was sixth in broodmare class of nineteen; Wally Ripple's Chango was fourth in aged stallions and his mare Frenasi was third in produce of dam class — his senior stallion Chango was third in get-of-sire class — so much for the halter classes! Wally's stallion Chango was first in the trailer race. Dick Forsyth's Starfield was entered in five performance classes and did very well; the blue in pole bend, and barrel race, fourth in trailer race and egg race and fifth in stock horse stake.

I should mention right now, that a week later in the District meet here at home, that Dick again scored top honors in performance with his mare, so looks from here like he'll wind up with the trophy for top points in our club. That takes care of the performance horse, so we less fortunate will scramble for top halter points. Now while the Ripples, Frandsens, Pedlers, Forsyths, Bantas and Higgins were enjoying the sights and sounds of Estes, Back at the ranch the Neeleys, Probars, Jessors, Shandrews, Buels and Sharon Bemis were at Blackfoot showing the people in that area some fine Morgan horses. Roy Jessor topped his Colt foals class with Twin Ida Rosilee and Eedahow Lady Stetson in the yearling filly class. Don Cameron took the wrong turn on highway 40 and wound up at Blackfoot rather than Estes and his three year old stallion, Scotish Dawn took the blue. Lima and Dot Ann, both owned by Roy Jessor, placed first and second respectively while Leontine Lindsay owned and shown by Sharon Bemis placed third and Ed Buel's Orange Susette went forth in the mare class. Roy's senior stallion Kenisen topped his class with Jack Shandrew's Major Bolin second. Jack Shandrew's yearling stallion Major Kellog picked up a blue followed very closely, I'm told by Roy Jessor's Twin Ida Major Lynn. Here's the way they looked to the judges for the big purple ribbon: GCS-Kenisen; RGCS—Scotish Dawn; GCM—Lima; RGCM—Dot Ann.

Now again I mention this — two hundred horses, sixty people, not counting the wives, husbands, sons and brothers who belong to the same family, and we get twenty-two horses before the public. Oh, I know that owning and using a Morgan horse is pleasure in itself but try showing them and really enjoy the breed. A two-bit ribbon and two buck trophy will not make any of us rich, but every time we show an animal a few more people become interested, and interested people are Morgan buyers which makes for bigger shows and more riders — thus goes the cycle.

I don't have the results of the Bantas while at Estes, for which I'm truly sorry — can't figure it out, I must have been talking every time they showed and that was frequently — the talking not the showing. My notes show three entries and I'm sure they were out more than that.

A little story — Dick Forsyth has been practicing roping with his club,

so to get in more practice at home he bought a calf which "natch" got the name Freddy the Freeloader. So the calf was put in the pool for the District riding meet and was drawn for the ribbon pull by a local Quarter horse rider named Don Olsen. Now I can't prove it, but do believe that Dick has been tin-canning that calf to get him to run straight and fast for calf roping. Anyway Don and his Quarter horse had a merry ride twice around the arena trying to catch Freddy — with lots of calf support from the spectators. 

contest is held in front of 20,000 admiring onlookers, or before the critical eyes of the contestants only, the one purpose remains: let the horse do it on his own.

For sheer beauty of action, where can anyone see anything more stirring than the cutting horse, head low, actually staring the cow in the eye, twisting, turning and weaving? Here is this gentle, intelligent animal that you can

keep in your own lot, ears flat back, forefeet pounding the dirt, and no matter where that irate cow turns, here, faster than the eye, is the cutting horse frustrating every attempt of the animal to return to the herd.

When the whistle blows the rider drops his right hand to the horse's neck signalling that his job is done. And then the ears come forward, the beautiful head lifts, and the cutting horse fairly tiptoes away from his job. He, too, is proud, and how he hams it up when he hears the applause. Yet he is just as pleased at the swift pat every good rider places on his neck.

Just because I may like a little more horse for my job than the Vermonter or even the Montanian, I can't see why I shouldn't have it, provided I still have the original conformation and characteristics. The only thing is that it is extremely difficult to hold all the desirable characteristics and increase the size. People get the wrong idea when this is brought up too. Right

away they think you want a long legged giraffe of a horse with sickle hocks and a U neck, so they see the poor old Morgan going down the drain."

Again from B.C.: "The Morgan is an every day using horse, let's keep him natural in every way. Use him for any kind of work, (drive him too), show him in all the open classes against Quarter Horses or any other breed and that is what will make him a popular horse and a horse that can keep and show at no extra professional cost."

which, if you have a stallion or raise foals, is invaluable. The following was written by Mr. W. E. Roger, former director of the Animal Industry Branch for the province of Saskatchewan, "The success of any breed of livestock depends partly on certain characteristics of the breed, but primarily on the people (the breeders themselves) who are responsible for maintaining breed standards and who are dedicated to breed improvement."

That the enthusiasm of the breeders

themselves for their breed alone, is largely responsible for the success of that breed, has been proven again and again. A breeder must believe in what he has — in this case, that the Morgan is just a little bit better than any other horse — before he can convince the horseman just what the Morgan is and can do. The breeder must understand just what is expected of the Morgan and should be able to talk intelligently, to a certain extent, about the history and bloodlines.

We would like to pass along the following which was given at a recent meeting of Angus breeders in Georgia, where the breeders were informed that they too, have a public relations job to do. Well, the Morgan breeders also have a public relations job too:

Courtesy — an all purpose item to be used at all times for better friendships.

Sense of Humor — can save a day as well as a friendship.

Generosity — will make new friends and make for good neighbor relationship.

Honesty — makes for more and satisfied customers.

Enthusiasm — to be used vigorously.

Loyalty — all group action requires it.

Faith — very necessary and everyone needs it.

Angus (Morgan) breeders have to get their story across to the public just like industry does. A purebred registry is essential to the story and this is the job of the whole association. Advertising, publicity, literature, movies, display prints and pictures all play a part in the public relations programme.

It was pointed out that nothing beat a satisfied customer once he purchased stock. Try to sell the customer a bull (stallion) that will be satisfactory and a bull (stallion) of sound appearance. Customers complaints should be heard immediately. Treat the customer the way you'd like to be treated.

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

Charles exclaimed, "What's that bone, Dad?" I kicked my horse into a lope and in a moment was beside a weather-beaten moose horn. Charles' day was complete. He cared for it on the return trip East more carefully than we handle eggs from the super-market!

As we started down the mountain Don assured us a horse can go down a trail steeper than it can go up. Those horses could. After the first few minutes I started to breathe once more. Now I understood why he had personally checked all the cinches again before we started our descent on an even steeper trail than we had taken up. A man could not walk down those trails without grabbing for a bush, but even

our blushing bride relaxed after the first few rods on those sure-footed, experienced mountain ponies.

As we rode I recalled my conversation with Don the day before, of his desire to have a Morgan stallion to cross with the mares at their ranch. He is trying to talk his boss into getting one. His outfit also supplies the horses for Jasper Lodge, where thousands ride each season. They have tried other stallions, but Don's desire is still for a Morgan. I hope this desire becomes a reality soon.

Back at the Lodge I ate little dinner. I was still living in my "mountain top" experience. My only desire was to go again, not for a day, but for many days and forget for awhile the schedules and hectic pace of 20th century life.
