

As one of your most interested subscribers, I want to congratulate you on the excellent job you are doing with "The Morgan Horse". I have taken it since the first issue. Was especially interested in the recent articles: "The Story of Jack Davis," of his purchase of Red Vermont from me - and the feature article about Paragraph and her progeny.

I took Red Vermont and Paragraph and another filly by the same sire, Jubilee King, to Vermont in May, 1937, all were two years old. They were all three championship winners under saddle as three year olds in 1938. With the good advice and ground work of my husband, the late John C. Wood, I trained and showed them myself. The third and most sensational one of the trio was Jubilee Kay — as she won many 1st prizes and champions at smaller shows. Then in Sept. 1938, she won the 3-Gaited Saddle Championship at Eastern States Exposition, defeating some of the top American Saddle horses, all of them 4 years old or over. The thing I was most proud of about her, was the fact that she did all her winning with an 8 ounce shoe and a normal toe. She was a born show horse. I sold her as a five year old to Mrs. Huntington Smith of Omaha, Nebraska and she continued showing her for several years, winning many Ladies and 15 hand Open Saddle classes at the top shows of the country. Hills, I fought hard to keep it on a monthly basis even though it put a strain on the Club's finances. Fortunately the interest in Morgans has grown and our Club has been able to support the Magazine. This is not sound business to run the Magazine at a loss each year.

There are several ways to overcome our difficulties. One is to increase subscriptions to a point where commercial houses will be interested in taking advertising space. This can be done by each subscriber getting a friend or neighbor to subscribe. (Card enclosed for this purpose). This is a painless way to help the Magazine.

Another way is to charge for pictures put in the pictorial section but this seems too commercial.

The quickest and most practical way would be for each Regional Club to have a page assigned to them each month for their Club news and for which they pay \$45 per page. We would reserve space so the Regional Club news could be printed at the last minute. # Green Mt. 100 Mile Ride

Townshend Lady-o-Peace highest placing Morgan . . . All Morgans finish . . . First breed group with 100% finishing.

The Twenty-Seventh Annual 100 Mile Ride was held this year out of the Green Mountain Horse Association grounds in South Woodstock, Vermont. This was the first time in the history of the ride that is has started from South Woodstock. Over 50 % of the trails used this year were new to riders. This made for more of an equal challenge to new and old contestants alike. The ride was held on August 29 through September first. The weather was ideal on Thursday, the 30th of August, but on Friday the 31st, it was hot and humid. The final day was cloudy with threatening showers. There were two humid days but the weather was no worse than in some previous years for the horses.

There were 66 entries with 59 being judged in on Wednesday, August 29. Over all the years, this year had the best looking animals ever entered. Every horse was a credit to its breed. There were good conformation Thoroughbreds, Arabians, Standardbreds, Saddlebreds, Quarter Horses and last but not least the Morgans.

Six Morgans started the ride and all six finished the 100 miles though one was disqualified for time. All six Morgans in this ride were good looking and conditioned. This was the first time in history that all animals of one breed that started also finished the 100 miles. The Morgans entered were ones all Morgan people would be proud of. Three Morgans placed in their divisions and two received honorable mention.

Townshend Lady-O-Peace did it again by placing second to the Sweepstake winner. This is "Lady's" fourth 100 mile ride and she has placed in all four. She was fifth the first time, second twice and Sweepstakes winner once. Nancy Ela has been her rider on all of these. Nancy says "Lady" has now done her duty and will be retired to the brood mare band. "Lady" has a tremendous way of going on those steep hills of Vermont. She never seems to tire and is always willing to go regardless of the weather or the terrain. She may inherit some of that from her famous aunt, Sadwin.

Another Morgan that did credit to herself and to the breed was UVM Deborah. "Debby" is a very pretty mare with a lot of go. She was well ridden by Anne Gentry. "Debby," who is owned by the University of Vermont Morgan Horse Farm, won the Best Trail Horse award which she well deserved. This mare also placed fourth in the lightweight division. This was her first year and she should do very well in the future.

In the Junior Division "Merryvale,' owned by Mr. and Mrs. Nomas Reed, placed fifth. This mare has placed year after year for the Reeds. She is a strong mare with a lot of endurance.

"Green Meads Beau," owned and ridden by Sara Haubrich won the Soneldon trophy and was awarded Honorable Mention in the lightweight division. Here again is a very good looking Morgan. What a pretty head and neck! This gelding is due to be heard from.

"Tarik's Radiant Melody" owned and ridden by Phyllis Taylor did very well on "Melody's" first trail ride getting honorable mention in the lightweight division. This is a pretty mare with a big heart. She should do well on her next ride. This was not Phyllis' first ride by a long shot. She has completed many rides and always gives her horse a good one.

"Miller's Commander' ridden by Denny Emerson and owned by his father finished the ride but was 15 minutes late on Saturday so lost out on time. This gelding is a very good looking animal and carries himself well. Denny gave him an exceptionally good ride and I bet next year he will finish higher up. A strong going horse and good looking Morgan.

# **Treasurer's Report**

In spite of the increase of several items of expense this year, the Club increased the unapropriated surplus by some \$22,000. For the Cutting Horse Award we set aside \$1,000 and contributed \$500 to the United States Equestrian Team Fund.

Income from Registrations and Transfers increased by \$6,319.50 to \$29,925.50. Membership dues increased slightly by \$112. The 1961 National Morgan Horse Show, set in operation by Mr. Ferguson, neted \$7,292.64. The Morgan Horse Magazine showed a profit of \$4,552.68, the great part of which is attributable to an increase of subscriptions in the New England area of 1,000 in consequence of the publicity in connection with last year's successful show. Nevertheless, as costs continue upwards, the contract price for printing the magazine has also gone up; thus the reason for the recent increase.

The expenses of the Secretary and Registrar's Office continue but fortunately have been held not only steady but also at a minimum, costing \$17,666.45.

Travelling Expenses for the year of 1961 amounted to \$1,557.26 of which the Secretary was reimbursed \$109.03.

Advertising and Trophy awards continue the promotion of the breed to the extent of \$2,458.95.

The firm of Bigelow, Cotton and Company have examined the accounts for the year ending December 31, 1961 and their report is attached along with the Club's comparative Financial Report for the years ending December 31, 1961 and December 31, 1960.

### **Directors Meet at** Northamption, Mass.

### Morgan Horse Club Morgan Club Elects "Fergie" President

At the annual meeting of The Morgan Horse Club, Inc., in Northampton, Massachusetts just before the National Morgan Horse Show, Mr. J. C. Ferguson of Broadwall Farm, Greene, R. I., was elected President. His first official act was to call for a vote of thanks to Mr. Taft for the latter's three years service as President. As "Fergie," accompanied by his wife, Margaret, have travelled extensively throughout the United States to attend meetings of local clubs and visit Morgan people and farms, an extensive biography is not needed here. Sometimes people are known by their horses; it could be said that Broadwall Farm has not only the Fergusons, and their daughter, "Meg," but also Parade and Drum Major who make such an outstanding pair together. A little known fact is that "Fergie" conceived the idea that the National Morgan Show could be run by a committee (instead of a manager). The past two successful shows attest to his foresight. 1952, ten years ago, marked the first National Morgan Show held at Northampton, a move promoted by "Fergie". See what the September 1952 Morgan Horse Magazine said in the editorial column: "We're ready to eat crow. We refer to our staunch opposition to move the show from Vermont to Northampton. Despite our 'loyal opposition,' the 1952 National Morgan Show was a success. More Morgans, more Morgan people to a more central location.'

As regional Vice-Presidents, Roy Brunk continues in the Central States position, while for the Eastern Region we have Mrs. Roger E. Ela of the Townshend Morgan-Holstein Farm, Bolton, Massachusetts. Both these are familiar as they have judged many shows. Mrs. Ela has bred and shown the winners Townshend Cornita and Townshed Harryet. The Western sec-tion is covered by Dr. Henry P. Boyd of San Rafael, California whose geniality and interest will well serve the club.

To Clarence Shaw of Washington and Vincent Rogers of New York go the Club's appreciation for their service as Directors over the past years. We welcome Leo Beckley of Mount Vernon, Washington and Dean Jackson of Harrison, Montana to the Board.

### Secretarys Report

"What is past is prelude" still holds sway; before we go into the new future, let's review the past.

Twelve months have elapsed since we gathered together here before, at which time we were on the brink of the first four day National Morgan Horse Show. The preceeding weeks for the Committee were suspenseful, especially as it had been rumored that no show could be managed by a committee without a personal manager. We found out otherwise; for the successful show, we must thank the courage of Mr. Ferguson.

Twelve months ago we also saw the closing of the Secretary's office in N. Y. Since then the West Hartford office has had the privilege and commensurate burden of all the activity. After a year of experince our amazement for accomplishment goes to the former office - Mr. Hills and Miss Schlomann.

The Club is most fortunate to have such great cooperation of the Treasurer Mr. Chauncy Stillman, but for whose Father (need we remind anyone) we would not be here today. Many thanks to Mr. Stillman.

The number of registrations for the past calendar year amounted to 1,135, an all-time high and higher by 66 than the then record. The actual number of transfers decreased; due to a change in the system, necessitated by the publishing of same in the Magazine.

The resolutions in connection with the Register passed by the Directors in the past year are an indication of maturity. The rule that all animals must be registered before the expiration of their second year should have been passed earlier; Mr. Hills desired that action in 1960. The rule that the seller is to complete personally in full each Transfer Application, re-affirms the Board's dedication to maintain the identity of the specific animal. These resolutions manifest an awareness of reality.

You will be glad to hear that we have received our first voluntary, unsolicited, contribution to the Cutting Horse Purse. A nominal amount from a very generous heart.

We are now on the brink of the 20th annual National Morgan Horse Show. To recognize this anniversary, former winners have been included in this (Continued on Page 66)

## **Basic Horsemanship**

By WILLIAM R. CULBERTSON and ALLEN G. RICHARDSON

With this issue we are pleased to present this informative article on Horsemanship as prepared by William R. Culbertson and Allen G. Richardson for the Colorado State University. Additional copies of this booklet may be obtained for 15 cents by writing to: Extension Service, Colorado State University, Fort Collins, Colorado.

#### INTRODUCTION

There are riders and there are horsemen. Every horseman is a rider but not every rider is a horseman.

The following material is presented to help every rider become a better horseman or horsewoman. It is basic material which can be applied to every type of riding with only slight modification. Use of the ideas expressed will develop the rider's balance and form. The trained horse will be responsive and alert to the rider's demands.

The methods shown follow closely the Colorado Western Horsemanship Rules which have been designed to serve as standards for Colorado 4-H clubs and state shows. Copies of these rules may be obtained from county extension agents. Judges and show managers are urged to use the Colorado Western Horsemanship Rules for Colorado shows.

Skill in use of the following horse-

manship methods requires practice. The reward will follow in more enjoyment in handling a better trained horse in a correct manner.

Some trainers and instructors will have slightly different methods; some more advanced. No criticism of these methods is intended if they produce the desired results.

Inexperienced riders will find the following methods easy to follow and should plan to progress to more advanced ideas as they become experienced.

The sections on mounting, seat, and position at the gaits are important to 4-H club members who will be judged on these positions at 4-H horse shows.

SADDLE UP! Many persons have helped in the ideas expressed, and the authors hope your ride through these pages gives as much enjoyment as did the preparation.

As you try the methods, don't forget

to "pull up in the shade" occasionally and "think things out.' Your goal is a well trained horse and a better rider not rushing to be ready for this year's show.

#### MOUNTING

Two starting positions are considered proper for mounting.

The first position (fig. 1) shows the rider standing by the horse's left shoulder with his body facing a quarter turn to the rear. His head is turned so he can watch both ends of the horse. This position should be favored for riders using green and strange horses. Also, many riders find this position makes it easier to place their left foot in the stirrup.

The rider using this first position will generally give one hop on the right leg and go into the second position (fig. 2) as he swings into the saddle.

The second position is used when the rider is tall enough to stand and place his left foot in the stirrup without moving back to the rear flank of the horse. The rider should face the saddle squarely and should turn his left foot so the toe points in toward the cinch.

In both positions the rider holds the reins in the left hand, which is placed firmly on the neck. The right hand steadies the stirrup for the left foot and then is placed upon the saddle horn. The left knee braces against the horse's body.



The handsome young stallion Millers BenDel owned by France Pugh won the Stallion Saddle Event over Don-Darling, Lord Linsley, Wm. Coddingtons Masterman, Bald Mt. Sundance for Lt. Col. and Mrs. McCallum, and Ran-Bunctious, Hillcrest Acres.

In the large Maiden Saddle Class, Bald Mt. Sundance made a good win over Ethel Garner's young stallion, The Yankee, James Cole's Carolina, Archie's Roxie Marie, Mary Woolverton's Prince of Pride, and W. Brittain's Delight Ashmore.

Novice winner was Miller's BenDel, then Bald Mt. Sundance, The Yankee, Roxie's Archie Marie, Holtz Stables' Trophleen, and Prince of Pride.

Harness classes were a little light but quality was tops: The mare and gelding class was won by Orcland Donanna, over Spring Delite of Camelot and Daymars Dark Secret. In Combination it was Spring Delite over Ran-Bunctious.

Western and pleasure events were heavily contested and large classes . . . with so many newcomers the good old campaigners had to go some to stay in the ribbons with all the fresh new ones making it interesting! The beau-

tiful little Roxie's Archie Marie took the Western Pleasure Event for Richard Patton over Prince of Pride, Robert Usinger's Towne Ayr Holly, Cascade Farms Towne Ayr Troubadour, C. D. Mrs. Conn, over Manito and Broadwall Golden Boy. Manito also won the Justin Morgan class and took the trotting race by ten lengths over Daymar's Dark Secret and A. B. Dillon. This assured Manito the Arrowhawk Versatility Championship Trophy given on points in classes scored.

The crowd pleasing hunter-jumper classes went as follows: Ann Hopkins gave A. B. Dillon a great ride to win the Jumping Class over Sir Knobbineze Vona, Prince of Pride, and Manito. In the Working Hunter it was the Palomino Prince of Pride over Manito, Sir Knobbineze Vona, Dillon and Miss Breezewood. A. B. Dillon and Manito won the Pair event for Ann and Bill Hopkins and Edie Horner topped Richard Patton on Archie's Roxie Marie in the AHSA event.

Edie Horner also won the Open Horsemanship event for children 13 years and under with Christine Buzec next on A. B. Dillon, Joanne Eigelsbach on Lord SunTar, Jessie Colgate on Broadwall Golden Boy. Suzanne Lucine was Leadline winner over Sally Simons, Betty Jane Lucine and Michael Walters. Winner of 14-18 Horsemanship event was Richard Patton, Patty Day, Robert Downey and Richard Downey.

The Mid-Atlantic Futurities and breeding classes were plentiful-filled and of high quality. Vona's quality and typy foals were the biggest winners in the Foal divisions; Dutchess BenalindaVona won the Weanling Futurity over Parks Dyberry filly, Richards Ranch Gallant Fox, Senorita Bumblez Vona, and Major Showallis Vona. In the Open Foal classes the Vonas repeated with their winning filly Dutchess Benalinda Vona over Parks' filly, and Senorita BumBlez Vona. The stud foals were topped after a good contest by an attractive well-grown young fellow, My Count Showaida Vona, over Mr. and Mrs. Woodings Acadia's Triumph, RR Gallant Fox, Major Showallis Vona, and Gene Parr's colt. The Yearling Futurity winner was Mary Arnold's well grown Ar-nona Charlie L, then C. D. Parks Dyberry Melaney, and Dr. and Mrs. A. Lucine's County Squire. Charles Patton was happy to have his filly win the open yearling class (Miss Sugarloaf) followed by Warner Brittain's Marymore Sue, Dyberry Melaney, Mr. and Mrs. Bernard Homers Turnpike Kay Date and Ruth E. Mills Mistress Showhawk Vona mares. In the open Yearling stallions it was again Arnono Charlie L. over County Squire. Frances Pugh had the winning two year old mare with Carolina Gypsy, over Vona's Queen Showvanity Vona. Stallions were topped by Joselene Farms Mr. Showhawk Vona over Ethel Gardners The Yankee. In a quality class of broodmares C. D. Parks typy Dyberry Nekomiss topped them all, followed by Woodings Orcland Linda, Joselene's Countess Aida Vona, Springbrook Linda Lee and Richards Peggy Lou. Spring Delite of Camelot won the senior mare class over Tastee's Indian Summer, Donnette of Camelot, Orcland Linda, Caroline and Jane B. Marlo. D. Fowler's Dyberry Dan, Edie Horner's Lippitt George Moro, Vona's Sir Knobbineze and Ace High, Simons.

Stake night was a real Saturday night show for horses and spectators alike! Mike Brittain's Delight Ashmore started off by copping the Mid Atlantic Sweepstake over Holtz Gypsy Eileen, Vona's Mr. Showman, Richards Mandate's Peggy Lou, Coddington's Masterman and Wm. Hopkins' Manito. As the evening progressed and the workouts continued, many new champions were crowned. Orcland Farms took the Junior Harness Stake with the perfect mannered Orcland Donanna, followed by Thomas White's personable entry, Spring Glo of Camelot.

# **Gold Cup Show**

The second annual Gold Cup Horse Show, Inc., was held July 7th and 8th at the Crawford County Fairgrounds, Bucyrus, Ohio. Nearly 1,000 people watched approximately one hundred Morgans compete from seven states. Ideal weather, competition at its best, no serious mishaps and cooperation from the exhibitors made this one of the finest shows of the season.

The aged stallion and mare classes were very big and difficult ones for Mr. Titus to judge. Windcrest Play Boy was pinned Grand Champion with Vigilmarch giving him a run for the money all the way. Lippitt Victoria Amanda was tops over the mares with Reata's Elation Reserve. Grand Cham-pion Gelding went to Danbury with Zephyr Reserve. The young horses were tremendous! Not very long ago I can remember seeing only one or two in the "under 4" classes. The three year old filly class could well have been the aged mare class in number and in quality. Same held true for most of the other classes.

The Championship Saddle Class, English, was won by Billy B. Geddes. Ed Earchart always gives this stallion a top ride - championships are no novelty to him and this performance was no exception. Helene Zimmerman rode Milford Fox's Deerfield Challenger for Reserve. Both the English and Western Pleasure Stakes were captured by Green Hill's Dev-Tone so capably presented by Judy Decker. Reserve English Pleasure went to Sonny Boy owned by H. Fawcett while the Reserve Western Pleasure was won by Hi-Jax Kid, Harold Niemi, owner. Climax of the show was the Fine Harness Stake won by Vigilmarch. This beautiful black stallion was driven in fine style by A. J. Andreoli as he competed successfully against nine other stallions in one of the most impressive classes in the show. Reserve went to Ricky Mar-Lo owned by C. A. Steward and driven by Henry Jennings.

The Green Hill Farm of Farmington Michigan took the most first place honors, totaling six. The famous George Gobel dazzled the crowd with his championship form and speed as Harry Andre demonstrated the Roadster Class. This horse can really go! In the Cavalcade Americana Class, the spectators were having some difficulty selecting the winner. Judge Titus obligingly drove the entries for comparison. One entry happened to be a sidesaddle - made no difference to Mr. Titus and we all got a good laugh as he rode around the ring.

Never have I attended a show where one horse completely captivated the spectators, officials and exhibitors as the mare, Lippitt Victoria Amanda did here. "Vicky" was purchased at the first weanling sale by Mrs. Junk four years ago and is making her first season of showing in harness and saddle. She is small, but every inch a model, every ounce a performer. She had had little training when she came to this show and she made a few mistakes, but before this mare is retired to the broodmare band she will have compiled a long list of championships! She made a good beginning with Gr. Champion Mare, a first in a saddle and harness class with some other good placings. Judge Titus had only to glance in her direction and the applause was spontaneous. I was told at the Entry Booth that there was a long "waiting list" of people who wanted to take her home -including the steward, a saddlebred man.

It was a good show! We missed our first President, Nevin Combs - he would have been proud. Bob and Kay Chapman served as Show Manager and Show Secretary. Not enough praise can be given these people. Plans are already under way for a show next year. Thanks to all the member clubs and their representatives, who worked so hard to make this Regional Show such a success.

### The Elm Creek Trail Ride at Oklahoma City

Fifty miles is short, as competitive trail rides go, but even so, for riders and horses it is quite an experience. For onlookers the ride holds a tremendous amount of sustained excitement as well as a good close up look at stamina, heart, will and training of both horses and riders. It also gives you a microscopic view of human emotions and values.

The Elm Creek ride started at six on a hot Saturday afternoon. The starting point was just southeast of Oklahoma City at the home of Buck Gee, trail boss. Ten of thirteen entries showed, and were checked by the veterinarian. Two Morgans; a mare and a gelding, both four years old a nineteen year old Arabian stallion, an Anglo-Arab, a Thoroughbred - Saddlebred cross, Thoroughbred stallion, a Quarter horse stallion, a four year old Appaloosa mare, a Porto Rican stallion, and a couple of local kids and horses; who dropped out at the first stop. The Appaloosa and the Morgan gelding were substitutes for horses that had suffered lameness or injury. The Morgan mare, the Anglo-Arab, and the Crossbred were apparently the best conditioned horses for the ride. Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas were represented in the ride. Juniors and Seniors were about evenly divided. The Juniors ranged from 11 to 16 years of age. The youngest Senior rider was 17. Weight of the Seniors was recorded as being from 160 to 260 pounds.

Everyone gathered at the starting point and at the signal were off. There was a feeling of excitement as the horses found their best gait and each rider jockeyed for position. On a short ride such as this, one must keep to the fore, if he expects to finish first — or else have an exceptional horse that can move up in a later stretch.

The ride was laid in the Elm Creek and Little River bottoms. Part of the trail will soon be under water; a portion of the Elm Creek Reservoir. The first 10 or 12 miles were almost straight up and down with hard, red rock alternating with soft, deep sand.

There was one water stop before the riders came rearing into Stella, the first forty-five minute stop. They had covered fifteen miles. There were about twenty-five minutes between first and last riders; with the exception of the Junior on the Quarter Horse, who, even with all the precautions taken, had gotten lost. What with watering, feeding, cooling out, vet checks, etc., the place was like a beehive. Stella consisted of a church and a store. With several Saturday nighters out, a revival in progress and the riders, judges, grooms and spectators coming in there was quite a contrast in people and doings.

About nine the first riders pulled out. By now it was very dark and riders that had forgotten flashlights tried to stick close to those that had them. The second leg of the ride was over smoother ground, however, here was the deep

sand, and riders worked to keep their mounts in the track of the road.

They came into Franklin after midnight, with about an hour's spread between the first and last rider, excepting the one that had been lost. He had been found four miles off course. The judges gave him the four and put him back on the trail. Horses were thirsty by now — riders tiring.

Some of the people stayed to themselves, most helped each horse and rider as the need arose. The good sportsmanship of these people is commendable. What a heart warming sight to see these folks helping a competitor. Here there was no thought of personal gain, but plain old fashioned mannerliness and kindness. To know that youngsters as well as adults have such an example to emulate is one of the most worthwhile rewards of such an experience.

The Crossbred was now trying for first place. The Morgans were being challenged by the Arabians. The Appaloosa and Porto Rican were riding together and the Quarter Horse was last.

The moon was up and it was cool as we moved back to the starting point which was also the finishing point. The suspense mounted; this was a retracement of the first part of the ride. Most of the horses had not been trained on such steep terrain and we knew it would tax both riders and mounts.

Around three the first riders on the Crossbred, came in. About fifteen minutes later the Morgans came flying in with the Arabians pushing hard. The remaining riders were strung out more than two hours. NOW riders could rest — if they had someone to cool out the horses. All that remained were vet checks and the judges decisions.

In the early morning light it was announced that the Crossbred was Junior Division winner. The Thoroughbred rider was received of the horsemanship trophy. Foy Jean Crookham, riding the Morgan mare, Queenette, was awarded the sportsmanship trophy. She was the youngest rider entered and placed second in the Junior Division.

The woman riding the Anglo-Arab won the Senior Division horsemanship trophy. The riders of the Appaloosa and the Porto Rican both received sportsmanship trophies.

Tim Tam Cotton, the Morgan gelding, had won the Senior Division Trophy - first place. He made a tremendous ride, showing the heart and will for which Morgans are famous. He carried one of the heaviest loads of any horse in the ride. Much credit should go to his young rider, seventeen year old Linda Groner of Sherman. Texas. Tim Tam also won the Morgan trophy. Every completing rider received a silver engraved buckle. Tim Tam Cotton is owned by Mr. Billy J. Carpenter, Fort Worth, Texas. Queenette is owned by the Circle C Ranch, Southmayed, Texas.

Mrs. Kenyon's wonderful little stallion competed in the 100 miler last year, but had to be pulled, due to the excessive heat, so this is the first ride in this area that Morgans have completed. Every mind seemed to turn to the outstanding performance of these horses. In fact, Morgans seemed to be



## **Central States News**

By the time this October issue of the Morgan Horse Magazine is printed, the last loose ends of business will have been concluded and a new club will have been born — The Mid-States Morgan Horse Club (Mid-America x Central States). Until a new slate of officers has been elected, the Mid-States news column will be written alternately by the two present Publicity Secretaries, June Osborne and Dorothy Colburn.

For the first time since its inception some six months ago, our "Grab-bag Profile' will not appear in this column. Illness in your correspondent's family held up proceedings and it didn't get written in time. However, it will appear again soon with the life story of the Morgan stallion, Rhythm's Bimbo.

Last month we listed the Morgan winners at the Sunbury Horse Show and failed to mention the winner of the class for Morgans Under Saddle! We are very sorry for this omission — the winner was Jaunty Justin owned by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Matas of Chicago Heights, Illinois. We have heard since that Jaunty went on to win the Morgans under Saddle (under 15 hands) and the Land of Lincoln Morgans in Harness classes.

When our "Grab-bag Profile" of Billie Hanson's Brown Hawk appeared in the July issue of the magazine, it brought a response from Mrs. Leigh C. Morrell of Brattleboro, Vt. The Morrel's had "Brownie" in their stable for a few months during 1955 and showed him several times. She says that they "like Mrs. Hanson, soon learned that he was a real 'steam-roller'." Mrs. Morrell had a lot of interesting things to say about Brownie and I shall quote from her letter.

"He had to be held to be mounted, as the minute your foot touched the stirrup he was ready to take off, western style. And you really had to collect him before taking a canter or you'd be halfway around the ring before you realized that your heel had more than nudged him. However he was an angel in the stall and as long as you were on the ground. We, likewise, learned to leave the whip at home.

"His first show was in early June, 1955, at Garden State Park, Camden,

New Jersey, and he did himself proud with a second in the open and reserve in the Stake. However, the very next week was another story, as he blew his stack in the Open class. We learned after that never to take him from his stall until we were ready to ride him right into the ring. Apparently he figured fifteen to twenty minutes was long enough for any one outing and we had had to wait for a delayed class. However, the next day he took fourth in the Stake right behind Windcrest Dona Lee, Black Sambo and Princess Jarnette, so he was travelling in fast company.

"At that time we showed him in several more shows before taking him up to Northampton . . . It was at that show where he took second in the Model Geldings which gave him enough points to win the Mid-Atlantic Champion Gelding for 1955 . . . a point which you either didn't know, or failed to mention.

"Am so glad to know that he is being fully appreciated, for he is a lovely Morgan and I always felt that with long and patient handling he could have a renewed outlook on life."

It appears that the "long and patient handling" given him by Billie Hanson has had the desired result for Brown Hawk has become an excellent pleasure and show horse.

In summer, in this part of the country, parades vie with horse shows for the attention of horsemen. At one Independence Day parade forty horses turned out and our Vice-President, Rae Miller, ran away with the prizes. Rae won the trophy in the senior division, riding his Palomino mare, Ginger Day and Nancy Peak rode Son-Gin (a half-Morgan son of Ginger Day, by Cavendish) to win the trophy in the junior division. In another large parade, a great many of the local Morgans turned out. One of our members, Georgia Pfiester, in her mother's words "took her nerve in one hand and her half-Morgan, Brownie's Red Oak, in the other," borrowed a side-saddle and made quite a hit. In fact, she was so encouraged that she proceeded to ride side-saddle on her mother's filly, Lady in Lace, in the Costume class at the Wilmington Horse Show and won

third place.

Donna Staehnke reports the sale of the weanling filly, Merrichill's Dorine (Dorian Ashmore x Justa Trinket) to Mr. Vin DiFrancis of Amberg, Wisconsin. Also a horse trade has taken place within the Staehnke family Donna has traded her yearling filly Merrichill's Rexene (Ricardo x Sue C) to her son, Mark, for the black filly, Emerald's Irish Lady. Mark, who has quite a flair for tracing pedigrees, has found that Sue C has a most unusual pedigree, going back on both sides to the Morrill family of Morgans which is said to have been almost entirely absorbed by the Standard breed. Sue, herself, is a remarkable driving horse. Her filly, Rexene, being sired by Ricardo, himself the sire of the famous trotting Morgan, George Gobel, should have all the makings of a real trotting horse, combined with good Morgan type.

Nancy Collins of Downers Grove reports the sale of the good Morgan gelding, Caven-Glo Sun Sand to Gene Applequist of Aurora, Illinois. Mr. Applequist, a member of the Fox Valley Trail Ride Association, has been using "Sandy" for trail riding and also in his work at the stock yards at Aurora and says he wouldn't trade him for any horse in the world. Sandy is the Morgan that Miss Collins took to the Illinois Stock Horse Ass'n. One Hundred Mile Ride in southern Illinois last September, so he is already well versed in that sort of work.

It is with deep regret that I must report the death of the up and coming young Morgan stallion, Tomar, owned by Frank J. Marrek of Hinckley, Ohio. His death was quite a shock to his owners and I would like to quote from Mr. Marrek's letter:

"It is with a heavy hand that I write to tell you that all our hopes for the future of Tomar our 3 year old stallion are shattered.

"Tomar was foaled in 1959, Sire, Pentor 11137 and Martana 07979.

"My daughter saddled him Friday, July 28, for a workout and after a pass around the ring he toppled down. He rose and after taking a few steps fell again and died within 5 minutes.

"Dr. Wolf who performed the autopsy said the cause of death was peritonites, but could not find the cause of infection. It had gotten into his blood stream.

"In his short career he had 2 blues, 1 red, 4 yellows, 2 whites and 1 pink.

"We are all smitted by his death but have the memory of his pride and spirit and we will start all over again, hoping we can show another horse as fine. We loved that horse so much and gave him the best of care. He had no signs of sickness at all.

"We have a stud yearling and a month old colt at present so it will be a few years before we see you at the shows again."

Down in southern Ohio the Joe Bukey's report that Sugar Run Farm's Lippitt Victoria Amanda won the Open English Three-Gaited class at the Jackson County Fair in Wellston on July 21st.







The rider swings up and into the saddle with a spring, pushing with the right leg. The body is balanced with the left hand on the neck, the right hand on the horn, and the left knee against the horse. The rider should spring enough to place a minimum of weight on the left leg until the body is over the saddle. Then the weight is held by the left leg and the body is lowered smoothly into the seat. The rider should learn by practice not to swing too high and plop into the saddle.

With practice, a rider will mount in a smooth easy motion faster than these instructions can be read.

Colorado Western Horsemanship Rules do not require riders 13 years of age and under to dismount and mount when showing. These riders should learn these positions and use them just as early as their size or the size of the horse they ride will permit.

# DISMOUNT

To dismount, the rider takes the excessive slack out of the reins, places the left hand on the neck, the right hand on the horn, moves the left foot slightly back in the stirrup, and shifts his weight to the left leg, with the knee against the horse.

The rider swings out of the saddle, keeping the right leg as close to the horse as possible without hitting the cantle and the rump. Do not swing the right leg in a wide arc. Keep it close to the near side of the horse so you will be facing slightly forward when the right foot touches the ground.

Push the heel of the left foot down to allow the stirrup to slip off the toe. Do not roll the foot on a side to get out of the stirrup.

In dismounting at a fast gait, the rider's body should face more to the front.

The rider's position in the saddle is very important for correct use of aids and in maintaining balance for ease of riding.


Sit "tall in the saddle," in a balanced, relaxed manner. Keep the back erect, and flex with the horse. Do not slump in the saddle and never sit back on the cantle with the feet shoved forward. A good rider will find it necessary to change the seat slightly for special types of riding (as in cutting contests), but the basic principles remain the same. A rider sits where he can control the horse with aids, is in a comfortable riding position, and has his weight where it will help the horse.

The rider in figure 3 is sitting

straight and secure in the saddle. The position of the body is deep in the seat of the saddle and not up on the cantle.

A line dropped from the center of the shoulder falls down the back of the heel. A line from the point of the knee falls near the toe. The shoulders are back, and the arms are held near the body. The rein hand should be held just above and in front of the saddle horn. The other hand is held loosely on the thigh.

The leg maintains light contact with the horse's body through the inside thigh and upper calf. The foot is turned out slightly in a natural position, with the weight on the ball of the foot and the



heel lower than the toe. Riders should train stirrup leathers so the stirrup is turned at a right angle to the horse's body to relieve pressure on the foot. A welltrained stirrup holds the foot more securely and stops easy loss of the stirrup.

Figure 4 shows the way not to sit in a saddle—but many riders do it. It is not a secure seat. Many modern saddles are made in a style that makes it almost impossible for a rider to sit any other way, so the rider should be careful when buying a saddle. In this position, the rider will not be in balance with the horse and will get "behind" the action of the horse. Any pressure on the stirrups will push the rider's seat out of the saddle.

# THE AIDS

The basic aids used in controlling the horse are the hands, legs, and weight. Use of these aids, either alone or in combination with each other, varies with the action desired and the degree of training of the horse. Specific use of the aids will be covered under later sections on gaits and movements, but the following general points apply at all times.

# Hands

The hands control the forehand of the horse directly by use of the reins. In advanced riding, the hands will have an indirect influence on the hindquarters.

A good hand is steady, light, soft, and firm. Steadiness is very important for light, soft control. The degree of firmness should be just enough to control the horse.

The rider should hold his arms, elbows, hands, and fingers relaxed and flexible. The reins should be held with just enough slack for light contact with the horse's mouth. This degree of slack will vary and is shown in the section under the gaits.

Signals to the horse are given by slight movements of the hand and by flexing the arms and fingers.

Western riders hold the reins with one or more fingers between the reins. At the present time some show rules do not allow any fingers between the reins. Colo-

rado Western Horsemanship Rules allow one finger between the reins. Check the rules under which the show is operating.

# Legs

The legs control the hindquarters of the horse by pressure of the calves and heels. After the horse has been trained, the action of the legs alone will get response without using rein direction.

Spurs are used to emphasize leg action and should be used only as varying degrees of pressure.

Excessive swinging of the legs is a common fault with many Western riders. Maintain a steady leg contact with the horse's body.

# Weight

The rider's weight is used as an aid by shifting the body slightly to help the horse obtain the action indicated. Weight influences the ability of the horse to move its feet and legs into desired positions for action.

Do not get the habit of "throwing the horse around" with excessive weight shifts. Move just enough to help and guide the horse, but not enough for observers to see readily.

Riders in the show ring will find it essential to use the aids and positions for riding, but remember that the basic points help any rider to improve his riding and the horse's performance, even if they never plan to show.

Bobbie Sosson, of San Bernardino's Circle Arrow Ranchers, placed a good second on her registered Morgan gelding, Starstone's Delight.

# A Hoosier at The National

We were the envy of all our friends in the Indiana Morgan Horse Club. We were going to the National. Reservations had been made in January, and endless hours had been spent in planning. It would be much more than just a horse show to us. Mary Ann is a Vermonter, and we met at the National at Windsor, Vt., in 1951, Justin Morgan 1 was known as a "Peculiar" horse, and the breed is peculiar today, in the old meaning of the word. They are THE 'Family' horse. Individuals of other breeds are known for their winnings in the show ring or on the track. Morgans are almost always known in connection with people. Who could hear of Upwey Ben Don without remembering Ted Davis, with his enthusiasm and great love for Morgans and Morgan folks?

So, we were looking forward to seeing old friends, and meeting new ones. Leaving Muncie on Saturday, July 21st, our first stop was early the next morning at Mesopotamia, Ohio, at the home of Milford and Jane Fox. There we saw Deerfield Challenger, Devan Cap (Who put on quite a show for us), and the band of mares and colts. Truthfully though, Jane's homey kitchen, with the old prints and the family gathered around the table, was as big an attraction to me as the horses.

The data from the articles, transferred to a note book and indexed, has been most helpful in tracing the families of our Hoosier Morgans.

Mary Ann spent her time in the grandstand, trying to catch everything in the ring. I took pictures and visited. It was good to see Gerald Taft and to learn that his health has improved some. We need him. We did not get to talk to the new President, but we wish him the best in his position. He has a big job. Mrs. Ted Davis gallantly carries on. It was sad to hear of the death of their young stallion, Windcrest Sensation. Ted had pinned such high hopes on him.

Doctor Farmer promised us that Joan D would be back next year for old times sake. We talked to Bob Baker, and learned that my old favorite, Miss Tweedy, has been laid away.

Only time to say hello to Warren Patriquin and many others. Warren does enough work to kill an ordinary man, but is always on his toes like a good photographer has to be.

#### THE MORGAN HORSE CLUB, INC.

#### The following resolutions have been passed by the Directors:

1 - Effective with the postmark of January 1, 1963 no animal shall be eligible for Registration in the AMERICAN MORGAN HORSE REGISTER which has passed the 3rd December 31st subsequent to the actual foaling date.

That is: all animals must be registered by postmark on or before Decem-

ber 31st of their two year old year. All birthdays are computed

on a January 1st basis in accordance with the American Horse Shows Association rules.

- Example: During the calendar year of 1963, Applications for registrations will be accepted only for foals born during the calendar years of 1961, 1962 and 1963. On January 1, 1964 foals born prior to January 1, 1962 will be ineligible for registration.
- 2 Effective with the postmark of July 1, 1962 it shall be the responsibility of the seller to complete **personally in full**, including the actual date of transfer and the name and address of the purchaser, each Application for Transfer. Provided, that where a horse is consigned at a regular auction sale, it shall be the duty of the sale manager to insert on the Application for Transfer the complete name and address of the purchaser including the actual date of transfer.
- 3 Effective with the postmark of April 7, 1962, no horse shall be eligble to registration in the American Morgan Horse Register which has a wall eye (lack of pigmentation on the iris) or natural white markings above the knee or hock except on the face.
- 4 Effective with the postmark of August 1, 1962, the name of an animal already registered in the AMERICAN MORGAN HORSE REGISTER shall not be changed, except by action of the Board of Directors.





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

#### THE LURE OF CUTTING

WILLARD H. PORTER

People who love horses are a dedicated bunch. Their dedication usually dates back into their childhood. I mean the true, honest horseman is usually a person who first straddled a mount when he or she was just a button of a kid.

If he has developed a proficiency for horse sports, he may become a calf roper, a polo player, a race rider, a horse show handler, or a skilled practitioner of any number of specialized equine jobs. He may also become a professional cutting horse rider. And if he keeps this up for any time and works with a few top mounts, he will certainly want to continue this line of riding after he is 35 or 40.

The special lure of the professional cutting horse is for the older owner-rider, the guy who has been active with horses all his life and doesn't want to quit, but is too old to compete in calf roping with his son and certainly doesn't want to 'dog' steers anymore.

The cutting horse contest is a real challenge for the dedicated horseman. In the first place, the quality and calibre of the horses is wonderful — they are a real joy just to look at, to admire, to study. Then their performance is brilliant and colorful. If you think it's easy to ride one of these cattle-shifting grasshoppers, guess again before you settle down onto the slick leather-covered tree of a stock saddle cinched to the likes of a Poco Lena, a Kings Michelle or a Senor George.

There's a big thrill, too, for the rider of a winning performance combination, when a good horse really uses a shifty steer or heifer, when every movement goes perfectly. When this happens—the perfect and fast blocking of a cow brute's attempt to return to the herd—you get the thrill of knowing that you're winning. You know the judges will score you high, and you know the crowd appreciates what's going on because you can hear them applauding you and your horse.

It gets a hold of a fellow. It gets him just as much as it affects a calf roper making an almost impossible catch as a swift junior Brahma decides to turn left 100 feet out of the chute.

Cutting has a thrill all its own. Couple this with the fact that middle-aged and even elderly men can safely ride cutting horses and you come up with a contest that is both stimulating and exciting . . . and is also the most competitive game on horse-back. To the western horseman, the lure of cattle cutting on the best of horseflesh is indeed appealing. The rewards are also deeply satisfying, as more and more owners, riders and trainers are discovering each year.

Thanks to the continued efforts and services of the sport's guiding group — The National Cutting Horse Association—the popularity of cutting is steadily growing and purses are getting higher and higher every year.

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
