

Letiers to the Editor

Dear Sir,

We read with interest President Ferguson's proposal to include classes for natural footed horses in the National Morgan Show.

This is not a new idea. It was suggested two years ago by several members of the New York State Morgan Horse Society and dropped because the feeling was that since the rules are there, they should be enforced.

Now, however, it seems to us that this pioneering of special classes may well be the answer. If the public can be shown the attributes of the naturally stylish Morgan, public demand can happily bring about the purpose of the rule.

The National is definitely the place for the inauguration of such classes. And we believe that if President Ferguson were to make the request, other show committees would gladly follow this lead. We are sure that the great majority of Morgan owners prefer their horses with natural feet. As Mr. Ferguson suggests, put a good big bundle of money on such classes, because money does talk.

The conditions of the classes would need to be worked out. Keg shoes, by all means, should be used. But for a few big Morgans, a four inch toe may possibly be too short. Four inches of toe, however, is longer than you think. (Continued on Page 52)

Vermont 100 Mile Trail Ride

Largest entry ever . . . one third fail to finish . . . Morgans place 2nd and 3rd . . . Lucille Kenyon has top Morgan.

Ira Gordon of Hunter, N. Y., on his Morgan gelding TIMBER TRAILS, won the Senior Horsemanship award.

One of the largest entries ever, competed in this year's Green Mountain Horse Association 100 mile trail ride. This was the twenty-eighth annual ride and had seventy-seven entries. It was held out of South Woodstock, Vermont. The judges were Dr. Edward L. Shuford, Arden, North Carolina; Mr. G. W. Mann, Bartow, Florida and Dr. Wingate Mackey Smith, Coatesville, Pa. The chief timers were Mr. and Mrs. Charles B. McCue of East Douglas, Mass. The recorder was Mr. Rod Leavitt of Manchester, N. H. and the assistant recorders were Susan Robinson, Windsor, Vt., and Peter Haubrich, Claremont, N. H. Judge Kenneth Robinson was the official weigher.

This ride is designed to stimulate greater interest in the breeding and use of good horses, possessed of stamina and hardiness for trail ride use. This ride also encourages the learning of the proper methods of training and conditioning horses for long rides as well as horsemanship. One learns the best methods for caring for horses during and after long rides without the aid of artificial methods or stimulants which are prohibited. It has been proven in these rides that a horse that competes must have good conformation, good feet and legs, a straight way of going, good blood, courage and stamina that is developed through proper training and conditioning. The horse must also be well ridden by a skillful horseman or horsewoman.

This year's ride was held on August 29, 30 and 31st. The first day was rainy and wet, the second cloudy and humid and the third fair but with showers during the awards. It was a good year for the horse as the weather never really was too hot. On the first and second day of the ride one does forty miles in six and one half to seven hours. For over or under this limit there is a penalty. The third and final day is twenty miles in two and three quarters to three (Continued on Page 27)


Vermont Competitive 50 Mile Ride

A Morgan won the highest award in the Green Mountain Horse Association 50 mile competitive trail ride for Juniors not over 17 years of age. This ride is judged similarly to the 100 mile ride, and was held prior to the 100 mile ride, August 22 to 24.

The ride provides an opportunity for Juniors to enjoy and appreciate the training and conditioning of their own horse or pony for a competitive ride. It is judged on horsemanship, consideration of one's mount and courtesy on the



GROOMING THE HORSE

Proper grooming makes the horse more attractive and assists in maintaining good health and condition. All stabled horses should be groomed daily; those that are worked or exercised should be groomed both before and after work; horses on pasture should be brushed occasionally.

• Grooming equipment — The following articles will be adequate: curry comb, body brush, dandy brush, mane and tail comb, sweat scraper, hoof pick or hook, and grooming cloth.

• Grooming procedure and method — Heated animals should be (1) unsaddled (or unharnessed) expeditiously; (2) dried by applying the sweat scraper, followed by use of the grooming cloth; and (3) blanketed and walked until cool giving a couple of swallows of water every few minutes.

How to Groom

The following grooming procedure is recommended:

1. Clean out the feet — Use the hoof pick and work from heel to toe. Simultaneously, inspect for thrush and loose shoes.

2. Groom the body — Curry and brush the left side of the horse, with the curry comb held in the right hand and the brush in the left hand. Begin at the neck and work back. Use the brush below the knees and hocks only.

After grooming the left side, proceed to the right side; but transfer the brush to the right hand and the curry comb to the left hand at this time.

Curry gently, but brush vigorously. At frequent intervals, clean the dust and hair from the brush with the curry comb and strike the edge of the curry comb against your heel or the back of the brush to free it from dirt.

3. Brush the head; comb and brush the mane and tail — The body brush



had best be used in brushing the head. The mane and tail can be combed and brushed with either brush. Wash the tail with water and soap occasionally. Where a full, flowing tail is desired, separate the tail hairs with the fingers in order to retain all possible long hairs.

4. Wipe with grooming cloth — Lastly, use the grooming cloth to wipe about the ears, face, eyes, nostrils, lips, sheath, and dock; and to give a final polish to the coat.

5. Check the grooming — Check the grooming by moving the finger-tips against the natural lay of the hair; dirty fingers and gray lines on the coat give evidence that grooming has not been thorough.

6. Wash and disinfect grooming equipment — Grooming equipment should be washed with soap and water at such intervals as necessary to keep it clean, and it should be disinfected when necessary to prevent the spread of skin diseases.

Care of the Feet

A horse must be able to move correctly — hence the truism, "no feet, no horse." The important points in the care of the horse's feet are: Keep them clean, prevent them from drying out, and trim them so that they retain proper shape and length.

Each day, clean the feet of horses that are shod, stabled, or used, and inspect for loose shoes or thrush. Then give attention to the following points:

* Dry hoofs — Dry, brittle hoofs split and produce lameness. In time, the frog loses its elasticity and shrinks in size, and the heel contracts. To prevent dry hoofs, stable on clay floors and keep the ground wet around the watering tank. If the hoofs do become too dry (1) pack them in wet clay once or twice a week; or (2) wrap sack material about them and keep the burlap mois:ened and after sufficient moisture has been absorbed apply a suitable hoof dressing.

I GOOFED; MY TETANUS GOT ANTHRAX

Thanks readers and editors! Indeed. Anthrax and Tetanus are two separate and distinct diseases. In my recent column, the symptoms given were correct and applicable to Tetanus (lock-jaw) but not to Anthrax (despite the heading and the use of the word Anthrax). I prepared two separate discussions on each disease, but decided to use only one. In working and reworking the column, in some unkown manner the names got interchanged before they went out. Since I am of sober habits, let's just say I goofed. My face is red, but I'm very grateful to those readers who called my attention to the error.

Of course, horses do have Anthrax to; but cattle are more susceptible to it than equines. Anthrax was one of the first scourges to be described in ancient and Biblical literature; also, it marked the beginning of modern bacteriology, being described by Koch in 1876; and it was the first disease in which immunization was affected by means of an attenuated culture, the great Pasteur having immunized animals against Anthrax in 1881.

I'll be happy to provide a complete and accurate report on Anthrax and Tetanus in horses on request.

MISSOURI'S FLOWER - THE MULE

I'm a Missourian, and proud of it. I swell with pride when anyone associates my native state with mules; and I'll tell you why.

George Washington, our first President, was the first to produce mules of quality in this country. When the Gen-eral's views on the subject of mules became known abroad, he received some valuable breeding stock through gifts. In 1787, the Marquis de Lafayette presented him with a jack and some jennets of the Maltese breed. The jack, named Knight of Malta, was described as a superb animal, of a black color, with the form of a stag and the ferocity of a tiger. In 1795 the King of Spain gave Washington a jack and two jennets that were selected from the royal stud at Madrid. The Spanish jack, known as Royal Gift, was 16 hands high, of a gray color, heavily made and of a sluggish disposition. It was said that Washington was able to combine the best qualities of the two gift jacks especially through one of the descendants named Compound. (Those wishing to court

Morgan Horse Club Inc. Secretary's Report

It is fitting that the annual meeting of The Morgan Horse Club, Inc. should be held simultaneously with the National Morgan Horse Show and in the commonwealth in which the foundation sire was foaled.

This is the third four-day show, each of which has been larger than the previous one. To Mr. Bigelow and President Ferguson go orchids and our applause. There are 442 entries, the oldest of which is again Townshend Selectman.

At long last, immediately upon becoming President, Mr. Ferguson arranged for the filming of our promotional movie with E. K. Edwards & Son of Englewood, Colorado. Helping the President are Mr. and Mrs. James Cagney and Mr. and Mrs. James Lau. Penetrating the myriad of details, Mr. Ferguson expects the film to be ready in a few months after including pictures at this year's National Show.

A long-time need has been for a manual of Registration and show rules. Once again, the initiative of the President has brought us this booklet to fill an obvious gap.

Registrations for the past calendar year increased again to 1364 (1961 were 1135) and Transfers to 1408 (1961 were 1048), each of which sets a record.

Inquiries concerning the Breed continue to flow into the Secretary's office; each inquiry receives a copy of The Morgan Horse Magazine. Accordingly, it is important that owners of Morgans list themselves regularly therein.

The \$100 Verse Contest under the able supervision of Director Leo Beckley brought many entrants. The results should be forthcoming shortly.

Director Dean Jackson has made great headway in promoting the Morgan as a Cutting Horse of which Committee he is Chairman and capably assisted by Charlie Hamilton.

The Morgan Horse Magazine once again contains a monthly message from the President, who has travelled many miles, from which the Corporation is the happy beneficiary.

As the breed continues to grow, it is the duty of each one to maintain accurate records for the further enhancement of Morgans.

He was his own happy self the night before when we turned him out. He whinnied at the mares and had his nightly roll, and when we put him in he was OK. The next morning at 4:30 he was down. We tried to help him up but couldn't. We got the vet and he gave him shots, and we tried to put him in a sling, but he couldn't stand, so we put him down. We stayed with him till he died.

Boy, the barn is so empty. I carried him ground feed from the cow barn for over a year. He used to be right at the door rattling it and it's hard for me now not to think of taking him his meals after I feed the cows.

We buried him inside the gate under a tree. I put my pillow under his head, and my bedspread over him, and we hope to get a stone for him soon ... unquote.

Did you cry? I did.

Seems like Archie O should have been about thirty-four or thirty-five years old. The O'Neill girls were raised with him. Can you imagine having a horse that long? Even our children are not usually with us anywhere near that length of time. And, to hear that friendly nicker every morning and evening for all those years — and then to not hear it . . . Every horse lover feels with Dorothy and the rest of Archie O's family in their loss.

Expressing sympathy is not easy, and horse people with their love for horses are not understood by the non-horsey. Our doctor and his wife raise Arabians. They received a telegram this week from Indraff's owner, telling of the death of that grand old horse. The doctor's wife felt terrible for the owner, and immediately started to compose a telegram to send right back. She wrote words like "sympathy," "condolence," "sorrow," "grief," and while she was trying to find the just right wording, the most appropriate and sympathetic, she thought of what her non-horsey friends would think if they could see her right then. That didn't help her compose the just right telegram a bit.

Wow! With all those lights, that van looked like Main Street on Saturday night. It seemed to stretch for a half mile down our road.

We had the coffeepot going in no time, and we had the best visit with those truck drivers. The drivers had been very impressed with the University of Vermont, the statue of Justin Morgan, and the story of Justin Morgan that the nice lady at the University had told them. Two coffeepots worth of choice conversation woke us all up good, and then we were ready to look that van over and load Jerry.

The van had ten box stalls made of expanded metal, made so no horse could touch another horse. It was easy to see how the horses were 100% comfortable and felt right at home. There were no springs on this trailer. The horses rode on air suspension. It was just wonderful to ship a horse and know it was safe and comfortable and happy.

Of course, we had to peek at the other horses on the van. Two Quarter Horses, the lovely filly from the U. of Vermont and the handsome young stud from Voorhis Farm, were all munching happily on hay and paid no attention to us.

And of course, the drivers had to be polite and ask to see our horses. Archic was delighted to be awakened and admired at 5:00 a.m. Nothing he likes better. Lucky looked more poppy-eyed than usual at this unexpected early morning company. The pasture horses kept nudging the people walking around in the dark. They wanted some attention, too.

We finally loaded Jerry and a bale of hay on the van and kissed Jerry good-bye. Then we crossed our fingers and said a prayer that that big outfit would make it over our one lane country bridge. The bridge creaked and groaned a bit, but stood up bravely.

Mid-Atlantic Morgan Horse Show

DONNETTE OF CAMELOT 10966, became the first horse ever to win the Championship Saddle Stake twice in the eight-year history of the Mid-Atlantic Morgan Show at Frederick, Md.

"Best ever!' is the description many exhibitors gave for the 1963 renewal of the Mid-Atlantic All-Morgan Show at Frederick, Md. Boasting more horses than ever before, the eight-year-old showcase for Morgans had generally well-balanced and well-filled classes.

Placings by judge Reid Greinert of Ballston Spa, N. Y. were well received with the honors well divided among a number of contending stables. When it was all over, Camelot Farm rated as the top money winner on the basis of victories in three stakes — saddle, harness, and Mid-Atlantic. But up to the final moment it was anybodys show.

Climaxing the show, the saddle stake attracted ten good entries. After the initial work and the strip, Judge Greinert sent four top contenders back to the rail for another look. There was Donnette of Camelot, the only previous winner of this championship in the class. There was Orcland Donanna, fresh from impressive victories at the National and in the junior harness stake and owners-to-ride class here. The mare class winner, Anneigh's Little Miss owned by Blue Spruce Farm went out again. And Green Trim Farm's gelding class winner, Windcrest Top Hand completed the group. After working them both ways of the ring, Mr. Greinert tied them in the order named. Fifth went to Mike Goebig with Tas-Tee's Indian Summer and sixth was D. F. Switzler's Trophy.

A little earlier in the evening, Blue Spruce Farm's Cornwall Sealect who had previously won the novice class, topped another three year old, Waseeka's Overture owned by Three Winds Farm, and five other entries to win the junior saddle stake.

In the stake for Mid-Atlantic bred

and owned horses, Trophy's Becky Date owned by Camelot Farm, edged out her half sister, Trophleen, owned by Holtz Stables, to win.

In other classes in the saddle section, Ayelien Richards' Mystery Man took the event for the futurity alumni. Hy-Lee's Top Brass won the stallion class for Green Trim Farm.

For Mr. and Mrs. Richard Colgate, Foxy Rose Marie went from maiden to stake winner in one show with two blue ribbons in the saddle section (maiden and child's mount) two blues in the pleasure section (versatility and stake) plus carrying Phyllis Cox to first place in equitation and picking up three other ribbons.

Her eight ribbon performance was matched by William Hopkins' Manito who added up enough points in the right classes to claim the Arrowhawk Versatile Challenge Trophy for the second straight year. Along the way to the trophy he won the jumping class, took second in the stock horse stake, third in western pleasure stake, trotting race, working hunter and pairs under saddle. He was also fourth in trail and fifth in the English pleasure stake to complete his rather phenominal demonstration of Morgan versatility.

Largest class of the show was the English pleasure stake won by Foxy Rose Marie. Second in it was Three Winds Farm's Magic Sonata, winner also of the trail class. Third went to Mrs. Sandra Wooding's Orcland Linda. Orcland Gaystar was fourth for Orcland Farm. Then came Manito followed by Edie Horner's Lippitt George Moro who had previously paired with Roger Etherington's The Third Man to win the pair class. Dr. Carroll Kring's Tom Timlin topped the western pleasure stake with Magic Sonata again taking second over Manito The Third Man, Anne Bentzen's Honor Girl of Earlham, and C. D. Patton's Orcland Gayson.

Other blue ribbons in the pleasure section were well scattered. Long View Saber won the pleasure driving class for Blue Spruce Farm. Mrs. Read Urich's Suntar won the working hunter event. The pony class winner was Mildred H. Day's Miss Fortune. And Nera Bellezza Pepper won the stock horse stake for William Coddington.

The championship harness stake was small but the four entries were good ones. Camelot Farm picked up the tricolor with Trophys Becky Date who had qualified with a win in the mare and gelding event. Orcland Donanna, the junior harness stake winner, was reserve for Orcland Farm. Hylee's Top Brass came back after winning the stallion class to take third for Green Trim Farm over Dr. Frances Schaeffer's Topfield. The only harness class winner that did not appear in the stake was the champion's stable mate, Kane's Spring Delight, who had won the combination class for Camelor.

In total, the breeding divisions added up to excellent competition although some of the colt classes were small in number of entries. The coveted mare championship went to Dr. Frances Schaeffer's Miss Mar-Lo. Reserve was Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Patton's homebred Miss Sugar Loaf.

Champion stallion of the show was Mr. and Mrs. Richard Colgate's hand-

In the 4-H show open to all breeds, the Hens boys really scored, taking 1st in mares with Betsey Twilight, 1st yearling with Ransomevale Blythe and 1st foal with Tommy Hughitt.

Both Tommy and Mike also rode well in the regular classes of the Morgan Division, as did Ann Lomber, Taffy Sherwood and Dr. Taylor's horseman son from Cuba, all Junior riders.





Jim and Virginia Banta are deserving of a round of applause for this Morgan success, as it was through their efforts in the Santa Fe Show Committee that we were given so many classes.

and long toes. It is still with us to a degree, but in the wake of our discussions and Code of Ethics it appears that emphasis on training and developing natural skills to a higher degree is increasing in importance and replacing the undesirable. In line with this, Mr. Ferguson's proposal to add two \$500 classes to the National Morgan Show in which 4" toes and keg shoes are mandatory on the entries was greeted with cheers in this part of the country. If these proposed classes are added for next year, it is certain that the winners will achieve a truly "national" admira-tion and respect, for their wins will be the result of natural ability and training! - not artificialty. The obstacles in the Pleasure Classes

Another point worthy of note (and

especially gratifying) was the decreased

number of Morgans shown with weight

(the first we have had in our shows) consisted of about a 2' log jump and a tangle of logs to be crossed with caution. In addition to eliminating a few entries that had passed the previous rail work with ease, the obstacles also caused the judge to work the remainder on the rail again. The spectators followed the classes keenly, and by the time the classes were pinned, Morgans had been in the public eye long enough to attract serious viewing — this is what we have always wanted.

The Stock Horse and Reining classes were the best we have ever had. Although there has been a bit of criticism that the pattern is too complex all entrics gave a flawless performance of the pattern. This is perhaps the most encouraging part of the show, as NMMHC considers promotion of Morgans as stock horses one of the club's most important tasks! Many sideline comments from "would be hopefulls" makes the outlook for these classes in '64 look very bright indeed. And some of the comments heard among our western breed opponents on the rail didn't hurt us a bit either!





On July 13, 1963, Poco Aljoy, out of the mare Almond Joy by Red Gates, owned by the Malcolm McDuffies of Pasadena, Calif., received the Perpetual Hi-Point Trophy Award as the outstanding Pleasure Morgan for 1963. Known to his owners as "Corky," this Morgan has well earned the title mentioned above. He's a very typey "little Big" Morgan, and when I look at this horse I can picture what Justin Morgan must have looked like. A Mr. Drew Reed owned him first along with his dam, Almond Joy. Later he became the property of Mr. Orval Smith of. Arcadia, who worked and trained him and also using him as a stud. He sired four fillies and a stud colt. One of the fillies is now the property of Mr. James Velarde of San Bernardino, who placed 3rd in Mares, Foals of 1959 and over in our All Morgan Show this year in a class of 19 horses. His only colt is the property of Pat Kizer of La Puente. This colt of "Corky's" placed second to his father in the Pleasure Driving Class at the All-Morgan Show in 1962. Pat claims Quiet Son De has the temperment and disposition of his sire. Could be we'll have another Poco Aljoy in the show ring.

In 1959 he was sold to the McDuffies of Pasadena as a gelding, where his professional show career was launched. Mary McDuffie, the more enthusiastic horse lover of the two, decided Corky should go to a professional trainer for that final polish and the trainer she picked was Mr. Bill Harris of El Monte. Mr. Harris, who is a Quarter horse trainer, when asked if he would take Poco Aljoy for training, very bluntly stated, "What do I want with a Morgan?" Bill has had to eat those words ever since as he himself has admitted Poco Aljoy has brought more trophies and ribbons to his stable than any other horse he has trained. Bill probably has his own bar by now as Mary stated she promised a case of beer for every Hi-Point Trophy he received.

From the time Bill Harris took over Poco Aljoy's training, this Morgan has

placed either in the blue or up there real close. Ask The Doctor

Note: This column is added as a personal service to our readers, .Send your questions direct to Ruth Rogers, Martin Road, Akron, N. Y. They will be answered by a competent veterinarian. These doctors give their time and knowledge to help us with our Morgans.

Questions answered this month by DR. D. A. TILLOU Hamburg, N. Y.

Question: Recently in our locality two horses have died from a mysterious disease. I do not know the particulars in the one case, but in the other the animal was found dead in the pasture, the head enormously swollen and the halter broken. In both deaths the heads were badly swollen. Could you give your opinion of the cause of this.

Answer: I can't give a confident opinion without a history of the animal's previous illnesses and the opportunity to make an examination before or after death. If there is a history of infectious disease, I would suspect Purpura Hemorrhagica (Petechial Fever). And occasionally we find such swelling from strangulation.

Question: Why is it impossible to deliver a mare by Caesarian section? Also, why is a twisted intestine inoperable?

Answer: Abdominal surgery is impossible in horses except in very young foals, because of the massive abdominal weight. Incisions in the abdominal wall rupture before healing, resulting in peritonitis and death.

Question: Recently I bought a Morgan gelding that was kind of skinny through fault of the former owner. How can I fatten him up without overfeeding?

Answer: Have your veterinarian examine your horse's teeth to be sure that he is able to chew his food properly; also ask him to check a sample of the manure for evidence of worms. Exercise him moderately. Use an effective method of fly control. Give him a wellbedded comfortable stall. Be sure that he has plenty of clean, fresh water, and use good quality, high protein feed.

Question: I have a 12 year old mare in excellent condition. She just gave birth to a lovely filly. With good health, how many more years will it be safe for her to be bred and deliver a foal?

Marge and Milo Dugan of Loveland showed the Grand Champion Mare, Joanne, with Windcrest Selection taking the reserve ribbon. She is owned by Peggy Nichoald's Topside Morgan Farm and shown by Ted Willrich. Peggy also owns the Junior Champion Mare, Applevale Debutante. Gelding honors went to two Loveland Colorado people: Ray Macy's Rimrock's Mr. Rocky was champion and Independence Chief, owned by Palmer Roblyn and family went reserve. In addition to the regular breeding classes there was a breeders class added. This class required that any breeder entering must exhibit at least three horses he has bred and raised and currently owns. hours. Any entry over one half hour late on any day is disqualified. The entire ride must be ridden in seventeen hours. Most of the time one is riding either up or down those picturesque Green Mounains. There is very little level terrain.

There are three divisions in this ride. The Junior Division is for children between the ages of 12 and 17, they are not required to carry weight. The Lightweight Division is for riders who carry a minimum of 155 lbs. and less than 180 lbs. The Heavyweight Division is for riders with weight of 180 lbs. or more.

A few statistics show that there were riders from fourteen states as well as Washington, D. C. and Lima, Peru. Massachusets had the most with 18, then New York with 10, Connecticut 9, Vermont 8, Pennsylvania and New Hampshire 6 each, Maryland 5, Rhode Island 4, New Jersey and Washington, D. C. 2 each with one each from the following states: Florida, Michigan Virginia, Maine, Texas and Lima, Peru, South America.

The ride saw 25 horses entered with unknown breeding. The rest were registered animals and they were as fol-lows: 14 Arabians, 12 Halfbreds, 9 Morgans, 7 Thoroughbreds, 5 Quarter Horses, 2 Standardbreds, 2 Hungarian bred and 1 Saddlebred.

Of the seventy-seven entries, sixtynine were judged and started. On Saturday there were fifty-four horses that received certificates for completing the 100 miles within the given time.

Of the nine Morgans entered in the ride, one Morgan did not start and one dropped out the second day. This made seven Morgans finishing and three placed. This was a better showing of Morgans than there has been for many years. The Morgans as a whole, were a better looking group than has been seen for some time. The highest placing registered Morgan was Donna Juanita, a real pretty mare. Mrs. Lucille Kenyon showed her usual good horsemanship in bringing this mare in so well. Incidentally Mrs. Kenyon also won the Senior Sportsmanship Award for women. This is for the woman displaying the highest degree of sportsmanship during the ride. The Soneldon Memorial Trophy was also awarded to Mrs. Kenyon. This is given each year

Mid-Atlantic News

The biggest item of current news, of course, would be the results of the Mid-Atlantic Show. The largest we have had to date, this show is covered in a separate article elsewhere in the magazine.

However, let's not pass from the subject without mentioning the Board's decision to move the location of the Mid-Atlantic Show for next year. The new site will be the Quentin Riding Club, Quentin, Pa. Everyone familiar with the facilities there agrees that the beautiful grounds and excellent show ring will provide a top-notch setting for the Mid-Atlantic Show.

The decision to leave Frederick, Md., was not easy to make. We have enjoyed our visits there and our relationships with the Frederick Jaycees (and earlier with the Rotary Club). But it has been generally agreed that a move should be made. In addition to the improved ring Quentin is more conveniently located for more potential exhibitors. It is about four miles off the Pennsylvania Turnpike near Lebanon, Pa., and only eleven miles off U. S. Route 22. It will be considerably more accessible for exhibitors from the north, east, and west; not much farther in driving time for those who come from the south.

Mike Brittain will continue in his capacity as show manager. Pending A.H.S.A. approval, plans call for holding the show Saturday and Sunday next year, August 15-16. A committee consisting of Al Lucine, Bill Hopkins, and Dayton Sumner has been appointed to review and revise the classes and schedule for the whole show.

A number of club members got a preview of what it will be like to show there next year when they competed in the Morgan division at the Quentin show over the Labor Day weekend. Donnette of Camelot followed her stake victory at Frederick taking the over 15hand class and championship at Quentin. Reserve went to Bay State Gallant, the under 15 hand winner.

News sometimes travels slowly. We didn't get word of one of the new Morgan owners in the area until six months after they bought their first Morgan. But we hasten now to welcome Mr, and Mrs. Lou Harrigfeld and Waseeka's Donnybrook. They live near Tom's River, N. J., and their Morgan is a bay two year old gelding by Windcrest Donfield x Corrinne.

Not far from there is another newly acquired bay two year old. Miss Susie Kilfoile has purchased Wilderness Nighthawk from Helene Zimmerman. This nice young stud is a son of the late Towne Ayr Bobolink and Wilderness Blaze.

Ayelien Richards reports the sale of Ben Casey of Edhobe to William Krewson of Philadelphia. Casey is a big, handsome three year old gelding chestnut with light mane and tail and is about ready for a show ring appearance.

Only eight years old, Major had started to make an enviable name for himself at stud and was a particular delight to his owner as a pleasure horse. As of September first, competition was very close for most of Mid-Atlantic point award categories. At that point the results of a single class would have been enough to change the lead in all but two divisions.

Highest scoring horse of all on September first was Sandra Wooding's Orcland Linda followed closely by Roger Etherington's The Third Man, Mr. and Mrs. Richard Colgate's Foxy Rose Marie, Three Winds Farm's Dennisfield, and Bill Hopkins' Manito.

In the scoring for the saddle award Dennisfield held a commanding but not unassailable lead over Waseeka's Buccaneer. Tas-Tee's Indian Summer Cornwall Sealect and Donnette of Camelot. Leading for the harness award was Trophy's Beckie Date with Topfield and Kanes Spring Delight close behind.

One of the hottest races was for the pleasure championship. The lead has changed hands after every show so far this year. September found Foxy Rose Marie holding a four point advantage over Orcland Linda. The Third Man

Morgan Horse Club Inc. **Treasurer's Report**

Even though the Corporation's net income for the calendar-fiscal year ending December 31, 1962 was just above \$5,000 more than the previous year, nonetheless, The Morgan Horse Magazine continues as a deficit in the amount of \$538.13.

Income from Registrations and Transfers increased by \$11,062.50, due in part to the Registrations of animals over two years old. Membership dues increased by \$1,022.18.

Once again the expenses of operating the Secretary's office were confined to \$21,456.26, an increase of \$1,135.44. Extra part-time help in early 1963 prefaces additional costs for the coming year to keep pace with increased volume.

Travelling expenses amounted to \$754.71, none of which accrued subsequent to August 1, 1962 and none of which was paid to the Secretary.

Advertising and trophy awards continue the promotion of the Breed to the extent of \$3,983.34.

The very bright spot is the National Morgan Horse Show for 1962, which netted \$7,450.98 due to the diligence of Mr. Bigelow and Mr. Ferguson.

The firm of Nathaniel F. Bigelow, Jr. & Co. has examined the accounts for the year ending December 31, 1962 and their report is on file giving the comparative year's tabulation.

with me. Our Morgan wears regular shoes and short feet. We showed him a few times this summer, and were astounded at the Morgans being shown with weighted shoes and long feet, which horses most of the judges seemed to favor. It really made competition unfair, especially to the Morgan being shown 100% naturally.

I have written a letter to President Ferguson concerning this matter, and have made several suggestions to help remedy this situation:

1. Add to "Excessive length of foot and excessive weight shall be pen-alized." Maximums: 4" toe length and 12 oz. shoes.

and/or

1. Add the two classes suggested by President Ferguson to the National one in harness and one under saddle with 4" toe and regular shoes.

2. Divide the pleasure, road hack, and trail horse classes - one for the horse with the short foot and regular (Continued on Page 62)

Also I would like to know how many more years I will be able to ride her. Is it safe to ride when the horse is more than 20 years old?

Answer: Both of these questions depend somewhat on the individual. Assuming that your mare remains sound, she may safely be ridden without respect to age if her physical condition is satisfactory. Her physical condition may also, govern her productive life as a broodmare. In later years you can expect more complications to follow pregnancy. Often mares are bred commercially longer and later than those kept as family pets.

Virtues of the Mule

So much for the historical! Now to the virtues of the mule.

In comparison with the horse, the mule can -

* withstand higher temperatures; thats the reason his stronghold has long been in the deep south.

 endure less experienced labor. I well recall how these creatures taught my brothers and me how to farm; how my brother (age 10) and I (age 9) plowed corn. One handled the shovels, while the other sat on a bag of straw atop the cultivator and drove old Dock and Kate - a span of Missouri mules; a routine interrupted only by an occasional brotherly clod fight.

* Better adapt his eating habits to either irregularity or self-feeding with little danger of founder or digestive disturbances. Although a mule is better satisfied if fed by the clock, he's rather patient and understanding of the frailities of some caretakers. If the grain bin door is left open, he'll exercise better discretion than most folks do when seated at the table on festive occasions. He seems to reason that if he doesn't make a pig of himself he may be able to return at a later time.

* work or stable in lower areas without head injury. The mule lowers his head when his ears - his antennas touch an object, whereas a horse will throw his head upward under similar circumstances, often resulting in a severe bruise and poll evil. It is for this reason that mules were preferred to horses for work in the mines prior to

the days of mechanization.

* encounter less foot trouble, wire cuts etc. If given a choice, a mule will walk around a mud puddle, rather than through it. If caught in a wire fence, he is prone to think his way out or wait patiently for help, rather than mangle himself.

* avoid strain in pulling. When drawing a heavy load, a horse will crouch in the rear quarters — and he may even strain and injure himself; whereas a mule will pull from more of a standingup position.

* generally maneuver about without harm to himself. If a horse gets excited and runs away, he is apt to injure himself; but a mule will even take a vehicle through an open door or gate without a scratch.

* be without pride of ancestry or hope of posterity. He is a hybrid, being a cross between two species of the family Equida — the caballus or horse and the asinus or ass; and, like most hybrids, the mule is seldom fertile.

Yes, I know that the Hawthorn is Missouri's flower, but I here and now nominate the mule for this high honor; he's more symbolic — everyone associates Missouri with mules.

would provide a special place for devotees of both styles to show us what they're doing with their prides and joys. It would be a good place for those new cutting horse people to trot out their wares, as well as distinguishing the "established" Morgan fields.

Another way would be to set aside part of the pictorial section for *action* shots of Morgans practicing their various trades. I specify action shots, because I think that one good action photo is better than a posed one accompanied by ten thousand words.

This emphasis on versatility might not only help the breed by attracting new owners and encouraging "old" ones, but it might also attract new advertising. Advertisers who cater to a certain branch of the horse industry would be more inclined to advertise if they see their area given special treatment in the magazine.

I realize of course, that these suggestions can't be carried out unless owners and breeders co-operate by supporting them, but judging by the response Morgan people have made in the past months with ads, etc., I feel that, if you feel the suggestions are practical, it could be done.

Dear Sir:

I would like to thank Mr. Ferguson for his fine article in the August issue of the Magazine. Mr. Ferguson made mention of the fact that most of the entries at the National Show were from folks who owned one or two Morgans —proving the Morgan is still the family horse capable of meeting the sports needs of their owners, be it for the showing or pleasure riding so many are able to enjoy both and this is certainly one of the breed's best forms of advertisement.

I do have a question concerning Mr. Ferguson's proposal of a "Special Class" at the National Show — for a Morgan with a four inch hoof. What of the many other "Morgan Shows and Classes" held in the United States?

The "National Show" is recognized by the American Horse Shows Association and in accepting recognition agrees to abide by the rules and be governed by them in all instances. It is my understanding that the A.H.S.A. sets the rules of procedure for the programming and directing of its recognized shows and the breed division rules, which in this case, would be those submitted by the rules committee of the Morgan Horse Club, Inc., are enforced by official representatives (Judges and Stewards) of the A.H.S.A. at recognized shows.

Rule 23, Morgan Horse Division, Part 3, Performance Classes, Section 3 —Gaits, states "excessive length of foot and excessive weight shall be penalized." It would seem that more benefit would be derived if the Rules Committee would define and clarify what they intended the word excessively to mean and if once clarified — would be included in Rule 23 — Part 2, In Hand Classes.

Length over 4 or $4\frac{1}{2}$ inches is unnatural and should in my opinion be termed excessive to our breed. Hoof length doesn't make a good Morgan but excessive length can break one down, long before its time.

Dear President Ferguson:

I should like to commend you for your critical comments in the September issue of the Magazine, especially those concerning the use of artificial aids for poor feet. Whereas I think that a performance horse should move stylishly with high natural action and should be given all reasonable advantages to do so, sound feet are essential. In general, there is a somewhat ill-defined but clear and definite distinction between reasonable aids for natural performance and quite artificial means and practices for a false appearance. I think that this distinction should be more definitely defined perhaps and that, for the sake of the great majority of sincere exhibitors, the rules should be customarily recognized and where necessary enforced.

In this connection, I should like to make a formal request that the rule be changed to permit the optional use of a combination bridle in all harness classes.

My basic reason is that the typical Morgan has a type of neck and natural head carriage for which this sort of bridle is much more suited than the high overdraw check. Consequently, many Morgans move much more stylishly and naturally in a combination bridle. There is a definitive distinction here between the Morgan and the Saddlebred, and I see no justification for aping the Saddlebred custom to the disadvantage of the Morgan.

Further, the combination bridle is much more showy on a Morgan and it complements a fine harness in such a way as to make much the same difference at that between merely a smart business suit and a tuxedo or evening dress. And, since the National is a show of horses, I think that the owners should be privileged to present them to their best advantage. The recent pair class, by the contrast in appearance between those in combination and those in ordinary bridles, is sufficient evidence for my point.

Admittedly, the combination bridle costs considerably more than an ordinary one and, hence, the optional factor

in my request for those who do not wish to pay the additional price. But, showing horses is at best expensive, and this increased cost, is not really a relevant consideration. It remains that a horse show is a show, and I fail to see any valid reason for refusing those who wish to use a combination bridle the right to do so.

In general again, the "little ole buggy horse" concept is fine for those who like it, but it is sheer confusion to mix this sentiment with Saddlebred rules for the distinctively stylish performance Morgan. Hence, I favor regulations to preserve and promote the natural abilities of the Morgan as a distinctively fine and flashy show horse in his own right, regardless of other considerations. I trust that this request of mine for a change in the rule regarding combination bridles meets with your approval and that you will give it both your careful consideration and your serious support.

FUNQUEST FARMS: The pictures below of stallions from our stud illustrate rather well the extremes of type and conformation found among Morgans today. The one on the left expresses very strongly the characteristics of what is most generally considered to be the old type Morgan. The one on the right illustrates the type of Morgans selected by the first breeders of American Saddle Horses for blending with thoroughbred blood to develop the American Saddle Horse.

If the illustrations contained in the several volumes of the Morgan Horse Registry are typical of their respective periods, one can safely conclude that much of the same range of variations in type and conformation has existed from the time Justin Morgan himself. It therefore profits us little to argue which type is the more authentic original. Greater gain will be realized by analyzing present day uses of Morgans to determine the respective requirements of conformation and by producing Morgans of the type and conformation best suited to these purposes. Horses of this type can be produced from other than Morgan breeding but no other breed has been endowed with such admirable characteristics of temperament and constitution as the Morgan horse for present day uses.

All of the desired Morgan characteristic are included within the parameters of type and conformation of these stallions. If the Morgan breed has a problem today it is that of obtaining a better focus on breed type and standards of conformation for the benefit of judges and breeders. Our breeding program is directed toward preserving the distinctive Morgan appearance (type) and maintaining latitude in conformation adequate to satisfy all anticipated uses.


