

Horse Science Course Invaluable

Dear Sir:

As the only Canadian among fiftytwo enrollees and as the enrollee who had probably paid more (because of distance) to take this course than any other, the opinions which follow may be of interest to owners of pleasure horses.


As is generally known, the most eastern course was held at Wisconsin State University in River Falls, Wisconsin, from July 20 to July 30. Certainly, the facilities were adequate, the university people both helpful and friendly, and the staff outstanding for the work they had undertaken to do. Without a doubt, the cost of the trip and the course was small in relation to the value received. It was a commendable achievement to crowd so much practical instruction into such a brief span of time. Any amateur horse owner, and many professionals too, would find the time and money well spent indeed.

The difficulties in providing such a course must be formidable, and this is why this letter is being written. As all horse breeders know, their strength derives from knowledge, and knowledge is best acquired through contacts with knowledgeable people. Certainly, Dr. Ensminger, Dr. G. Harsch, Professor Robert W. Miller, Mr. Donald Canfield, farrier, and Mrs. Fern Palmer Bittner, are knowledgeable in their respective fields. Certainly, these people were outstanding in their ability and willingness to communicate this knowledge to those who were in their classes.

The overriding thought throughout the ten-day course was "Why couldn't more of us (pleasure horse owners) be exposed to such people more often?"

At this writing, it is not known where the Horse Science Course will be held next year. Naturally, an easterner hopes that there will be one course held farther east. But regardless of where it is held, this enrollee in the 1964 course cannot too strongly recommend owners and prospective owners of pleasure horses to watch for the dates, enroll early and be there when the classes start, to stay for the whole tenday course.

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## Vermont's 100 Mile Erail Ride

### Morgan Wins Junior Division; Morgan Places Third in Heavyweight Division

The 29th Annual 100 Mile Trail Ride sponsored by the Green Mountain Horse Association of South Woodstock, Vermont was held on September 3, 4 and 5. Judges were Dr. I. Malcolm Baker of Montreal, Quebec, Dr. Olive K. Britt of Manakin-Sabot, Virginia and Dr. Cornelius Thibeault of Ipswich, Mass. Recorders were Rod Leavitt of Manchester, N. H., Nancy Ela of Bolton, Mass., and Mrs. Bernard Stearns of Hopkinton, N. H. Chief Timers were Mr. and Mrs. Charles McCue of East Douglas, Mass. Official weigher was Judge Kenneth A. Robinson of Windsor, Vt. Here are the statistics of the ride: There were 65 horses entered. Sixty horses started and forty-three finished. Six horses dropped out the first day, six on the second day, and five others failed to start on the third day. Of the 7 registered Morgans that started, 6 finished. It is interesting to note the dropouts by divisions: In the Heavy-weight division 21 started and 13 finished, in the Lightweight division 20 started and 16 finished and in the Junior division 19 started and 14 finished.

The ride was won this year by a 11 year old mare of unknown breeding, ridden by Mrs. W. E. Mackay-Smith of

Coatesville, Penn. This mare had placed 2nd this year in the California Tevis Cup 100 mile ride in one day. She completed that 100 miles in just over 22 hours.

Ira Gordon of Hunter, New York gave his Morgan Timber Trails, a good ride to place third in the Heavyweight division. Incidentally Ira had placed 2nd in the New Jersey 100 mile ride earlier in the season. This is a strong going gelding and if he keeps going the way he is, we will see him right at the top another year.

Sam Davis of Concord, N. H. gave Waseeka's Trademark an excellent

ride. This is another strong-going horse that was well ridden. This horse won the trail horse award and he sure deserved it.

Another pretty rider who really sits a horse well came down from Canada this year. This was Mrs. Darrel Beacon. She won the Rookie of the Year award.

There were three new riders this year, Phoebe Sheldon, Leslie Dalrymple and Pamela Brassard. All gave their horses good rides with Pamela topping a strong Junior division. Leslie won the Junior Rookie of the Year award. Congratulations to all of them for a job well done.



### Results of the Western National

"The Long, Hot Summer" is about the best description of the conditions out here this summer unless of course you are fortunate enough to escape into the mountains for relief. A large gathering of Morgan enthusiasts did just this at the recent Western National Morgan Horse Show held in Estes Park, Colorado, July 12-14th. There were 10 states represented from Montana to Texas. The classes were well filled and hotly contested. The in-hand classes saw a real increase in number and quality which is indicative of the ever increasing Morgan population in this area. When the dust settled and the judge had made his decision - and a difficult one it was - Grand Champion Stallion honors went to Funquest Falcon owned by Stuart Hazard and shown by Dean Smith. Reserve honors went to Orcland Bold Victory owned by the Christianson Brothers of Salt Lake City, Utah. Grand Champion Mare honors went to Milstone's Pat-A-Chou also owned by the Christiansens and Reserve Champion was Windcrest Selection from Peggy Nichoald's Topside Farm. Cean Butler took Grand Champion Gelding honors with Hot Spur with Reserve going to Beau Jet Jarnette owned by Jane Molloy of Fort Collins. Dean Jackson showed both the Junior Champion and Reserve Mares in Mortana Lettafield and Mortana Baleata. Junior Champion Stallion honors went to Big Rock owned by the Christiansens and Reserve went to Funquest Barbacon belonging to Stuart Hazard. The Breeders class which was originated at this show and specifies that three or more Morgans of any sex and raised by the exhibitor was won by Stuart Hazard. Dean Jackson showed the second place entry and Mosher Brothers had the third place entry. This is a very interesting class in that it presents to the public the type of horse that each breeder is striving to raise. All in all these classes were very interesting and full of first quality Morgans.

The performance classes as usual were varied and for the most part well filled. It was very encouraging and fun to see exhibitors branching out to show the versatility of their horses. Two individuals come immediately to mind: Dr. Andrews of New Mexico showed his good roadster and pleasure driving mare Mystic Melody in the versatility class where she showed real promise as a jumper. Charlie "Talley-Ho" Hamilton was very much in evidence in the dressage class on his cutting horse Ranch Hand. Charlie can be real proud of that second place ribbon and is already working to achieve the blue for next year. Bob Mares came all the way from Texas with his good mare Indian Ann and did a fine job in the trail, western pleasure and working stock horse classes. He also entered the trailer race having no idea what it was all about as he had never seen one. It was a tight race and he came in a real close second. I hate to think what he could do with a little practice. I'll bet we'll find out next year. The cutting classes saw a lot of good new potential being developed. It looks as if a Morgan will reach the top twenty of the NCHA standings in the very near future. Among the most exciting classes in the show were the harness and running races. Trotting honors went to Mystic Melody followed closely by Gallant King, Conargo and Jubilee's Pastime. The saddle race was won by Reed's Miss Cotton followed by Marsha, Echo's Billy D and Mystic Melody.

The Triangle A Versatility Challenge Trophy which must be won by the same rider on three different horses for permanent possession was captured by Dean Jackson on his good horse Senatefield. Points toward this are gained in the working Western and working English classes. At least 25% of the points must be gained in either English or Western classes and the rest in the other division. This is an interesting challenge and encourages individuals to develope more than one

versatile horse. It is also great fun to watch horses and riders turn into quick change artists when they compete in a variety of classes. Dean, ably assisted by Betty Jackson, is a past master at this.

In summary, the Western National Morgan Show was a great success. Harry Harness did a fine job of judging and the Bantas need a real big pat on the back for a wonderful job in managing the show. Every year this is a bigger and better show and we are always glad to welcome new faces along with the old. I hope we see even more next year.

The week after the Western National saw two Morgan classes included in the Littleton Lions Club — Willowbrook Horse Show. The English Pleasure was won by Skiparee Indian Joe of Topside Morgans with Western Pleasure honors going to Echo's Surprise owned by Mrs. Jack Harrington. Prince of Pride owned by Mary Woolverton gained enough points in Morgan and open competition to win the overall high point Palomino Trophy.

More show results are still coming in and may be found at the end of the article. As this newsletter goes in, the Colorado State Fair is ending. The Morgan division saw Montey Vermont owned by the Slash Bar K ranch of Wickenberg, Arizona take Grand Champion Stallion honors. Windcrest Selection of Topside Morgans topped the mare division. Champion per-formance (high point) horse was Mary Woolverton's Prince of Pride. Prince then went on to win the high point trophy for the entire All American Horse Show of the Colorado State Fair. Points were gained in the Morgan and open division and at the end of seven days of showing Prince was on top of some 700 horses of all breeds. This was a real honor for a Morgan. Complete results of the Morgan division will be available for the next article.

## Mid-Atlantic All Morgan Show

### Ninth Annual Show Bigger and Better Than Ever

More horses than ever before . . . more individual exhibitors . . . more classes . . . more prize money . . . more spectators . . . and for most people more fun and excitement. There was more of just about everything in the Ninth Annual Mid-Atlantic Morgan Show.

Held this year at a new location in Quentin, Pa., the show drew rave comments from horse owners on the superlative facilities of the Quentin Riding Club. Convenience to the Pennsylvania Turnpike and U. S. Rt. 22 helped draw entries from 11 states and idyllic weather during the show helped make their stay most enjoyable.

It was a show that moved quickly, thanks largely to the highly professional work of the ring staff: judges John Lydon, John Kays, and Al Brouillet; announcer Ken Wohrle; ringmaster Pres. Howard; Steward George Beatty; In-Gate superintendent Edward Brown; and show manager Mike Brittain. Thanks are due also to the cooperation of the exhibitors who had their horses ready promptly in spite of the tight scheduling that is necessary in any onebreed show held in two days.

One of the busiest and most successful exhibitors was Dr. Robert Orcutt of Rowley, Mass. Ably assisted by Miss Pat Tataronis, he presented nine entries for five owners and took home four championships, one reserve, and eight blues, among other placings.

Two of those blues and one of those championships were won in the inaugural presentation of the Nationwide Futurity for three-year-old fillies. Show-

ing Tamarack Capella from Mr. and Mrs. John W. Mann of South Hamilton, Mass., Dr. Orcutt first won the harness section, then the in-hand section of this major new event. The mare dropped to third place in the saddle section of the futurity but added up enough points in total to emerge as champion.

Reserve honors in the rich futurity went to D. F. Switzler's Trophy's Emerald, shown by Bill Holtz. This striking mare topped the saddle section of the Futurity and also won both the Junior Harness Stake and the Junior

Miss Helen Sofer's Windcrest Showgirl was a double champion under Dr. Orcutt's guidance. She was judged champion mare in hand and topped the show closing Championship Saddle Stake to win a leg on the Donnette of fying for these honors she won the class for senior mares in hand, mares under saddle and mares and geldings in har-

After the initial workout and strip in the saddle stake, Judge Lydon kept Showgirl and Mr. and Mrs. Darwin Morse's Gay Cavalier on the grass and sent the rest of the class back for a second workout. After tying Showgirl and Gay Cavalier on top, he picked Orcland Farm's Orcland Donanna for third. Voorhis Farm's Ledgewood Pecora fourth, Camelot Farms' Trophy's Award fifth, and William Lutz's Oldwick Crusader sixth.

Reserve to Showgirl in the mare championship was Orcland Farm's Orcland Darling while her full sister Orc-

## **Annual Report**

### of the Secretary and Treasurer of the Morgan Horse Club, Inc.

#### TREASURER'S REPORT

The Club is in very good financial condition. Each member has received in the mail a copy of the 1963 Balance Sheet. We are only recently in this healthy financial condition, the years when the Club was dependent on "welfare" are within the memory of many members here today. Rather than recite the figures you have received, let me give a summary.

Registration fees increased in 1963 by \$665 and Transfer fees by \$1,252 indicating a favorable condition in the Morgan market and showing the Club's expenditure on promotion is keeping the demand ahead of the supply. The expenditure for Trophy awards and promotional advertising, exclusive of the funds spent for the Justin Morgan Film, were increased by approximately \$1,000. Memberships in 1963 increased by \$1,150.

The magazine made a small profit of \$715.41 in 1963 against a loss of \$538.13 the previous year. A very noteworthy accomplishment considering deficits as high as \$7,500 have occurred in the past.

Over \$3,000 was raised by public subscription to get the Justin Morgan Film started. The balance of the money needed to produce the film was appropriated by the Board of Directors and the Club now has an excellent promotional film. New promotional services for the members have included the distribution of The Morgan Horse Showing and Registration Requirement booklet and the Breeding Record booklet.

The firm of Nathaniel F. Bigelow, Jr. and Company, Certified Public Accountants, has examined the accounts for the year ending December 31, 1963.

#### SECRETARY'S REPORT

The year 1963 showed a continued healthy growth of The Morgan Horse Club, Inc. Registrations numbered 1,411 showing a 4% increase and transfers numbered 1,544 showing a 44% increase over the previous year. You will all recognize that transfers exceeding registrations shows an active market for Morgans. It will interest you to know that registrations numbered

just 630 and transfers numbered just 910, five years ago and ten years ago registrations numbered only 393 and transfers only 518. You will also be interested to know that the next volume Vol. IX, of the American Morgan Horse Register is currently being prepared.

This year, 1963-4, meetings of the Board of Directors were held in various areas of the country, the West, the Mid-West and New England. Because of this geographical spread, more Directors were able to attend more meetings. At the meeting in Denver, the Board of Directors established a Committee for Promotion of the Morgan. The ground work is now being laid for more extensive promotional work.

for more extensive promotional work. The Morgan Horse Magazine is showing increased activity. We are still indeed grateful to Mr. Whitney Stone that we have the magazine today after sustaining heavy losses for so many years. We all know the magazine is thicker than just a few years ago! (Ten years ago a year's subscription weighed 3 pounds, the first six issues of 1964 weigh 3 pounds!) This year for the first time there was a mare and foal issue; a gelding issue is forthcoming in addition to the regular special issues of the National Show and the stallion issue.

The Justin Morgan Film is a tremendous success. Many of you will recall this was started by public subscription; the Club is now the beneficiary of this initial start and four films are in circulation throughout the country under the auspices of the Club, distributed in the Pacific Northwest by Mr. Beckley, in California by Dr. Boyd, in Michigan and the Mid-West by Mr. Kane and in the East by the Secretary's office. A fifth film has been given by the Club to the American Horse Shows Association to be circulated free of charge by them. The American Horse Shows Association reports a deluge of requests. Demand far exceeds supply and other Morgan organizations as well as schools and colleges have purchased copies of the film at cost from the Club. This is indeed a bright star in the publicity program.

With the necessity of a Pitney-Bowes metered mailing machine in the office, the Club has been able to put this to use in its promotional activity by having the automatic postmark show the image of Justin Morgan and the slogan "Pride and Product of America." This stamp, the art work for which was donated to the Club, is used on the mail from the office.


In 1963 the first Morgan Horse Showing and Registration Requirements booklet was distributed to members. It met with such popularity, the Directors authorized the booklet to be brought up to date and its coverage enlarged and again distributed to members in 1964. Also, this year saw the first printing of the Breeding Record Book. A service of your Club particularly appreciated by the many small breeders and one-mare-owners but expressions of appreciation from the larger breeders as well indicate it has been popular with and helpful to a majority of the members. These are two new services the Club has been able to give to the members.

Your Secretary's office continues to receive an abundance of mail inquiring about Morgans. Many of these requests are from prospective buyers. All requests are answered by sending out informational literature and a copy of The Morgan Horse Magazine. We also specifically call the inquirer's attention to the Breeders and Owners Directory which appears each month in the magazine.

We are meeting together on the eve of what will be the biggest National Morgan Horse Show. The Board of Directors has this year increased each stake class by \$100 and has included again, after 3 years, a Gelding Stake class. We hope you have already located the Exhibitors' Hospitality Booth on the Show Grounds. We welcome particularly those who are attending their first National and those who have traveled many miles to be with us.

You're asking . . .

Here are several pertinent and timely questions that I have received from different sections of the United States, along with my answers:

Question: Why the recent boom and interest in horses? (From a magazine editor in Texas).

Answer: Here is my thinking -

- 1. Horses have become a status symbol. In the middle ages, the rich man rode a horse and the poor man walked. When I was a boy, the rich man rode in a horseless carriage and the poor man had a horse. Today, the rich man has a horse and the poor man has a car.
- There are more and more race tracks, and these have stimulated horse production.
- More leisure time and more emphasis on physical fitness and the outdoors have accentuated interest in horses.
- 4. More parents and others are coming to recognize that horses are wonderful companions for boys and girls; they shower their love and affection on horses, the animals occupy their time, and they don't get into trouble.
- 5. Many older folks associate horses with hot, dirty work I'm referring to draft horses and mules, of course. However, in the thinking of the younger generation, horses are fun. Today's youngsters never followed a "foot burner" (walking plow) and few of them would know how to harness a draft horse.

Question: Among my Shetland Ponies, of which I am a breeder, I am plagued by a stifled condition. What can you tell me about it? (From the State of Washington).

Answer: The stifle joint in the horse corresponds to the knee in a man. A horse is said to be stifled when the patella (or kneecap) slips out of place and temporarily locks in a location above and to the inside of its normal location. Technically this condition is known as dorsal patellar fixation. Sometimes it is possible to place the patella back in normal position manually. However, the most effective treatment is surgery, known as medial patellar desmotomy, which consists of the removal of one of the ligaments which attach to the patella.

Question: In a recent column, you stated that fescue pasture will not cause mares to abort. Sir, I beg to disagree. I find that a steady diet of fescue — fescue pasture in season, and fescue hay in winter — will produce poor results. I have experienced both abortions and weak foals at birth. (From Kentucky).

Answer: I'm not surprised. No matter how good any one feed ingredient may be, if not balanced out poor results are inevitable.

Question: What causes laminitis (founder) (From New York).

Answer: It is caused by over-eating, over-drinking, inflammation of the uterus following parturition, or inflammation of the intestines. It is seen most aften in overfed and under-worked ponies which are confined and in mares after foaling.

Question: My pasture is short, so I want to self-feed a salt-protein block to my horses. My local feed dealer has such a product. But please tell me how to start my horses on this type of feeding program. (From Florida).

Answer: When starting horses on salt-feed blocks, limit intake and avoid too sudden feed change by (1) giving at first, a fill of hay or pasture, and/or (2) limiting the time of access to the blocks. After horses have become accustomed to such blocks, feed them free choice, along with all the hay and pasture they want, and provide access to plenty of water.

Question: How many 4-H horse club projects were there, nationally in 1963? (From Wisconsin).

Answer: There were 96,794. Think of it — nearly a hundred thousand.

## Training the Family Pleasure Horse

CHAPTER SIX

### Showing In Hand

In addition to the simple exercises designed to accustom him to the uses of the whip, your colt has much to learn during his first winter. Some of it is pure nicety, working harder on voiced commands, handling him each day—little things that will swell your pride in him before your horseman friends and make him a pleasure for your veterinarian and blacksmith to work around. The rest, and the more in need of your most painstaking efforts, is aimed toward his immediate future and your showing him in hand next summer as a yearling.

For there is a certain responsibility in the ownership of a purebred colt. When you own a stallion or a mare, then you owe it to the breed it represents to choose its mates carefully. Even if yours is a colt you plan to geld, then there is still an obligation. Not only should you feed him and groom him so he always looks his best to the casual visitor, but all your handling and training should be aimed toward making him a walking advertisement for the good his breed has to offer. Even if you have no intention whatsoever of showing him in any horse show - anywhere - then you still must teach him

to show well in hand if only on your own front lawn. Your pride in his conformation; his lovely head and his trappy way of going, should be great enough for you to want to show it off nicely - once again - if only to your visitors. This country of ours has been thoroughly mechanized for half a century, yet there still exists the old-time horseman. Be he retired postman, bus driver or coal miner, he still derives a nostalgic pleasure from the sight of a good colt, nicely mannered, wellgroomed and moving smartly on a line. He may not be a Robert Frost as he tries to express the poetry of a young horse in motion, but his "Oh Man, don't that colt move GOOD!" is just as heart-felt. And his words should warm your heart and make wholly worthwhile the hours you spent teaching that colt to move just that way.

And there can be other, more concrete rewards. If you live in New England, hardly a summer weekend will pass by without there being a horse show carding an open colt class within comfortable trailering distance. Many of these are divided into three age divisions, giving you what is actually an open yearling class. To be sure, all

other breeds are eligible for it as well as your Morgan but if your original judgement of his quality and conformation was sound, and this winter's work well-done, then you should have an excellent chance of a top ribbon to hang up over his stall.


And once again, not all of a horse show's value to you lies in the ribbon you will take home. Of far greater importance to your colt's future is the experience even a small, one-day show will provide. Few owners realize how very cloistered an existence the handraised colt leads. Except for his dam and such other mares and foals as he was pastured with, he simply has no idea that horses - in dozens and twenties and hundreds - even exist. If you doubt this, then watch a green, hand-raised yearling at his first show. His eyes are as big as saucers. He's walking - or bouncing - a foot off the ground with every stride and whereas he knows his handler exists - somewhere out there on the end of the lead it is only with the very smallest corner of his mind that he does. The rest of him is drunk on all the sights and sounds and smells, and if he manages to sober up long enough for his class, than it's no small tribute to his training. He will be better at his second show, and pretty much of an old hand by his third, but the experience gained in three such shows will be worth twice as much by another year. Always remember that a colt learns quickest and easiest when he is youngest. By the time he is a two year old, he will not weigh much under a


Below, how NOT to lead a young horse. It is both sloppy and

thousand pounds, and where as an excited horse-show-drunk yearling is an exasperating possession, he is still easily manageable, something an equally excited and green two year old might not be. Here once again is one of the great advantages you, as a one colt owner-trainer, have over the farms where young horses are mass produced,

for you can afford better than they the added time that can make yours the better mannered colt to show now and later on to school in more advanced ways.

Showing a young horse in hand is not at all difficult. Indeed, you have started him well already with your daily leading to and from his pasture and your work with the light training whip. Such advancement as this new step requires will come easily to him. You should, by now, be leading him nicely in hand. Don't be sloppy about it. True, a good-tempered colt will usually happily tag along after you — somewhere out on the end of the lead shank.

### Are You Ready to Register Your Foal

Many are now getting ready to register their 1964 foals. As the foals lose their baby coat, the permanent markings become known and soon you will want to send your Application for Registration forms to the Secretary. Dark may now be showing through the light baby hairs on many a leg; in fact many a Morgan foal may look as if the moths have had a banquet!

Remember the yellow booklet, The Morgan Horse Showing and Registration Requirements, all members received from the Club in the early Spring? Pages 12 and 13 will help refresh your memory on the details for completing the Application for Registration form; also, the article, "So It's Time to Register Your Foal." November '63' issue of this magazine. How to recognize the sometimes confusing colors, chestnut, bay, brown or black, is delineated - other colors such as palomino, chestnut with light mane and tail, are more obvious. If you wish another booklet, write to the Secretary's office.

With the increasing number of Morgans being registered, a 4% increase in 1963, the careful attention to details and instructions is becoming of greater importance from the standpoint of both accuracy of identification of the individual Morgan and the time required to process the applications.

Write to the Secretary's office for the Application for Registration forms. Remember - Applications for Registration for 1964 foals must be postmarked on or before December 31, 1964 or bear the higher fee (the schedule of fees is in the yellow booklet, the article referred to previously and on the application form).



We have been busy at Blue Spruce

as usual. I tell you about our doings — why don't more of you New Yorkers write me and tell me your events — big or small? One of Ralph's projects (successful) was the installation of an irrigation system. Since we have had hardly an inch of rain since May — our whole country is literally dried up. The hay is as high as a jack-rabbit's cye. The paddocks looked like beige carpeting.

We inquired from a local orchard owner where to obtain information about a sprinkler system he was using. We noticed these sprays on golf courses too. Within a week ours was installed and heavenly "spring grass" popped up and the beige has turned to green. Of course there is one natural resource one must have - a source of water. We are fortunate, we have plenty -- a big hole was excavated and the tractor now furnishes power for the pump at approximately 150 gallons a minute for about 8 hours a day. By adjusting the 2000 feet of lightweight aluminum pipes which come in sections, we can rotate the supply throughout a large area. Now we look like a miniature Yellowstone Park with its geysers. The horses are put out every morning and night to enjoy their new-found delicacy - fresh grass. Some horses run through the spray.

The Visitadores Ride is much the same not a competitive Ride, but one of good fellowship and enjoyment of our wonderful California heritage.

One of our young Junior Morgan Robin Johnston of Northridge, had only smiles when she placed second in a Showmanship class in the L. A. Co. 4-H Show held in Northridge recently, with her Morgan mare Bailey's Boots and her brand new foal - a colt.

We always hate to speak of the seamy side of life with our Morgans, but it seems Paula Roe of Lakeside tangled with the wrong end of one of her yearling stallions and came out of it with a whip lash and some cracked ribs. Better luck next time, Paula.

On a warm pleasant day late in July, Caven-Glo played host to approximately 25 youngsters and their instructors. These children were from the Glory Ranch in Calabasas, Calif. — a summer camp for children who want to learn horsemanship and spend a few weeks in the atmosphere of ranch life.

This camp is quite well known in our So. California area and is owned and run by Rosemary and Dolson Gebert. It is also the home of the very famous palomino stallion, Top Hat and some of his family. 











I personally have trotted my mare over 5 miles a day at 100 plus degrees, and the only sweat on her was under the saddle and breast collar, and it wasn't a lathered sweat, just damp. Our biggest problem out here where barns are scarce is to keep the horses shaded so they don't sun burn. It kind of seems that our problems are the opposite of the northern breeders. Any of you people who want to get away from the winter weather this year, why not try Arizona, we'll be glad to welcome you and show you around. Remember our State Fair is November 6-15.



## Training

Unless a colt has bounced at something, either real or colt-imaginary, altogether too many owners let leading in hand disintegrate into a sloppy, tag-along affair. Don't let it happen to yours. Lead him smartly and properly, with his shoulder only a little behind your own. Encourage him to keep his head up. With the coiled end of the lead in your

left hand, your right is free to set his head a bit, slow him down if necessary or encourage him to walk a bit faster. Do take particular care that this gait is fast, collected and balanced. A perfect walk is a pleasure horse's most important gait and now is not too early for your colt to learn it. Most Morgans have a naturally rapid and trappy walk, but there are occasional individuals to whom this does not come that easily. If yours is one of these, and you can urge him on with your voice, then do so, but don't try to tow him into a faster walk. This is just not possible for one simple but very important reason. Speed, at any gait, is derived in two ways. Either the horse increases the length of his

stride or the number of strides per given time. Either way, the leading impulse comes from the quarters, never the forehand. Thus it follows that pulling a horse's head out cannot possibly result in a faster gait because there has been no added impulsion for him to move faster directed from the rear. So you are faced with two solutions to the problem of making him want to move ahead faster for an honest desire to do so on his part will result in the balanced gait you want. Of the two solutions, one is good, the other an expedient. And as usual, the latter seems at first glance to be much the easier. You simply employ any available bystander. Arm him with a long whip, a white towel he can snap,

Box 205, Williamsburg, Mass. Tel. 26-8-7586. or a branch off a convenient bush and bid him walk behind your colt and scare him into a faster walk. It will work. He will walk faster and it will be a properly balanced gait because he wants to walk faster and therefore the impulse to do so has come from the proper area his quarters. But. And it is a big "but," one you should consider seriously. In accomplishing your desired end you have sacrificed much, usually too much. First of all, your colt's attention is no longer on you - it is wholly concentrated on whatever is behind him. Then if he bounces ahead too fast, you will of course have to check him back with the lead. Now he is confused, with his leader holding him back and his chaser scaring him forward. To make it even worse, he is no longer moving in a straight line. Instead of walking forward, with his whole attention normally on what's ahead of him he has to be watching over his shoulder, his neck and spine bent, his lateral balance destroyed. If he should stub his toe over something he didn't see, he has another snatch on his halter to reward him. The method can still work, though. You can gradually substitute the word "walk" for your accomplice at the rear and you will, eventually, get a straight, and somewhat faster, walk. If, later

on, your colt persists in shying hard at things behind him — white towels, waving bushes or the lunge line he thinks is another long whip — don't blame him. Such actions are entirely of your making.

of your making.
So much for the expedient. Now for the "good" method, the one without, as television commercials so aptly put it, the unpleasant side-effects! The problem remains the same - how to make your colt want to move faster. Various possible solutions should come to your mind readily, for by now you should know your colt well enough to have recognized long since many of his special likes and dislikes. This is one of the times when you can put such knowledge to very good use. Is he anxious to come into the barn each night for his grain. If so then employ that short walk between gate and barn door to encourage a brisk, faster pace. Use your voice to tell him he's doing well. If you can think of no such situation, then you can still employ the bystander. Only this time, instead of arming him with weaponry, give him a tin pail with a few pieces of cut-up carrot in it. They will make an enticing rattle, you see. Station said helper about a hundred feet ahead of you and lead your colt to him, encouraging him with your

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voice to walk out alertly. When you get to the person holding the bucket, say "whoa" firmly and make him stand quietly while you feed him a piece of carrot and much praise. Don't under any circumstances, let him plunge his nose into the pail or be a bully about it. After a few moments send your helper out ahead another hundred feet or so and repeat the process. By the third time, if not before, the colt will be walking right out for you. True, his entire attention isn't on you, but neither is he confused or frightened. Be careful not to overdo either the time you spend on this or the rewards given. It is the very rare colt which fails to collect himself and balance his walk properly after three such lessons. Know when to halt the material rewards completely. He shouldn't, at this point, break into a trot even for as much as one step. Nor, and this is most important, should he be bent laterally. His spine from the point between his ears, down to his withers down to his tail should always be perfectly straight. Never let him bend his neck, either to crowd against you or sidle away from you. Once you have attained that brisk, alert gait which is a pure, equine walk, practice it often. Take advantage of every small occasion to do so. And

then invent a few new ones - an occasional walking circuit of his pasture, side trips down your driveway, anything of the sort. Vary your walks just as much as you possibly can. Yearlings dearly love seeing new places. Their curiosity is unending and they can find enjoyment in the simplest of changes - as well as boredom in the lack. Keep him happy and content in his work. His eyes and his ears will tell you he is.

After several weeks of work leading him at a collected walk, you can begin doing the same with his trot. Don't be in a hurry. Most active young horses prefer the faster gait, and if you shorten the time spent attaining a good walk by too much, you will find your colt unwilling to work at all at the slower pace. Use the same procedure for the trot that you did for the collected walk. If he has a particular liking for a certain place and direction, make use of it. But only at the beginning. Say "trot" to him quietly, lift his head a little with your hand on the halter and begin to jog yourself. Be satisfied with a slow, straight, mannered gait. And don't drag him by the head. It never will work. For the first few attempts, concentrate solely on getting the trot when and as you ask for it. Trot him thirty or forty feet the first time then say "whoa" firmly and stand him quietly. Pet him and explain to him that he's done well. Then try it again. Work him perhaps four or five times at varying distances and directions. If you go the same distance and direction each time, you will be making not one mistake, but two. First, you will bore him to death, and a bored horse looks just that, dull and uninterested. If he carries that expression with him into the show ring, he will catch no eye, least of all the judge's. The second mistake is that you are confusing habit for training. The error of that way will be evident the moment you change either the place or the direction and, worse still, when he anticipates your commands rather than obeys them. That's not unlike a private deciding what a general should do - and getting everyone killed proving it.

As soon as your colt has reached the point where you can lead him at a brisk, alert walk, an easy trot and stop him where and as you like, it is time to polish the faster gait. A quiet, mannered trot on a lead is a basic necessity. You will use it, and the walk that has preceded it, in almost every phase of his training from now on; on the lunge line, in long lines, in harness,

even under saddle. It must neither be neglected, nor skipped, as much of his future depends on its use. But now that he has done his primary work in hand, he should have more advanced schooling in the same manner. If you intend to show him in a yearling class, then his trot needs to be collected and refined until it is the best approach he can make to a really brilliant rendition of that gait. You've seen your colt showing off on a cold wintery morning - head high, mane and tail like fringed banners, knees and hocks bending with such precision and abandon that he doesn't seem to be of this earth at all. That is brilliance - the kind poets and artists describe so well and that a mere horseman recognizes mainly because it brings a big lump up in his throat; of pride if the colt is his, of plain-simple admiration if it isn't. The best approach to this, done at your command, is your present aim.

Much can be done simply through encouragement. As you work him on the trot, increase the speed of that gait. Hold his head higher and higher. Your ear should warn you before

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you go too far, either at extending the gait or raising his head. The cadence of his trot should be sharp and clear, even with unshod hooves on grass. It must be a definite "one-two" gait, never the roughened "one-and-a-half, two-and-a-half," beat that indicates imbalance. The trotting gait is a pure one and any discrepencies in it are as painfully clear to the ear now as they will be to the eye later on in harness. When you feel you have achieved a good 95% of the speed he is capable of right now, begin to collect it by tucking his chin in a little. Don't lower his head and don't slow him down. Just put a gradually increasing pressure on the halter noseband itself, holding a very short piece of lead and keeping your hand up almost between his jawbones. You'll find you can set his head surprisingly well with practice. Generalizations are often unwise, because much depends on the individual's conformaton, but in general, the nearer to vertical your colt's face it, the better collected and balanced he will be. You cannot, with a halter, maintain both the high head and the completely tucked-in chin, but do encourage the nearest comfortable approach to it.

Working to attain a brilliant trot is one of the very few occasions when it is advantageous to school your colt when he is fresh and feeling just a bit high. By now his manners on the lead should be well-nigh impeccable. Even when he's feeling good, he should not buck or plunge while he's being lead. You should therefor be able to work him at a very spectacular trot without any loss of manners or control, even on a cold morning before he's had his exercise. Try it then, and be satisfied with no more than two attempts in any one day, for this is the time when you do want him to show his thoroughgoing enjoyment of the whole process with a high, bouncy trot. There is, literally, no substitute for the glad-to-be-alive look at this point. And don't worry over his knee action. Natural balance and some brilliance are your present aims. Later on with added muscling and maturity, can come such higher action as you might desire.

Although the hardest part of showing a colt nicely in hand is the development and perfection of both his walk and his trot, you must not neglect his standing position. Custom has decreed that Morgans be shown slightly stretched. This is not, however, the extreme position adopted by some of the pony breeds. The best position for a Morgan is that which is extended no more than four to six inches beyond the "square." If all four cannon bones are perfectly straight up and down, a horse is said to be standing squarely when viewed from the side. This same squareness applies to either end. The long bones in each foreleg, and in each hind leg should be perfectly vertical when viewed from directly in front of or behind the horse. The actual distance between the two front legs, or the two hind ones, depends entirely on the width of the animal's chest or quarters.

If you will stop a moment to consider the importance of a perfect position, then attaining it will be easier. Your wish is to present your colt standing in such a way that his best points are enhanced — and any poorer ones minimized. Just so. And to keep him there long enough for a judge to note and record every one of those good points. First, check your colt behind to see just how far apart his hind feet should be in order that his hind legs and quarters are perfectly straight and square when viewed from the rear. The distance will vary, but in general that's about six inches with a well-developed

yearling. Now do the same for his forefeet. Standing at his left shoulder, take a short hold on his halter with your left hand and, using either your training whip or your right hand against his shoulder, square his hind feet until they are the proper distance apart and even. Perfect positioning of the hind feet is extremely important - don't neglect it. Now if you will lift his head a little and touch him on the back of his left front leg above the knee with your whip and speak to him, he will step forward a bit with that forefoot without moving the hind ones. Don't use your whip around his fetlock or he will confuse this with having his feet lifted. And don't ask for a big step a little one is fine. Once he has advanced his left forefoot, gently pull his head toward you and he will usually step the right forefoot up even with its mate. Congratulate him properly even if his first attempt is only a token stretch. He will do better later on. Once he is in a correct position as far as his feet are concerned, hold him there with your whip laid across his chest sidewise while you gradually encourage him to raise his head and lean his weight forward onto his forelegs. All too often, a horse will stretch his front feet out in front of him and leave all his weight on his rear legs. This accomplishes little but make him look like a suspension bridge - and one of dubious strength at that. It also makes him look low and long in the back, an impression you most certainly don't want a judge to get. Perfectly stretched, your colt should have most of his weight on his forehand. His forelegs should be absolutely straight up and down. This will show to best advantage the back and loin and quarters that his Morgan ancestry has bequeathed him. Now raise his head high and

flaunt his nice long neck the same way.

Snap your fingers to get his ears up. There. Now just practice getting him to stand that way at some simple command. And hope, fervently, that he'll remember it all the first time he gets into a colt class next summer. If he does, there should be a nice ribbon to prove what you have known all along, that a good, well-trained Morgan yearling colt is just the best that that size and age ever comes in!

Do remember , . . the time to train

a colt is always.

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
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

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## From the Editor's Notebook .

As you read this, our big November gelding issue is going to press. We are pleased with the number of advance orders for extra copies that we have already received. We hope you will enjoy this special issue.

It is our plan at this time to make both the spring mare and foal issue and the fall gelding issue annual features. We hope you will keep these issues in mind as you go through the pictures you have of your Morgans. We'd like the pictorial sections of these two issues to be truly outstanding, and for this we need your help. We hope that during the years you will put aside your best foal pictures and your best gelding pictures to send us for our consideration when the time comes. Many of you will have good pictures of your summer foals that we will be glad to consider at that time for next spring's mare and foal issue. The pictures we use need not be recently taken, if they are good ones that we have not printed before.

Speaking of pictures, thanks to your efforts, the pictures in the magazine are getting better and better. We still however, receive too many that we can't use. Even with the most modern,

up-to-date printing processes, a picture loses something when it is reproduced. Under- or over-exposed pictures, those with any degree of blurring of the subject, or those where a dark horse blends in all too well against a dark background will just not print successfully. And, except in rare cases, we do not use pictures showing a horse with feet, tail, or ears vanishing off the edge of the print. We ask you to go over with care the pictures you send to us and to your regional correspondents.

One last word on the subject of pictures: Please identify each picture you send to us according to our magazine rules. Each picture should be identified on the back by pasting or taping a label on it with the name and registration number of the Morgan and the name and address of the owner. If you'd like your picture to be considered for a special issue, this information should be added. It is also of great help to us to have as much additional information on each picture as possible: The Horse's show winnings, if it is a show picture, the name of the rider or driver (and age, if it is a child), the age and breeding of the horse - anything that will help us to write a more interesting caption for the picture. And, if the picture is to be returned to someone other than the owner listed, that name and address should also be put on the back of the picture. Giving the information about the pictures you send in a letter will not do. Letters and pictures have a way of becoming separated. It takes no more time to label a picture correctly than to write a letter to accompany it. Correct labelling helps us to be accurate in placing and captioning your pictures.

We have many good things in store for those of you who look forward to spending those long fall and winter evenings with our magazine. On the way are more chapters of that wonderfully detailed and splendidly written series on training your own pleasure horse. Also coming are several articles by Marilyn Childs both on training and on matters of Morgan history. Bill Hopkins is working on an article for us about Morgans as hunters and jumpers. And Professor Donald Balch has promised us some lavishly-illustrated articles on how young Morgans are handled at the University of Vermont. This is just a sample of the good reading, entertaining and informative, that you'll find in our magazine this winter.
