
## Knox Morgan 4677

enator Graham's is the only surviving sire line to Knox Morgan 4677, the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair World Champion Morgan Stallion. In 1915, when F. G. Chandler decided to end his breeding program he made sure Knox Morgan went to his good friend Joseph Chase Brunk. "At the age of 24, the stallion traveled to Illinois where he remained until his death in 1919.... During those last years at Cotton Hill, Knox Morgan sired 30 foals. Since only 11 of these [were registered] ... the other 19 were most likely colts who were gelded and sold. History records the union of the two world champions, Knox Morgan and Senata, as having the most profound impact on the Morgan breed in future times through the colt produced in 1916, Senator Knox [sire of Senator Graham], as well as the daughter Florence Chandler [grand-dam

of Flyhawk]." (Renee M. Page, "Knox Morgan," *The Morgan Horse*, December 2001, pp. 252–258).

Senator Knox also sired Daisette, the dam of Jubilee King.

Knox Morgan was not only chosen World Champion Morgan Stallion at the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair in 1904, when he was 13 years old, but in 1915 he travelled across the United States by rail to San Francisco, to be chosen again as World Champion Morgan Stallion at the 1915 Pacific Exposition, when he was 24 years old! Later that same year he was transferred to Joseph Chase Brunk.
