Tinkerbell 05666 (Sealect 7266 x Friendly 04963) • Dapple bay, star • Big, beautiful, balanced mare with superb legs and feet Foaled: May 25, 1941, Milton, Massachusetts • Bred by: D.L. inkerbell was by Sealect, her dam Friendly by Mansfield out of Ulwina by Bennington out of Juno. Tinkerbell was double Bennington on her dam's side, but in the throw of the dice she got all the right Morgan genes. Perhaps because there was Juno back there in the dam line, she by the beautiful Forester by Meteor 2nd, and linebred Daniel Lambert on the granddam line, and close up other crosses to early Black Hawk through Cleopatra by General Putnam by Rollo by Black Hawk. Then the dam of Sealect was by the beautiful Knox Morgan, and so it was similar breeding in many ways to early Brunk, so no wonder Tinkerbell looked so much like an early Brunk mare. I was so taken with her, a dark bay, upstanding, good size, her elegant neck, lovely head, smooth topline, long, deep quarters, and high set tail. The legs and feet were tremendous. . . .
